Ex-Fish Commissioner Reed Loses on Appeal

Other Cases Decided By the Supreme Court

The Oregon supreme court at noon today handed down opinions as follows:

Reed vs. Dunbar, appeal from Marion county; opinion by Chief Justice Bean; affirmed.

Lawrey vs. Sterling, appeal from Union county; opinion by Justice Moore; affirmed.

REFUSES TO VACATE PROPERTY

Dispute Over Lease Results in Much Trouble

Meat Market on Court St. Cause of Controversy

The owner of the building says that the tenants must vacate, and the tenants have issued an ultimatum that they will not. Therein lies an unusual state of affairs in relation to the building at the corner of Court and Liberty streets, that is owned by F. W. Steusloff, and occupied as a meat market by Farrington & Farrar. At last reports the tenants were in possession.

The whole trouble has resulted from a general misunderstanding in relation to an alleged lease. The tenants were seen this morning, that prior to purchasing the premises from John Hackett, a few weeks ago, they called upon F. W. Steusloff, who had purchased the real estate upon which the shop was located, and arranged for the lease of the building and premises until April 1, 1933. Early Sunday morning some one, unknown to the proprietors of the market, deliberately removed the greater part of the roof, and also damaged the sides of the building to a considerable extent. But the tenants were equal to the occasion. They procured canvas, and stretched the same over the generously large skylight, and determined to hold the fort. In fact they declare any further nocturnal molestations will be warmly received.

Wm. Steusloff, a brother of F. W. Steusloff, who recently purchased the property occupied by Farrington & Farrar, says the tenants called on his brother before buying the business from Hackett, but at that time Steusloff had not purchased the property. He had not yet become the owner of the property, should he make the investment he would probably not require the use of the building until April 1st, next. When Steusloff did purchase the property he notified the tenants that he would expect them to vacate the premises on July 1st, and he fully intends to accomplish the ejectment of the present occupants of the building.

Mr. Steusloff recently purchased the property as a site for a modern two-story brick, and he desires to come in to immediate possession of the premises, that he may commence building. The present tenants do not occupy the rear 20 feet of the building, which is being torn down and removed to-day by carpenters in the employ of Mr. Steusloff.

Borrowing Habits of Poets.
On Tennyson's habit of failing to recognize clearly his own borrowings from the classical poets, Mr. Lang observes that the poets have always had a kind of regal indifference to their own lighter productions. Mr. Lang says: "Scott did not care, no, not when he found that he had unwittingly taken a line from a poem by the poet of a friend. In the preface to a little collection of verses from the novels he frankly declares that he cannot pretend to be certain which are of his own composition and which are not."

"To take an example from the level at the foot of Parnassus, I once read, in an American paper, some lines attributed to Mr. Austin Dobson. 'Not bad for Dobson,' I said freely to a friend. But it was proved on me that the rhymes were my own! A hard who forgets his own verses may be pardoned for remembering those of other people and mistaking a half line of somebody else's for his own. I dare say that Tennyson did this occasionally, but he could hardly say that the sun sets 'without being accused of unconscious borrowing.'"

His Foot Was In the Way.
A gentlemanly chap riding in an elevated car permitted the sight of a man's foot in the middle of the aisle to exasperate him to a most unreasonable degree. Women tripped over it. Men stepped over it. A few folk purposely dragged their feet against it as a hint. But its owner calmly read his paper and moved not. Finally, "I beg your pardon, my friend," said the gentleman, "I am sorry, but my foot is in the way. I have been thinking of it for some time, but I have not been able to get it out of the way. I am taking up more room than you are entitled to. Your foot has been in every one's way for half an hour. I protest, sir!"

The man folded his paper, remarking without the least show of anger: "Ah, thank you. I had not noticed it." With that he reached down, picked up his foot, gave it a violent twist and pushed it partly under the seat. To accomplish this he had to move his body to the edge of the seat.

On discovering that the leg and foot were wooden our gentlemanlike chap blushed in confusion, muttered a sort of apology and hurried off at the next station, while the car uttered—New York Post.

Diffusing Tea.
Few housekeepers remember, as they should, that when it is necessary to diffuse strong tea it should be done with water at the boiling point. The poor flavor of tea, made strong at first and then reduced, such as is too often served at receptions and "at homes," is usually caused by the addition of hot, not boiling, water to the first infusion. A lesson in this matter may be had from the Russians, who serve the most delicious tea in the world, and who prepare it first very strong, making it almost an essence of tea. This is diluted to the strength wished, with water kept boiling in the samovar. This water is not allowed to boil and reboil, but is renewed as needed. Freshly boiled water is insisted upon by all connoisseurs in tea-making.

