CAN THE MAN BE MERRILL?

Supposed Fugitive Convict Is Under Arrest

Salem Officer Goes to South Bend to Identify Suspect

At 7 o'clock Wednesday evening Superintendent J. D. Lee, of the state penitentiary received from Sheriff Thomas Roney, of South Bend, Pacific county, Washington, the following telegram:

"Have man in jail, answers Merrill's description. Send man to identify at once. Answer."

Superintendent Lee replied that a man would be sent from Salem, that it might be ascertained if the man arrested in Merrill, Washington, J. T. Jones expects to leave for South Bend on the overland train this afternoon. Mr. Jones will reach South Bend some time Friday forenoon, and word from him concerning the identity of the suspect will be eagerly awaited.

Superintendent Lee says the failure of the arrested suspect to satisfactorily establish his identity, leads him to believe that the man under arrest at South Bend may be Merrill. Mr. Lee further stated that Merrill was not easily recognized from the description sent out, as he has few scars or other prominent marks of identification, and there was a possibility of Sheriff Roney being mistaken. The sending of a man from Salem for purposes of identification is necessary because not a member of the posse in Washington would recognize Merrill if he should be caught.

Had Planned Escape Before.
It has been learned that Tracy and Merrill planned an escape three years ago, and that 50 prisoners were in the plot. Had the scheme been kept secret, probably 50 or more prisoners would have left the penitentiary at that time, leaving behind them more than three dead guards. One of the prisoners gave the penitentiary officials a word of warning, and while the details of the plan were not learned, the escape was prevented. Tracy and Merrill were the ring leaders, and were kept in restraint for some time afterward. Profiting by experience, they took no one into their confidence in this adventure, but made their flight alone.

Men Who Hunted the Convicts.
E. S. Blesseker and Wood Carter, of Vancouver, who participated actively in the pursuit of Tracy and Merrill while the men were in the vicinity of Vancouver, were in Salem today. They were en route home from Lakeview, Southern Oregon, where they have taken up a timber claim. Blesseker and Carter were the young men who had a thrilling adventure with the two convicts near Vancouver about June 17th, or immediately after the first time passed into the state of Washington. The men had two fights with the convicts, and Blesseker was shot through the coat and dangerously near his side, after the horse he was riding had been wounded four times. Mr. Carter is the telegraph operator at Vancouver.

Another Move in Strike.
Chicago, July 10.—Contrary to expectations, the freight handlers' organization refused today to accept the terms offered by the railroads, and voted to continue the strike. Several hundred men declared they would not abide by the ruling, and returned to work. To offset this defection hundreds of freight to the depots, in answer to appeals by the strikers, turned their teams and drove back to their respective barns without unloading. This move created consternation among the big business men, which increased when the officers of the teamsters' union announced that the matter had become very serious, and that they found it impossible to hold their men back any longer.

TO BEAUTIFY MARION SQUARE

Band Stand and Stationary Seats Proposed

A Public Improvement That Commends Itself

Several of Salem's public spirited citizens have interested themselves in the beautifying of Marion square. It is a most commendable move, and the people of the Capital City, generally, hoped to see it pushed to a definite conclusion.

Excepting the stone steps to the several administration buildings, there is no public place in Salem where one may be seated for rest and outdoor recreation. It is needless to remark that the places mentioned are neither pleasant nor restful. The spacious and beautiful lawns surrounding the court house and state capitol building, are neither one provided with chairs or benches. This is something Salem needs. Few cities of any size, and particularly the seats of state governments, are to be found where these accommodations are not provided. Stationary seats in city park or public place afford an interesting and restful position for strangers, weary from sight-seeing, as well as citizens desirous of spending out-of-doors these delightful summer evenings.

An energetic committee has been formed upon the scheme which will be actively worked. Results may be expected, for the committee will not cease its efforts until the purpose undertaken has been accomplished. A subscription will be started with a few days, and by this means it is expected funds will be provided with which to do the work. The plan is to construct in Marion square a modern band stand, in which shall be given band concerts during the summer and fall seasons, and provide a number of stationary seats. The committee hopes to eventually be able to equip the square with a public drinking fountain, and in other directions add to the natural beauty of the property.

There will remain an unexpended balance of nearly \$400 in the Fourth of July fund, and it is suggested that this sum, or at least a part of it, be appropriated to the improvement of Marion square. The Fourth of July committee is understood to be favorable to the scheme, and will act jointly with the special committee that is soliciting subscriptions. Since the Fourth of July fund was raised for the express purpose of providing pleasure and entertainment, it would seem that the balance of the fund could be very appropriately given to the contemplated improvement of the square, since the money could probably not be spent in any other way that would be as generally appreciated by the public, as herein suggested.

It has been suggested that a part of the money be given to like improvements in Willson avenue, but there appears to be objections to this plan of action. First—a division of the money would defeat permanent improvements in either place, and secondly—if Willson avenue must be equipped as a city park, it is up to the city to make the necessary provision therefor. It might be well to undertake one thing at a time, and do it thoroughly before undertaking another.

DECREE FOR THE PUGHS

Judge Boise Makes Temporary Injunction Permanent

In the injunction suit of Joanna Pugh vs. John Hamilton, et al., Circuit Judge Boise this morning rendered a decision perpetuating the temporary injunction heretofore granted and awarded \$50 damages to plaintiff.

