CITY WILL INSPECT THE SITES

Plan to Acquire Water Power Not Been Abandoned

Investigation Will Be Resumed in September

The purpose of the Salem city council to inspect, with a view to purchasing, water power sites, as voiced at a regular meeting of the municipal legislators last spring, has by no means been abandoned.

It will be remembered that after an exhaustive discussion of the subject, the council several weeks ago referred the matter to a special committee, of which Alderman Griswold is chairman, with instructions to investigate all available water power sites within a radius of thirty miles of Salem, ascertain the cost of purchasing the same, and the capacity of each, and report to the city council.

Secretary James Winstanley, of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association, is in receipt of advice from London to the effect that all old hops have been cleared up, and that the English crop for 1902 will not exceed one-fourth of an average crop.

1901 HOPS SOLD FOR 20 CENTS

Firm Realizes Big Figure for Old Holdings

Many Are Being Contracted At Above Price

A. Wolf and son, of Silverton, on Monday afternoon purchased a Salem hop agency 50 bales of 1901 hops at 20 cents.
