THE FUTURE OF OREGON.

Popular Mechanics, published at Chicago, by H. H. Windsor, has the following to say of Oregon and Portland:
"Is San Francisco to be the future metropolis of the world and Oregon one of the most populous and important states in America? Such a prediction was once made by a noted English scientist, and recent developments lead many to believe there were good grounds for his theory. It looks as if Portland, Ore., is destined to become the Liverpool of America and all the world is now turning its eyes on the state of Oregon, where the wheat crop is never known to fail.

The trade between the Philippine Islands and Hawaii, carried on through Portland and San Francisco, is growing to enormous proportions. Alaska with its many sources of commerce, is hourly growing in importance and our rapidly increasing trade with China is causing many eyes at this time to turn to the "land of the setting sun." Some mariners declare Portland, Oregon, to have the finest natural harbor in the world and it may be that this is to become the great shipping center of our enormous trade with Alaska, the Pacific Islands and the Orient. At any rate it is certain that Portland's shipping interests are bound to increase many fold and the prospects for her becoming a rival of San Francisco as an ocean port are not in the least remote.

Oregon's splendid agricultural resources, the richness of her soil, her healthful climate and advantageous location make this state of first importance to the investor when considering the wonderful changes of conditions brought about by our recent wars, acquisitions and stupendous increase of trade. "Two hundred and fifty thousand free homes in Oregon." The announcement is made in good faith, and all anyone has to do to feel, as if that state had been newly discovered. The free homes are of 160 acres each. They are government lands situated in every county in the state and can be obtained under the general rules pertaining to government lands. Besides there are now 450,000 acres of school lands which may be purchased at the remarkably low price of \$1.25 per acre. That these offers will long wait acceptance is not probable in this day when every American is ready to recognize a good opportunity for a good and profitable investment.

"The first shall be last and the last shall be first." Often it has been said and often it has come true. So it is with Oregon, the last of our states to attract any great amount of attention, may soon become first in commercial importance. It seems that providence has reserved this land of many charms for a certain people and that people is now about to take possession.

A NEW ERA ON THE PACIFIC.

The sailing from Newport News a few days ago of the new Pacific mail steamer, the Korea, foresees the coming of a new era on the Pacific ocean, where the new and expanded United States expects to build up an immense trade. The new liner, displacing 18,000 tons and costing \$2,000,000, is one of the fleet being constructed for the trade between San Francisco and Hong Kong, and sailing from Newport News she will make her way around The Horn, making but two stops before she reaches the Golden Gate City that is to be her home port. One of these stops, by the way, will be Montevideo, where Albert W. Swalm of Iowa is the United States consul, while the other will be Valparaiso, both being made for the purpose of re-coaling. When the battleship Oregon went around The Horn she made a record of being the largest warship that ever threaded that dangerous passage, and now the American shipbuilder will establish another world's record by sending the Korea around the same route, she being the largest vessel of commerce that ever attempted the trip.

Immediately upon arrival at San Francisco the Korea will sail upon her maiden voyage, making the first stop at Honolulu. After one day's tarry there the big vessel will sail for Yokohama, a distance of 3,400 miles, going from there to Hobe, a distance of 250 miles, from there through the inland sea to Nagasaki 400 miles from Nagasaki 422 miles to Shanghai, and from Shanghai the final 850 miles to Hong Kong. Remaining in Hong Kong twelve days, the Korea will then start on the homeward voyage, making the same stops on the return passage. Her sister vessel, the Siberia, is now nearing completion, and will soon join her in the service, giving the United States the two queens of the Pacific, and opening up an opportunity for the greater development of American trade and interests in the Orient. The Pacific ocean has a great future and the American capitalists evidently appreciate that fact.

SUMMER SCHOOLS FOR TEACHERS.

The long summer vacation is not a physical necessity to the teacher, as it is to the growing child. Teachers, as a rule, are not harder worked during the months of school than are men or women engaged in other gainful pursuits. On the contrary, the impression prevails that the average teacher has a "soft snap" in carrying a comfortable living. An annual vacation is undoubtedly necessary in order to relieve the irksomeness and strain of any occupation. It is also desirable from the employer's standpoint in order to make an employee's work most effective. But it is unnecessary in ordinary cases to spend two or three months in idleness every year in order to keep one's faculties sharp and keen, and the health of the toiler good. In such a climate as Western Oregon affords, one or two or three weeks' vacation ought to keep the person who takes reasonable care of himself during the months of labor in the pink of condition for work the year around. There is no overrating heat in summer, no extreme cold in winter to overtax the system. As a machine, the human body ought to yield as satisfying results in the strenuous life of today in this salubrious climate as can be produced anywhere on the globe.

