MONTY & HARRISON

REFUSED TO CONSIDER THE CLAIMS

County Court Will Not Bear the Expense

Of Searching for Tracy and Merrill in Marion County

The Marion county court this morning refused to audit the claims, amounting to about \$240, that were contracted by individuals and the posse in the pursuit of Tracy and Merrill, the murderous convicts, while they were in this county. The claims were simply presented to the court for consideration. The claims were not regularly filed, as are bills against the county, and were informally considered by the court. The members of the court felt that the state should pay all expenses that were necessarily contracted in the search for the two convicts, who were charged with the state prior to committing the crimes that attended their escape.

A Portland special says: "The county is asked to pay the expenses, on the theory that the chase was for two murderers who had committed crimes in Marion county, and were wanted to answer for their acts. Marion county will take the view that Tracy and Merrill were escaped convicts; that they were pursued as such, and the expenses should be paid out of the state appropriation for that purpose."

"Sheriff Durbin, who had charge of the posse in the hunt for the fugitives, was asked in what capacity he acted—whether as sheriff seeking a man who had committed a crime, or as an agent of the penitentiary seeking an escaped convict. He replied that no warrant was issued for the arrest of either of the men, and he had no personal knowledge of their having committed a crime, so he could not have been seeking to arrest them for the murder of the guards. 'I went out at the request of Superintendent Lee, who told me to spare no expense that would assist in capturing the men,' continued Mr. Durbin, 'and there can be no doubt that the state should pay the expense. The men were committed to the state for safe keeping, and if they escaped they should pay for their recapture.'"

This is, in substance, the view of the matter that was taken by the county court. The expense item of the state guard for the three days' services will be about \$700, and the state will probably be asked to refund these amounts at the next legislative session.

CAMBRIA MINE HORROR

Known List of Dead Will Reach 125 Men

Johnstown, July 12.—After 15 hours' continuous exploration of the Klondike section of the Cambria mine, the company's officials announce that the main headings have all been penetrated. The dead list reaches 105, with a possibility that a few bodies are still in out of the way places in the mine. The list, at the outside, will hardly reach 125. Fifteen bodies were brought up at 3 o'clock this morning.

Three of the men rescued Friday died this morning, and three more are not expected to survive the day. At 10 o'clock the total number of bodies recovered was 124.

Johnstown, July 12.—A general belief is current here that the mine officials are trying to conceal the enormity of the disaster. It is thought the list of the dead will be over 200. This opinion is based on the fact that 27 rooms in the heart of the explosion district have not yet been explored. It is feared that the explosion center proper has not yet been reached, and that more gruesome finds are yet to be made. Fifty victims were buried this morning.

POINTERS ON MANICURING

When the nails are fragile, a little wax and almond rubbed upon them will strengthen them. If brittle, a little almond oil or cold cream will be found beneficial.

To remove white spots from the nails use a mixture of refined pitch and a little myrrh upon them at night, wiping off the next morning with olive oil.

When about to manicure the hands, dip the fingers into warm, soapy water and hold them there for a minute or two in order to soften the nails and the scurf about them.

The scurfiness should be gently pushed back from the nail before they are polished. It should never unless absolutely necessary be cut with the scissors.

Angels, improperly called hangnails, may be prevented by proper attention to the scurfiness which surrounds the nails.

For manicuring only a pair of curved nail scissors, a nail file, an orange stick, a chamomile polish, a bottle of vasoline and a box of rose salve or nail powder are necessary.—Mary E. Walker, M. D., in Ladies' Home Journal.

RECORD PRICE REACHED

15,000 Pounds 1902 Hops Are Contracted At 17c

The record price for contract hops of the 1902 crop has been reached in Marion county.

A contract for 15,000 pounds of this year's crop at 17 cents, given by Joe Goe, a Chinaman, in favor of Hugh F. Cox, of New York, was filed at the court house this morning. While this is the highest price that has been recorded on contracts in this county, Lilienthal Bros. are offering 18 cents for 1902 hops by contract. The contract business is nearly at an end. Most growers that will have contracted and others will hold their crop.

ONE TRUST ABOLISHED.

Farmers Can Provide Their Own Mail Boxes After This.

Washington, July 12.—At last the postoffice department has consented to break up the iniquitous "14 box-makers' trust." This is a combination of 14 manufacturing firms, which have had a concession from the department to be the exclusive purveyors of rural free delivery boxes to the farmers.

Only certain styles of boxes were permitted by the department, and these manufacturers had a monopoly of these styles. No competition was permitted. The farmers had to buy boxes of a certain approved pattern, and they had to pay the certain approved prices set by the trust. Hereafter anyone may compete, so long as the boxes meet certain requirements prescribed by the authorities.

For a New Brick Block

August Schreiber this afternoon awarded to Welch & Mourer, of this city, the contract for building a two-story brick, 60x80 feet, with concrete basement, on State street, adjoining the Klingler building on the East. The bids were opened secretly, and the amount of the successful bid was not announced. Welch & Mourer, the successful bidders, also have the contract for the Klingler building.
