STATE PRISON REFORM.

The kindly and humane features of Supt. Lee's administration are commendable, and he has been given a great amount of praise on the score of humanity. But there is another side.

A state prison is not a Sunday School, nor a place to take it easy, and the chances are that the prisoners will never again have as easy a time as they have had under Mr. Lee.

The outbreak of Tracy and Merrill shows that there is great improvement to be made in the gun service, and the guards by day and night need strengthening.

The policy of jailing Mrs. Waggoner down to the lowest limit is a mistake. The state of Oregon should have paid liberally and promptly for the return of Merrill's body.

The reward for Tracy and Merrill should now all be put on Tracy, and this state should do at least as much as Washington, where, when he had killed one man, a reward was immediately offered of \$2500.

State prison reform requires swift and prompt retribution for law-breakers, in the pen as well as out of it. That is the only way to establish order and discipline, and enforce the laws.

The Journal believes that the fact of Mrs. Waggoner having been refused that reward offered for Merrill, dead or alive, will have a tendency to dishearten the pursuers of Tracy.

There is no doubt that Governor Geer, upon his return, will deal promptly and energetically and liberally with the situation. On the verge of Tracy's capture is no time to quibble over reward money.

ORGANIZED CRIME.

The New York Journal, commenting on the political situation in Pennsylvania, and the hopes of the Democracy to win in the coming campaign, has the following:

The Democrats of Pennsylvania have nominated for governor Robert E. Patton on a platform which ignores national issues. The party declares that "while we act today as a political organization in presenting this platform and our candidates, we seek no partisan advantage or victory."

Pennsylvania is overwhelmingly Republican. The Democrats, as Democrats, would have no chance of winning.

But though Pennsylvania is overwhelmingly Republican — McKinley's plurality was 288,432 — there are many Republicans who refuse to recognize the Quay machine as the Republican party.

The politics and government of Pennsylvania are rotten through and through. Based on ballot-box stuffing a system of corruption has been reared which excites the wonder of other communities. "Every department of our state government," says the Democratic platform, "is honey-combed with profligacy, dishonesty and a reckless disregard of constitutional and moral obligations; the powers of government are prostituted to the purpose of public bribery."

That is not partisan exaggeration, but a statement of notorious fact. Mr. Patton twice within twenty years has been elected governor of his state, and standing now upon a platform which waves aside politics and makes the issue between common honesty and organized crime, there should be a fair prospect of success.

The recent men of Pennsylvania are offered an opportunity to unite against Quayism, which, when not wholly occupied in stuffing ballot-boxes, relies upon blind party spirit to keep it in power.

THE EVILS OF LETTER WRITING. The ancient Romans had a motto which reads "Littera scripta manet," which being interpreted, means "what is written abides," and indicates that Roman politicians were as wary as our own. The American version of these sentiments is, "Travel a thousand miles rather than write a letter."

General E. S. Briggs, of Wisconsin, now consul-general at Havana, is a veteran politician of more than 30 years, even to his wife, that "Uncle Sam might as well try to make a white (out of a pig's tail as to do anything with the Cubans." While the consul general's report was not "official," it will doubtless serve to render him persona non grata in exclusive Cuban circles, and expose him to some danger of a fusillade of overripe bananas from the Cuban proletariat when he appears on the streets. One, however, cannot but admire his choice of a wife so innocent of political guile as not to understand the damage possible to be done by the unauthorized publication of the private letters of public officials.

The Wisconsin Republican state platform last time promised the people direct nomination. They failed to keep that pledge, and this year the party has to fight for its life.