IN WITH THE NEW AND OUT WITH THE OLD

Newly-Elected Public Officials Are Installed

County Officers Appoint Deputies--Bonds Approved

An extensive change took place in the official circles of Marion county today. But a single change occurred at the state house. Associate Justice Frank A. Moore succeeded Chief Justice R. S. Bean, who again becomes junior member of the appellate court, having been honored with re-election for another term of six years, by an enormous vote.

At the court house the changes were more numerous. The county court approved the bonds of the newly-elected officers, and County Judge Scott administered the oath of office to John W. Roland, county clerk-elect, who, in turn, swore in the other officers.

Mr. Roland, who succeeded W. W. Hall, as clerk, has appointed as deputies Mrs. Carrie E. Roland and Miss Angie McCulloch.

J. C. Siegmund assumed charge of the county recorder's office. Mr. Siegmund has not yet announced his permanent deputy, but has retained ex-Recorder J. H. Roland temporarily.

Ben H. Colbath took formal charge of the office of sheriff and tax collector, succeeding F. W. Durbin. Sheriff Colbath has appointed John O. Estes first deputy and J. L. Skipton second deputy. He will be assisted in the office work temporarily by the retiring sheriff. Sheriff Colbath is thoroughly conversant with the affairs of the sheriff's department, having served a four-year's deputyship, and is capable of giving a splendid administration, in the performance of which he will have able assistance in John O. Estes, who was also for four years a deputy under Durbin, and J. L. Skipton, who has also had some experience.

The Bonds Required.
Bonds were furnished by the newly-installed officers as follows: Colbath, sheriff—\$10,000; tax collector, \$30,000; Roland, clerk; \$10,000; Siegmund, recorder, \$30,000; Richardson, treasurer, \$50,000.

The Retiring Officers.
Ex-Sheriff Durbin expects to attend to his large farm. He is also reported to be an active candidate for appointment as superintendent of the penitentiary by Governor-elect Chamberlain.

W. W. Hall, the retiring clerk, has no plans for the future, and neither has J. H. Roland, who so satisfactorily served as recorder of conveyances for two terms.

A. L. Downing, who has been the county's disbursing agent for four years, says he is going to make an honest living now. He will retire to his farm near Whiteaker.

In the Justice Department.
Justice J. O'Donald this morning surrendered his department to E. D. Horgan, the popular young member of the legal profession, who will hold the reins of justice in the Salem precincts for at least two years. Constable John H. Lewis succeeds himself, having been re-elected.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Mix stove blacking with a little ammonia to prevent it burning off.

A teakettle should never be allowed to stand on the side of the fire with a small quantity of water in it.

A rose poultice is made by packing fresh rose petals in salt, a layer of the petals, then a layer of salt, and keeping them covered for six months.

A convenient substitute for a cork-screw when the latter is not at hand may be found in the use of a common screw with an attached string to pull the cork.

For ink stains on furniture add five drops of nitric to a teaspoonful of water and apply it to the stain with a feather. If the stain does not yield to the first application, make it stronger and repeat the process.

Scrubs on silverware require prompt attention, otherwise it will take a long time to remove them. Sulphuric acid will remove the stain left by rusting. Dip the spoon in the acid, repeating the process until the stain has disappeared; then wash in very hot water.

Bound to Sound Their "B."
The English middle classes have had so much fun poked at them for dropping the letter "h" and for carrying it forward and placing it where it should not be, possibly thus to obey the laws of compensation, that they have become sensitive on the subject, and many aspirate the "h" with double force when the letter should be aspirated. Instead of saying "before him," as Americans do, with a light aspiration, they will say "before him," taking a full and deep breath when they utter the second word, shooting it out as it came from a popgun. Dropping the "h" is not new for ordinary English folk. It is a new trick to aspirate it with double the force required.—New York Commercial Advertiser.

How the Sections Say It.
The woman from New England buys a "table spread," while her sister from the south buys a "tablecloth." The woman from Nova Scotia orders the servant to "lay the table," while with most of us natives of the United States the command is to "set the table." In the country the hostess says to her guests, "Sit by," when it is time to eat; in town it is "Please sit down." In the city among swells there is no further invitation than the announcement of the servant that "dinner is served."—Mobile (Ala.) Register.