There was involved in the case a 31-acre tract of land located about five miles north of Salem. Mrs. Elizabeth Spicknall, mother of the plaintiff, owns a life interest in the land, in which Mrs. Pugh has an inherent interest, the property reverting to her upon the death of her mother. The defendant, John Hamilton, a son of Mrs. Spicknall, and a brother of the plaintiff, was charged with having cut and removed a large quantity of wood from the premises, and upon application of the plaintiff, he was enjoined from the work. Plaintiff asked for \$500 damages. The defendant claimed that in removing the timber he was only following the wishes of his mother, who desired the premises cleared. Plaintiff further asked that Mrs. Spicknall be made to forfeit her life interest to the estate, but on this question the court made no ruling. By the decree of the court the defendant is prohibited from further trespassing on the premises, the plaintiff, who was represented by Carson & Adams, is allowed \$50 damages and her costs and disbursements.

A divorce was granted Leona Lantis from Ward Lantis, on grounds of desertion.
David Mudge, aged 75 years, and residing near Chemawa, was committed to the insane asylum this morning.

TALKED ABOUT THE PAST

Congregationalists Continue Anniversary Service

Work of Church Socialists Reviewed—Banquet Tonight

The anniversary exercises held at the Congregational church Wednesday night were well attended. A piano solo by Miss Byrd was the opening number, followed by reading of the scripture by Rev. W. C. Kantner, from the original book of the church. After a prayer by Rev. Freedland, a former pastor of the church, a solo was rendered by Mrs. Purvine. Rev. Kantner read a sketch of the church from the time of its founding. The first Congregational meeting was held in the Central school house, which stood on the corner of Commercial and Mission streets, on July 4, 1852. At that time it had four charter members, Mrs. L. S. Williams, Mrs. A. M. Fellows and Mr. and Mrs. I. N. Gilbert. Some minutes were read, taken from the book of T. McF. Patton. The church used at that time is the residence building just south of the present church, the new church being dedicated on August 28, 1863. The Rev. P. S. Knight is one of the old workers of the church, and served as pastor for 17 years. A sketch of the history of the Sunday school was read by Supt. J. B. Tutthill. I. N. Gilbert was superintendent in 1854, and Sunday School was conducted only during the summer months. A donation was made for a Sunday School library, and some books were sent from Boston, Mass., and came around the horn to Frisco, and then to Salem. Mr. Tutthill then read some notes taken from the diary of Mrs. Adair. In 1869 T. McF. Patton was superintendent of the Sunday School, and the Rev. Thomas Condon, then of The Dailies, conducted communion services.

The Misses Hewitt and White favored the audience with a duet, and then a sketch of the Ladies-Aid Society was given by Mrs. D. J. Fry. Mrs. Kantner read a sketch of the Woman's Missionary Society, and an address was given by Mrs. M. D. Palmer, who was the first person baptized in the Salem church. Prior to 1848 there were only two Congregational churches in Oregon.

Clifford Kantner rendered a solo, followed by readings by Mrs. Stratton, and Mrs. Raymond, who is a daughter of Rev. Dickerson, the first Congregational pastor. The meeting was closed by the reading of several letters of commendation from different members of the church.
Banquet Tonight.
The exercises attending the fiftieth anniversary of the church, which have been in progress since Sunday, will conclude tonight with a banquet, which will be spread for the immediate members of the church and congregation, to which a ticket is required for admission. J. B. T. Tutthill will serve as toastmaster.

PRUNES WILL BE IN DEMAND

Already Contracts Are Made for Fall Shipment

Activity is Due to Organized Work By the Growers

Growers of prunes in this vicinity will be interested to know that there has already been an unprecedented sale of prunes in California for fall shipment out of the new crop, 20 per cent. of the very large crop now in sight reported already sold.

The unusual activity and low prices which are being made by the California packers has caused an unusual early inquiry for the Oregon product, and packers have been urged for some time past to name a price at which the 1902 crop may be sold for October and November shipment, but the price at which the California product is being sold does not offer much encouragement to the Oregon growers who have been looking forward to big prices, because of the light Oregon crop, and it is doubtful if there will be any great haste to make contracts at this time.

Oregon Prunes carefully prepared and attractively packed have created a demand for themselves in certain markets where they have been sold for the past two or three years, and we are advised that the Willamette Valley Prune Association, of this city, has sold quite a number of cars of their fancy "Pheasant" brand for early shipment at the same quotations as that of last year, namely 2 1/2 basis, or 5 1/2 cents for 30 lbs in 25-pound boxes. It will be remembered that growers who are members of this association received fully one-half cent more last season than the average market in this district.

We note from Santa Clara reports that the present low prices is stimulating the growers to more interest in organization, and they are rallying to the support of the associations, chiefly due to the influence of Col. Philo Hersey, of the Exchange, who has proved himself a veritable Moses to the prune growers of his community.

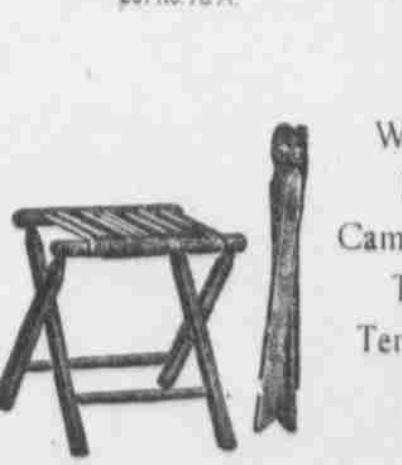
