JUST AFTER THE BATTLE

Intense Heat and Stony Camp Ground Provokes the Private So He Gets Inside the Guardhouse

Albany, July 19th. Everything is quiet at Camp Williams. The hot weather seems to have taken the life out of the militiamen. The announcement that there is only going to be a six-day's encampment has caused but very little comment among the guards, although there is some talk among the officers of both regiments asking for volunteers to remain two days longer, without pay. It is very doubtful whether any of the men will stay. Sergeant A. Munson, of Salem, Company F, has been appointed regimental color bearer for the Fourth regiment. A grand military ball was given at the armory on Friday night, and was largely attended by officers and members of the guards. The boys are orderly at all times, although there have been quite a number in the guard house.

There are several busses running from camp to town, and during the day and evening the town is overflowing with soldiers. After a two-hours' hard drill in the hot sun today, Major Leabo treated the first battalion of the Fourth regiment to some ice-cold lemonade, which was highly appreciated by the men, as the drinking water is very warm, and not refreshing. Friday evening Major Williams, of Portland, was here to review the troops, and was driven in a carriage with General Summers.

The heat has been so intense that a number of the men have been sun struck during drills. The drilling grounds are something awful. It is so rough that it is almost impossible to march. Saturday evening about two-thirds of the men were out of the lines after taps, and all the officers available were kept on the alert. A great number were caught and sent to the guard house. CROP WILL BE LIGHT Prune-Growers Expect 40 per Cent Decrease in Yield. At a meeting of the stockholders of the Willamette Valley Prune Association, and other prune growers, held last Saturday afternoon the consensus of opinion was that the prune crop in this vicinity will only be 60 per cent of last year's crop. Hill orchards are full, but lowland orchards are very short. The winter's prune crop, it is believed, will be less than last year. A number of growers joined the association, and it is believed that the quantity of fruit controlled by the association will be as great as last year. H. S. Gilie was re-elected manager. No action was taken toward fixing the price for this year's crop.
