And that rare lumber camp dish is beaver tail soup."

"I was with Colonel Park of Columbus, O., deer hunting in the Rainy lake region of Michigan one fall. We lived at a lumber camp boarding shanty."

"There were signs of beaver at the upper end of the lake, and a trapper succeeded in trapping one of the wily dam builders."

"When the beaver was brought into camp, the camp cook went nearly wild, and so did the lumbermen when they heard the news, all because they had been trying to trap a beaver for weeks, not for its fur, but for its tail, as they were pining, they said, for beaver tail soup."

"The cook took that broad appendage of the beaver, mailed it in an emerald, took from it the underlying bone and meat, and from it made such a soup as never came from any other stock at the back of the most expert and scientific chef that ever put a kettle on."

"We could do the same thing and perhaps better on the Eastern Shore, but we lack one thing. We haven't got the beavers to yield us their tails."—New York Sun.
