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DOES MUCH GOOD

Work of Greater Salem Commercial Club

What Has Been Accomplished in Eight Months' Time

An inspection of the finances and records of the Greater Salem Commercial Club reveals that the organization has been an active one. Its value to the business and industrial life of the Capital City has substantial evidence. That it has proved an effective commercial agency for promoting the every interest of the community, no one questions, and that it will in the future increase in usefulness is a natural conclusion, when the success of the past is taken into consideration. During its short life, the club has performed a valuable service in encouraging the production of flax, as a staple crop, by securing the location at Salem of a plant for performing the infatigable work of manufacturing flax fibre, that promises to eventually become a large linen mill of incalculable worth to the entire state. In addition to this, Salem and surrounding country, through the agency of this organization, has been advertised to an extent never before known.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club was organized on the evening of October 30th. It now has an active membership of 198. The club has suspended regular meetings until September, when the work in hand will be resumed and pushed forward vigorously. In the meantime, Secretary Judah has waived all compensation, but is attending to all correspondence and affairs concerning the club, that require immediate attention.

In its eight months' life, the club has collected in fees and subscriptions the sum of \$1109.95, of which an unexpended balance of about \$200 remains in the treasury. A statement of some of the principal expenditures follows:

The club, during the eight months held 17 meetings, while the executive committee was in session 13 times.

While the club, and more particularly the officers thereof, is very grateful to the general public, and directly to the public-spirited people of the city, for aiding in the work, and making possible the maintenance of the organization thus far, even greater encouragement is expected for the future that the organization may prove of even greater value in the work yet to be undertaken.

PORTLAND SOCIETY WOMAN

In the Hands of Custom House Officials

Caught Smuggling Silks and Embroideries

Mrs. H. D. Green, of Portland, one of the social leaders of the metropolis, who was a passenger on the Pacific Mail steamer Doric, which arrived in San Francisco Saturday from the Orient, had a lot of rich silks and embroideries seized by the custom house officers on the charge that she was attempting to smuggle them in. Mrs. Green had been visiting Manila, where her son, Ray Green, who went to the Philippines with the Oregon volunteers, is now living. The trouble grew out of an attempt on the part of Mrs. Green to avoid the payment of duties on a valuable importation of silks, embroideries and other wares, which she had collected in the Orient, and which were found ingeniously secreted in her baggage. Yards and yards of rich Oriental silks and embroideries of great worth were found sewed within the lining of dresses.

Mrs. H. D. Green, is the widow of the late H. D. Green, of Portland, who was president of the Portland Gas Company. He died several years ago, leaving his wife a large fortune. Mrs. Green is well connected in social circles in that city, and has made her home in the Portland hotel. Hal Green, a son, committed suicide some years ago by taking carbolic acid in a drink at the Hotel Portland bar, and left a large estate. A daughter married C. J. Reed, who is the head of the Columbia Implement Company, of Portland.
