SALEM AS IT WAS IN 1852

Interesting Historical Papers Were Presented

By Judge Boise and G. H. Himes At Congregational Jubilee

The anniversary exercises of the First Congregational church were continued last evening, when a large audience filled the church and listened to the addresses. Rev. W. C. Kantner, pastor of the church, presided. After an instrumental quartet, and prayer, Judge R. E. Boise, the pioneer lawyer and judge, delivered an address on "Salem in 1852." Judge Boise arrived in Salem in that year, and in describing the town and its people as he knew them a half century ago, he related many amusing incidents, which created laughter, and was several times interrupted with applause.

He described Salem as it appeared when the old Mansion House was the fashionable hotel of the Northwest, and when the fir trees in Marion Square were but saplings. Rough chairs sold for \$12 per set, and a hand-made table cost \$20. Indians camped along the banks of North and South Mill creek, living in lodges, and surrounded with worthless furs.

Among the stories Judge Boise told was one regarding J. D. Boon, who, as state treasurer, kept no books, but put all the state's money in one sack, and his own in another. He paid warrants from the state sack, and saved the warrants as vouchers. At the close of his term the secretary of state counted the money and found the balance on hand correct. Judge Boise remarked, in relating the story, that the defalcations by which the state has lost money were not due to poor bookkeeping, but to the error of officials in putting the money in the wrong sack.

Boon had an eye to business, and though he was an elder in the church, he became negligent in his attendance upon meetings. When a new minister remonstrated with him he replied that he was too busy to go to church, and then remarked that traveling such a long distance and settling in a new country must have cost the minister considerable money. He asked the pastor to accept a contribution of a \$50 gold piece, and no further remonstrances were heard.

George H. Himes, of the Oregon Historical Society, at Portland, read an address reviewing the religious work of the different denominations that sent missionaries to Oregon in the early days, giving the Catholics credit for first arousing in the Indians an interest in Christianity.

During the meeting "Peerless Oregon," a song written by Clifford Kantner, was sung by the congregation. The exercises tonight will be under the auspices of the Y. P. S. C. E. of the First Congregational church.

GOLD OUTPUT INCREASING

Reports E. H. Flagg Who Is Home From Nome

Says Repeated Scandals Prove Damaging to Country

E. H. Flagg, deputy revenue collector for the district of Nome, who is visiting his family in Salem, talks very interestingly concerning that country. While Northwestern Alaska is not fabulously rich in mineral wealth, it has proven one of the most reliable and best paying mining districts known.

Mr. Flagg left Salem in March, 1901, and has been located at Nome during his 17 months' absence. Nome has a population of 7500, including about 3000 recent arrivals. Mr. Flagg says the output of gold at Nome is increasing annually, and will continue to increase.

Companies with large capital are installing plants that will employ from 1200 to 1500 men. Nome is a poor place for a poor man who expects to engage in mining, for the reason that it is all deep placer mining, the ore, in many places, being below the surface.

Mr. Flagg reports the past season to have been one of the coldest known, but without any severe blizzards, the thermometer going 46 degrees below zero. Only a few Salomites are located at Nome. Mr. and Mrs. Levi Balmer are the only Salem people living in Nome City. Dr. and Mrs. Derbyshire, of Stayton, are living there.

Mr. Flagg says the frequent scandals that are brought against officials, that in many instances are competent not only cripples the administration of affairs, but it very damaging to the country itself. The latest scandal in the territory was the recent arrest and conviction of United States Marshal Richards on the charge of contempt of court, in attempting to defeat the ends of justice in an alleged tampering with a jury. Richards was convicted before Judge Wickersham, and it is said the men were political enemies in the state of Washington. Wickersham, who succeeded Noyes, who was displaced, will soon be succeeded by Judge Alfred S. Moore, of Beaver, Pennsylvania, and the replacement of Wickersham will probably prove more satisfactory. The fine of \$3000 that was imposed upon Richards was not paid, pending an appeal that will probably be taken to congress.

