TOO QUICK FOR THE SHERIFF

Wily Outlaw Left Cabin Unobserved

Posse Was Guided to the Spot By Former Convict

Thought That Sheriff Is Victim of a Hoax

Cudihee Still Confident.

Seattle, Wash., July 18.—Sheriff Cudihee returned to Seattle last night, and says he will rejoin his guards today at Ravensdale. He believes Tracy is not far from the shack where he had him surrounded yesterday. He says Tracy is too badly wounded to travel far or fast, and is still confident of his capture in this county.

Sheriff Cudihee is Hopeful

(Seattle Star Special to Capital Journal.)

Seattle, Wash., July 18.—Sheriff Cudihee returned to Seattle last night to look up the records of "Tattoo Red" and ex-convict Simmons, who are with Tracy. He says he is not discouraged, but disappointed over the escape from the cabin on Sawyer lake yesterday. He returned this afternoon to Sawyer lake, which will be headquarters of his operations, and from which the picked guards are working. The sheriff says that he was informed positively that Tracy's wound is serious. He has a badly lacerated hip, which makes each step painful. The sheriff says he is not more than two miles distant from the scene of yesterday's operations, and will be captured or killed before he gets beyond the confines of Kings county. He places no credence in the stories that his flight is toward Gold Hill. He believes even the iron nerve of the fugitive can not long withstand the terrible physical pain of the wound. Tracy told a stool pigeon all he required to escape was courage and fortitude, hence was positive he would get away.

Grand Rush on House.

Ravensdale, Wash., July 18.—At a given signal, Sheriff Cudihee and all hands made a grand rush for the cabin and burst inside, only to find that Harry Tracy had ever been in the occupant he had flown. A smoldering fire gave mute evidence that some human being had recently frequented the premises, and a linen rag, upon which two members of the posse claim to have detected faint blood stains, was found inside the cabin. The shack is situated on the side of a swamp, where wood is scarce, and a piece of flooring appeared to have been whittled for use as kindling.
Dumbfounded at the discovery that their plans had miscarried, the posse determined upon a last resort, and Guard Carson, with his bloodhounds, was hastily brought out from Covington. The dogs were permitted to cast in all directions from the cabin in an effort to recognize the outlaw's tracks, but without avail, neither of them giving any indication that Tracy had been about the premises. Sheriff Cudihee had again failed to realize his hopes, and, with the full knowledge of the situation and conflicting reports at hand tonight regarding the outlaw's movements, the question is still paramount, where is Convict Harry Tracy?

James Says Tracy's Capture Is Assured
Warden J. T. James returned from Washington, where he has been for a

week for the purpose of aiding Sheriff Cudihee in the capture of Tracy. Mr. James declined to say anything for publication regarding the new plans of Sheriff Cudihee, except that, from what he knows, of the plans, he is of the opinion that the capture of Tracy is more probable than it has been heretofore.
Mr. James was in Seattle several days, looking around to see what the ex-convicts are doing. He says he saw quite a number of former inmates of the Oregon penitentiary, and has no doubt that many of them have been ready to help Tracy at any opportunity. Seattle seems to be the rendezvous of more Oregon convicts than are any of the Oregon towns. Mr. James has been connected with the penitentiary for many years, and, therefore, knows a large number of the men who have served terms in the Oregon state prison.

COLD BLOODED MURDER

Delegate to Republican Convention Kills Another

Spokane, July 18.—Without warning or apparent provocation, Gust Anderson, a street railway employee, last night fired three shots into Edward Fagerstone, one of the proprietors of the Western House. Fagerstone died instantly. Both men were delegates to the Republican convention, to be held today. Anderson had been drinking and abusing his wife. She had fled for her life, and Anderson was evidently laboring under the notion that Fagerstone had concealed her, though Mrs. Anderson and friends of the murdered man say Fagerstone was not even acquainted with her. After committing the crime Anderson fled to another hotel, and when the police entered the room the homicide tried to fire on them. He was taken, fighting desperately, to the city jail.

WANTS \$20,000 DAMAGES

Portland Man Sued By His Former Wife

Portland, July 18.—D. W. Tilford, who about a year ago married Sarah M. Kearney, the wealthy widow of Edward Smith Kearney, has been sued by his former wife, Elizabeth Tilford, for \$20,000 damages. The papers were filed in the state circuit court yesterday.

Mrs. Tilford states that she was the wife of Tilford for 18 years, residing with him at Wichita, Kan., and other places. She asserts that he went to Oklahoma and quietly obtained a divorce from her, but did not do so, and instead deceived her. She sets forth in her complaint that in Newton, Kan., in 1899 she agreed to marry him at his request, and, relying upon his promise incurred expenses at his solicitation which she would not otherwise have incurred, amounting to the sum of \$2000; that she supplied him with money and jewelry, no part of which has been returned, except a diamond ring. It is alleged that the defendant, contrary to his promise, married Sarah M. Kearney, who is said to be distantly related to him.

Order of A.O.H. Flourishing

Denver, July 18.—President Keating delivered the annual address at today's session of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, in which he said the order is now the strongest Catholic organization in the world. He urged the teaching of Irish history in parochial schools and the maintenance of neutrality toward other Catholic organizations. The finances of the order are in good condition.

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LONDON SOCIETY WOMAN

Granted a Divorce for an Actress

The Coronation Procession Being Enacted

Negotiations With the Pope Over the Friars

London, July 18.—Lady de la War was today granted a divorce from her husband on grounds of desertion and misconduct. She named a prominent American actress as co-respondent in the original complaint, but later withdrew this charge.

London, July 18.—The coronation procession, which will be between Buckingham palace and Westminster, was rehearsed this morning. Eight horses drew a heavy drag, representing the royal coach.

Rome, July 18.—The Vatican's answer to the last American note on the question of the friars and their lands in the Philippines, merely expressed satisfaction at the cordial relations exhibited between Washington and the Vatican, and hoping that the negotiations, which will be continued in Manila will be equally satisfactory.

A Dominican's Opinion.
Father Santiago Pava, provincial of the Dominicans to the Philippines, who is staying here, when informed by the correspondent of the Associated Press of the result of Governor Taft's negotiations with the Vatican on the subject of the friars and their lands, expressed satisfaction at the acceptance of the first proposal of Cardinal Rampolla, the papal secretary of state, that the matter be discussed at Manila between apostolic delegate and the governor in Manila. When asked what was likely to be the outcome, Father Pava said:

"It is more important to know what will be the outcome of the matters between the Americans and the Philippines. Although the war is almost over, and the Philippines now profess friendship for the Americans, they in reality dislike them just as they disliked the Spaniards. The Filipinos say they did not struggle against Spain to calmly surrender their independence."

Father Pava concluded by declaring that it was true that the people were against the friars. The latter, he further asserted, were hated only by the native clergy and a fraction of the people.

Romance Connecting Alice Roosevelt. Philadelphia, July 18.—A special to the North American, from Cooperstown, N. Y., says that there is a rumor there that connects the name of Lieut. Robert Clark, son of the fiancée of Bishop Potter, and the richest man in the army, with that of Alice Roosevelt, in the story that three of Mr. Clark's sons are soon to be married.
