LORD SALISBURY HAS RESIGNED

Chancellor of the Exchequer Also Lays Down His Portfolio

Arthur J. Balfour Succeeds As Prime Minister of England

The King's Health Rapidly Improving and He Leaves London on the Royal Yacht

Lord Salisbury, premier of Great Britain, has resigned. Minister of Finance Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, has also resigned.

London, July 14.—Today's official bulletin says King Edward continues to progress satisfactorily. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, resigned today.

The Steamer Jeanie Arrived. Victoria, July 14.—The steamer King to Go Aboard Yacht. The progress of King Edward toward recovery is maintained, and it is understood that he will be transferred to the royal yacht Victoria and Albert at Portsmouth at noon Tuesday.

Lord Salisbury Resigns. London, July 14.—The fact of the resignation of the premiership of Great Britain by Lord Salisbury, as foreshadowed in the dispatches, was officially given out last evening.

Other Changes Certain. The change in the premiership will involve other ministerial changes. As no office is vacant except that of the keeper of the privy seal, the present cabinet can carry on work as long as necessary, and, as Mr. Balfour has accepted no new office, he will not have to present himself to his constituents for re-election.

It is learned that the annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard will be held at Albany, anyway. Any controversy as to the lack of funds and other financial troubles will receive subsequent consideration.

Conservatives met at the foreign office today, and Balfour, the newly-appointed premier, was cheered. He made a short speech, and stated that he fully depended on the cordial support of his followers.

Venetian Tower Collapsed. Venice, July 14.—The detached bell tower of St. Mark's church, about 220 feet high, collapsed this morning and fell with a great crash into the plaza.

Absolutely nothing of a reliable nature had been received by any deputy in the field since the trail was lost at the Protant home on Friday afternoon.

For a time the several posses comforted themselves with the assurance that the fugitive's physical condition would at least operate to prevent his leaving the vicinity, and that at last overcome by the pangs of hunger and his well-known yearning for the society of some human being, he would reveal his presence.

The suspense, however, was broken, when, shortly after dark last night, Sheriff Cuddehe received a message from Eumelaw, saying that a boy on the road three miles from that place had met a man carrying a rifle, who inquired the distance to Buckley.

The information was telegraphed to ex-Sheriff Woolery, in charge of the posse at Eumelaw, by Sheriff Hartman, of Pierce county, and also Deputy McKillen, at Buckley.

Woolery and five guards procured a team as soon as possible and went to Eumelaw with the bloodhounds. They were placed on the trail and followed it for three-quarters of a mile.

It was very dark when the bloodhounds were thrown off the scent at the swamp, and, after a consultation, the posse decided to cover all the possible avenues of escape and wait until daylight before trying to follow the trail farther.

The instant the bloodhounds struck the scent they strained at the leash and bayed in a manner indicative of being on the trail of the convict.

The description given by young Burke, without the behavior of the hounds, shows plainly that Tracy has once again been located.

It is believed that he is directly working back towards Tacoma, in the hope of boarding a moving train.

The officers unite in saying that for the first time since the convict was believed to be in a death trap at the Green river bridge, they again have him where the outlook for his capture is excellent.

Not only was the cordon about the outlaw Saturday night regarded as very strong, but the men are determined to capture or kill him.

Orders have been sent out to search all trains at points where Tracy might attempt to board them.

TRACY THE TERROR

Holds a Hill Since Last Saturday

Posses Nor Dogs Can Force Him Out

Details of His Movements Since Last Reports

Seattle, Wash., July 14.—Tracy was seen this morning at Muckleshoot Hill, six miles east of Auburn, close to where he was Saturday evening. He is not lame as reported.

Up to Sunday night, forty-eight hours had elapsed since the fugitive outlaw had been sighted, and this circumstance confirmed the belief that he was badly wounded, and nursing his wounds in the depths of some impenetrable forest.

Not since he landed at the little peninsula north of Ballard on the night of July 24, has Tracy failed to leave some positive clue to his trail.

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AGAINST LAWS OF WAR

Chaffee Comments on Major Waller's Acts

Opposed to the Findings of the Court Martial

Change of Division Commander in the Philippines

Washington, July 14.—The findings in the cases of Major Waller and Lieut. Day, and General Chaffee's comments thereon, were made public today.

Chaffee finds that the evidence is opposed to the findings of the court-martial, which acquitted the officers. He says the execution of the natives by Waller is opposed to all laws of war, but partially excuses the act on the ground of the condition of Waller's men at the time of the commission.
