Another Official Visits Chemawa

J. H. Dortch, of Washington, D. C., visited the Salem Indian training school, at Chemawa, on Thursday. Mr. Dortch is the official head of the Education Bureau of the Department of Indian Affairs. He was called to San Francisco, on official business, and stopped off at Chemawa for a short visit, while en route home. This was the first visit of Mr. Dortch to the Pacific coast, and he spoke in complimentary terms of the Chemawa school. MORE HOPS AT 20 CENTS

Another 30,000 Pound Contract in New York

Lillenthal Bros., of New York, have contracted for George W. and Clara E. Chase, of Butteville, 30,000 pounds of the 1902 crop of hops at 20 cents per pound.

The following clipping from the Waterville (N. Y.) Times reveals a dismal outlook for the hop crop of the Empire state:

"Various speculation is heard regarding the yield in this state. It was thought soon after the May freeze that the yield would be greatly lessened in consequence, but there was hope that the vine would outgrow the injury to a great extent. Then came an unfavorable weather, and it continued so long that there is now no longer hope for even half a crop.

"Joe Loewl, a member of a prominent hop firm of New York, was here this week. He said that before he visited the hop section he couldn't believe the stories heard, but was soon convinced. He went through portions of Schoharie, Otsego and Oneida counties, and admits that it is the poorest outlook he has ever seen.

"If growers had their 1901 hops now they could get a good price for them. A dealer here this week sold a lot to another dealer for 25 cents. The hop market reports in New York still keep them down to 24 cents. Good hops would be gobbled up quick at 2 cents better than that price."

Not a Tree or Bush At Camp Albany

Encampment N. G. Will Be Cut Down Two Days

(Journal Special Correspondence.) Albany, July 17.—The Third regiment and three companies of the Fourth regiment arrived here about noon, and proceeded to the camp ground, which is about 1½ miles from the city. The remainder of the Fourth regiment arrived about 4:30. Everything is progressing slowly, and it will take all day to get things straightened out and running smoothly. The grounds are large, but there is not a bush or tree to be seen, and the sun pours down on the tents, making the inside as hot as ovens.

There will be no drills today, excepting guard mount, which takes place at 5 o'clock this evening.

Each regiment has a band, and fine music is had to march by.

The regular form of drill will take place tomorrow morning at 5 o'clock, and will be the same every day we are here. A large crowd is expected to be here on Sunday, and a pleasant day is assured.

Encampment Cut Short.

General Beebe stated last evening that, owing to a shortage in the state military fund, the encampment would probably be cut down two days, (as The Journal has stated) the men leaving here on Tuesday, July 22d, instead of Thursday, as was expected. The question is not fully decided yet, but it is to be hoped that a transfer of funds can be made, so as to enable the camp to be maintained until Thursday.

Colonel James Jackson, inspector-general, and General C. U. Gantenbein, adjutant-general, will arrive at noon today, and be present at the camp.

Lieutenant-Colonel C. A. Williams, of the 17th U. S. Infantry, has been detailed by the war department to inspect the camp, and report to the department. He is at the camp, and will remain until the close.

Visitors are always welcome at the camp between the hours of 5 a. m. and 9:45 p. m. The entrance is directly west of the Orphan's Home.
