SUPPLIES FOR THE PRISON

Contracts for Ensuing Six Months Are Awarded

Superintendent J. D. Lee, of the state penitentiary, has awarded the contract for furnishing the prison supplies for the ensuing six months. Where the award for any one class of supplies is divided among several bidders, the various bids were segregated and the awards by article were made to the lowest bidder. With the exception of flour, all supplies advertised for have been contracted. The bids for flour are still under consideration. They were as follows:

THREE MONTHS' WORK

Receipts From Prison Stove Foundry Were Large

But for the confusion that resulted in the escape of Tracy and Merrill, which interrupted for several days the operation of the stove foundry at the penitentiary, the receipts from that department for the three months ending June 30th, would have been the largest in the life of the foundry. This fact is revealed in the quarterly report of Superintendent Lee, which was filed with Gov. Geer this afternoon. The receipts from the foundry for the period covered in the report amounted to \$3531.15, while the expenses of the prison, other than the salary account, which amounted to \$4814.66, aggregated only \$4287.53.