The Nome Nugget, an independent paper, very severely and in uncompromising terms, denounces the conviction of Richards, and charges the presiding judge (Wickersham) with being biased and prejudiced. In a lengthy editorial in criticism of the verdict of the court, the Nugget says, in part:

"There have been many things in the administration of justice in North western Alaska which were grievously wrong, and which are to be deplored, but there is nothing, to our mind, more regrettable than this latest instance of what we believe to be a gross miscarriage of justice and grave judicial error. It is, to us, a glaringly evil. With all due respect to the district court, as at present constituted, we may be permitted to state our belief that United States Marshal Richards is no more guilty of the quasi-criminal crime of which the court has seen fit to convict him than is the court himself. Mr. Richards has been a year past. During that time he has, in the estimation of ninety per cent, of the people of this judicial division, proved himself a faithful, efficient and painstaking official. He has taken great pride in the conduct of his office, and in the strict performance of every duty; his official and personal records are clean in the eyes of the people; he stands unimpeached in the minds of the great majority of his fellow citizens, notwithstanding the judgment and sentence of the temporary judge of the district court has pronounced upon him. It may be that in the eyes of the national administration his character will be blackened, and his reputation destroyed; but in the eyes of his fellow citizens of Northwestern Alaska who knew him, and who value a faithful, honest, fair and impartial administration of official duties, free from petty spite, and without malevolence to any, his character and reputation remain unimpaired and unshaken."

FRUIT BEING PRESERVED

Salem Canning Plant Is Running Full Blast

Damage to Royal Anne Cherries from Rain Extensive

The Allen Packing Company is running its canning plant in this city full blast, and employing 125 people. The strawberry crop has been disposed of and about 1200 cases preserved. Cherries and raspberries are now being canned. The Royal Anne is the principal variety being handled, and from 2 to 4 cents per pound is being paid for them. The cherry crop, and particularly the Royal Anne variety, is reported to be badly damaged by the recent rains. The fruit has cracked badly, and much of it is unmarketable.

There is an average crop of raspberries. The company is paying 2 1/2 cents per pound for the red and 3 cents for the black.

There will be no vegetables canned by the Salem plant this year, and it is not a certainty that the evaporating plant will be opened this fall. Its operation, if at all, will depend on the extent of the prune crop, which, at the present time, does not promise large.

NOTES FROM THE SEASIDE

Season is Nearly a Month Late But Weather Fine

Newport, July 7.—Summer visitors are pouring in here now, and the beaches are beginning to show signs of life. An extra coach had to be run over Saturday, and Capt. Stone expects the biggest season that this place has ever enjoyed. As usual, Salem people predominate.

The Harriman management of the railroads has secured excursion rates to Newport from many cities in Eastern Oregon and Washington, Idaho, Montana and Utah. A Salt Lake hotel party (only one wife) came over Saturday, and the groom told me here would be both Mormons and Gentiles in numbers this season.

The season is nearly a month late in the crop of campers, vegetables and other green things. For two weeks there have been showers, and potatoes are just in bloom. The first green peas are coming on, strawberries and other berries will be in their prime during July and August. The vegetables at Newport are famous with all epicures.

"Sea Lion" Charley, who is a noted character at Yaquina bay, has built himself a new double-ender boat to go out deep-sea fishing. He sails his craft up and down the coast as far as Seal Rocks south and Offer Rocks north. A party of hunters captured an otter a few weeks ago, whose skin was reported worth \$200 to \$400.

Landlord Mays, at Elk City, is getting an increasing run of fishermen and hunters. He sets a good table, and is the right kind of a man to please the sporting fraternity. Marsh Simpson, the mayor, and King Fisher of Elk City, is on deck, and looks at least ten years younger than when we first met up with him, ten years ago. If he keeps growing good looking he will have the girls after him.

