MARION MUST EXHIBIT

Should Enter Into Competition with Other Counties

Greater Salem Commercial Club Will Co-operate

Shall Marion county be represented in the competitive county exhibits at the state fair this fall? Most emphatically, yes.

Secretary Wisdom's letter follows: "I wish to call your attention to the fact that we have been unable to interest any one in the matter of preparing a county exhibit for the state fair from Marion county."

"Now we do not wish to see Marion county out of this contest, and, as we have exhausted our resources in this direction, lay the matter before your club for its consideration. I do not believe it necessary to set forth the many reasons why Marion county should be represented."

"Please bring this matter before your club that Marion county may have an exhibit, for the fair board has done its best to interest some one in the matter. It really seems that Marion county is one county that should need no urging in a matter of this kind. Hoping you may be more successful in than we have been, I am etc."

The Commercial Club has disbanded until September, but Secretary Judah says the organization will gladly co-operate in the plan, and do anything in its power to have a creditable exposition of Marion county's resources at the fair in competition with the other counties. ALBANY NATIONAL GUARD

Encampment May Be Cancelled At Present

Such a Rumor at Salem But Denied by Adjt-General

Everything is in readiness for the annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard. The state militia has been called to be convened in brigade camp of instruction at Hackleman's grove, in the outskirts of Albany, next Thursday, July 17th, and the guards will remain in camp until the following Thursday, July 24th.

The encampment will include 18 companies of infantry, recruited to their maximum strength; Troop A, cavalry, of Lebanon, and Battery A, light artillery, of Portland. There will be about 1200 officers and men in camp.

The Portland, Oregon City, Woodburn and Salem companies will be taken to Albany on a special train, that will leave Portland at 8 o'clock Thursday morning. Salem will be reached about 6 o'clock. An excursion from Portland and intermediate points will be given by rail to Albany on Sunday, July 20, the only Sunday upon which the state guard will be in camp.

The officers of the Fourth regiment will all be mounted on fine large gray steeds, and the effect with the blue uniforms and shining accoutrements of the riders, will be pleasing.

An Officer Speaks. "The brigade encampment of the Oregon National Guard, that has been called to be held in Albany, July 17-24, inclusive, may be defeated. The reason for this possibility rests in the lack of available finances."

Funeral of Mrs McCulloch

The funeral services over the remains of the late Mrs. McCulloch were held at the home on Chomoketa and Fourteenth streets. The remains were taken to Polk county this afternoon for burial.

Mrs. Nancy Gist-McCulloch was born in Clinton county, Missouri, in 1833, and came to Oregon about 18 years ago. She lived on a farm near Dallas a number of years, and then moved to a farm near Turner, where she resided until four years ago, when the family came to Salem. She left five children in Missouri—James, Andrew, Arch, George and Benjamin—and three in Oregon—John W. McCulloch, who was a member of the legislature from Marion county in 1898-99, and who is now editor of the Malheur Gazette at Vale; Cecil McCulloch, who resides in this city, and John McCulloch, a teacher in the Salem public schools. The husband of the deceased, George W. McCulloch, died several years ago.

Deceased was a Christian woman of noble character, and leaves her country a heritage of well-reared sons and daughters.
