A RAILROAD COMMISSION.

The Portland papers are being filled with stuff about the wonderful advantages of having a railroad commission in Oregon.

Oregon is about the last state in the Union that needs a railroad commission. The state tried one for ten years, and was involved in constant litigation and political controversy.

Oregon has almost none but interstate transcontinental railroads, over which a state railroad commission has very little control. With politics dictated from one large city, no commission could be secured that would not be controlled by the very corporations sought to be controlled.

With all the great railroads going into great trusts and under combinations, there is still less hope of any state commission being effective.

For instance, one syndicate owns all the roads and steamboat lines in Western Oregon. When they become oppressive their business will decline, and their own self-interest dictates liberal policies.

The business man can far better rely on getting justice out of the managers of large properties than he can hope to get relief from a few politicians or lawyers on a railroad commission.

Oregon should be, and doubtless will be treated fairly and liberally by the transportation corporations without a commission. At least there has been no complaint from business men. Until there is a general complaint on the part of shippers, the commission scheme is a political job.

ROOSEVELT IN PITTSBURG.

President Roosevelt delivered an address at Pittsburgh, Penn., much of which will commend itself to thinkers. Speaking of Cuba, he said:

"Our policy towards Cuba has not yet met with its entire fruition. It will meet with it. The courts of the last few years has made more evident than ever before that this nation must, in time to come, have pecuniary interests on the isthmus connecting the two Americas and in the waters and among the islands adjacent thereto."

Nationally, we cannot occupy the position toward these regions that we did towards others where our interests are far less, and it is doubly true now that congress, with great wisdom, has provided for the building of an inter-ocean canal.

"Cuba must occupy a peculiar relation to us in the field of international politics. She must, in the larger sense, be a part of the general political system in international affairs of which the republic stands at the head. She has assented to that view, and in return this nation is bound to give her special economic privileges not given to other nations."

"I regret that a measure of reciprocity with Cuba is not already embodied in statute or treaty, but it will be, just as sure as fate."

The president is to be pardoned for his zeal and enthusiasm on the subject, but when he grows confident and insists that his ideas and the ideas of the nation in dealing with Cuba will be carried into effect, while Republicans dominate both houses and the sugar trust dominates the Republicans, he is mistaken as sure as fate.

ABOUT WORLD'S FAIRS.

The Waterville, N. Y. Times says: The city of Buffalo wanted a big fair or exhibition, and they had it. Meeting with financial loss they want the government or taxpayers, which is the same thing, to make up a good share of the deficit. Congress has just appropriated a half million dollars to pay the debt of the Pan-American exposition. There was no public demand for the Buffalo exposition and there is a strong feeling abroad that the exposition enterprise is very much overdone. The one at Charleston last winter was a huge financial failure, simply because the public had gotten tired of such things. The St. Louis World's Fair was put over until 1904 because it followed too closely upon the Charleston Fair. If cities and different parts of the country insist upon inviting disaster it should be allowed them to knock at the government treasury door to make good their losses. It is not at all probable that if money were made on these enterprises it would be turned into the country's treasury. Why then should losses be paid? As an echo of the appropriation made to Buffalo, congress, just before it adjourned, answered the appeal of the Southern members to help the stockholders in the Charleston exposition out of their difficulties by voting \$250,000 to them.