WHAT JURY-BRIBERS NEED.

Seven jury-bribers, or the jurors purchased, have been found guilty in a Chicago court. One of the bribers was sent to the penitentiary, the others fined heavily, while the jurors got off by paying \$200 each. The facts in the case have not been sufficiently exploited to make them familiar, but there is a probability that the jurors were in some manner instrumental in bringing about the exposure.

The man who attempts to bribe a jury makes so direct and vicious an attack upon the whole mechanism of justice that he may reasonably be considered a public enemy. He is not

dom caught. When any one is caught it is apt to be the dupe of the briber. There can be no excuse advanced for this individual, either, and yet the man who takes the bribe is hardly so bad as the one who originates the plot and offers the temptation. The probability of finding out the truth is obvious. All parties to the transaction know the seriousness of the offense, and they are shrewd enough not to have any witnesses, who are not as deeply implicated as themselves. If charged with the crime they proceed upon the theory that they do not blacken their records by the addition of bribery, and with the greatest good cheer they swear to any condition of fancied facts as may seem to them profitable.

PUBLIC LAND IN OREGON.

There are 61,277,440 acres of land in Oregon. Of this 21,952,596 acres are owned by persons or private corporations, and 5,509,821 acres are included in Indian, forests and other reservations. Deduct this owned land and reserve land from the whole number of acres in the state, and the remainder represents the amount of public land in the state, subject to entry by citizens, which is 33,784,023 acres.

Old settlers will doubtless be astonished at the above figures, and stare with an incredulous smirk on their faces when told that not only 37 per cent of the public land, including the reservations, has been taken up, and that there now remains 63 per cent of the entire land surface of the state unappropriated, but government land. In all past years the location of a vast amount of public land in Oregon, with its many advantages, has also had some disadvantages to the people, in that it was the cause of an enormous drainage of money from the state. Notwithstanding the operation of the homestead law saved a very large sum of money from being taken from the state annually, yet the amount that has annually left Oregon for the United States treasury, as by purchase price of land bought in the state, has amounted to more than a quarter of a million dollars, or something over \$1 per capita for every man, woman and child in the state.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, the receipts at the United States land office in Oregon for land were \$364,741.47.

Under the irrigation law, recently passed, the money heretofore received by the United States for land sold in Oregon, instead of being carried out of the state, will be expended in building reservoirs, irrigating ditches and in otherwise reclaiming arid lands.

PREDICTS A SHORTAGE.

According to government reports, the wheat crop will be short. Markets continue to show no particular change from a local standpoint, the absence of any export business of moment and the winding up of the fiscal year detracting from interest in the situation, says the West Coast Trade. There was a certain amount of strength developed in Eastern speculative centers on the basis of a wet harvest and reported foreign crop shortages, which were reflected in 1/2 cent better prices by exporters, who now quote 65 1/2c for club and 66 1/2c for binnet, but the principal cause of spot business is on milling account. The bulk of binnet suitable for milling is well cleaned up throughout the Pacific Northwest, and a heavy premium has been exacted from the mills which seek to pick up a supply sufficient to keep them in operation until the new crop is harvested and available. All sorts of prices have been paid, with a range up to 70 1/2c at the top.

The Sacramento Bee's Annual of forty pages is a pictorial newspaper of the most cosmopolitan make-up and appearance and shows some of the sights by means of which California keeps before the eyes of the world. The life has contrasted Northern and Southern California in a most effective manner for the upper end of the state, as the public is constantly educated to forget that there is any portion of the state except distances above the Golden Gate. The Busy Bee shows its sting in a good natured way and demonstrates that in milling, mining, transportation, agriculture and horticulture it is the southern half that goes farthest in swelling the enormous total productivity of the state so as to attract attention of the world.

NOT A CAMPAIGN CRY.

The campaign being passed, it may be conceded that a demand for reform in the matter of salaries and fees of state officers means more than a campaign cry. This was the construction

placed upon it by some persons, and it was confidently predicted that nothing would come of it. We shall see. The members-elect to the legislature have promised this reform and the state officers have agreed to it. If it shall be neglected by them it is the duty of Governor Chamberlain to veto every appropriation bill that carries items for fees and perquisites, and put the responsibility upon the majority to pass it over his veto if it can. That will make the question acute so that people will understand it. It might be assumed that all these gentlemen meant to keep their word, as some of them were not now rising upon the other side.--Portland Journal, June 10.