Mrs. A. R. Crossman and family, of Portland, took their cottage July 2d. Not so famous as Oyster Bay, where President Roosevelt holds forth, Olsson's Bay is just as comfortable, and commands the most beautiful view of Newport. Many improvements have been made, and Captain Olsson has several cottages for rent, all as clean as the most modern man-of-war.

Martin Berry, the Irish carpenter, has returned from working at Eugene, Pendleton and Walla Walla. He bought property at the latter place. His cabin was riddled of all its contents but a boot-jack, in his absence. Even his stove was taken, although it was a cold stove when they took it.

Mr. and Mrs. E. Hofer and family and the Misses Brewster and Gilmore, of Youngstown, Ohio, are in the Olsson cottage for the season. The Journal editorial headquarters, guarded only by a white bulldog, are in a large and beautiful weather-proof tent, made to order by R. M. Wade & Co., of Salem. On a diet of fish and clams, the readers may look for breezy editorials.

There are thirteen hotels running here this season, besides the Bay View and Abbey House. Mrs. Case is running the Ocean House. A sanitarium is being built on the high bank over at Nye Creek.

Miss Florence Steiner and her guest, Miss Kiesen, of Berne, Indiana, are here for a few weeks. The familiar figure of Mark Bayley is missed by Newport visitors. He has become a resident of Salem.

F. J. Wood, of Greenville, Mich.; H. Chase and family, Newberg; Mrs. B. Hoover and sons, Portland; F. H. Armstrong, Miss Rosa Reed, Albany; E. M. Moore, Roseburg; were at the Abbey House the past week.

Minor Mention.

The state military board held its regular quarterly meeting at the capitol Monday evening. Adjutant-General Gantenbein and Messrs. Jackson, Beebe, Spencer and Gills were in attendance. The principal business consisted in auditing the bills for the quarter, and other routine business. The board reports everything in readiness for the annual O. N. G. encampment that will be convened in Albany Thursday, July 17th, for a seven days' period. A plot of the camp site and its location was today sent to Governor Geer through Adjutant-General Beebe.

A man named Moxley, of Dallas, claims to have been held up by a lone footpad, near the cannery, on Twelfth street, Sunday evening, and reports the loss of a gold watch and \$10 in gold.

The further consideration of the application of counsel for John F. Markley for a continuance of his trial for murder until the October term of court, was deferred until Monday, July 14th. The defense has filed two affidavits in support of the application and the state has been given until Friday, July 11th, to file counter affidavits.

As a result of the controversy between F. W. Steunloff and Farrington & Farrar, the last two named gentlemen have been arrested, charged with making repairs within the city's fire limits in violation of the city ordinance. The men have employed John A. Carson as attorney, and will have a hearing on Monday, July 14th. The city has retained John A. Jeffrey as its attorney.

C. A. Gray, of this city, is becoming a successful contractor, so far as securing contracts is concerned. While in Roseburg Saturday, Mr. Gray received the contract for the construction of a building to be occupied by the Douglas County Bank. The building will cost about \$15,000.

Charles Scott, assignee for the Oregon Land Company, today brought suit against R. D. Mason and wife for \$95, with interest and \$45 attorney's fees. The foreclosure of a mortgage on lot 12, block 45, Scott's Mills, is asked.

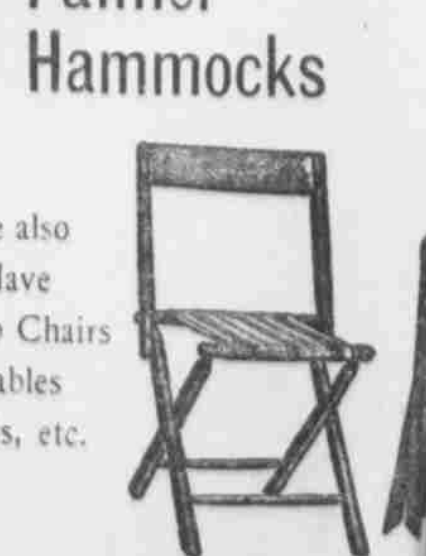
