FOR PRISON SUPT. AT SALEM.

Henry Downing's friends are confident that he will receive consideration at the hands of the Chamberlain administration in his candidacy for superintendent of the state prison.

STATE GUARD RETURNS

Albany Encampment Was Disbanded Tuesday Morning

The annual encampment of the O. N. G., at Albany, was disbanded this forenoon, and the citizens-soldiers, sun-burned and covered with dust, returned to their homes by train. The first of the guardsmen to return home were Companies A, of Baker City; B, of La Grande, and D, of The Dalles. They passed through Salem in three extra coaches that were attached to the regular Albany local this morning. A special train that carried the remainder of the troops left Albany shortly after 2 o'clock. Salem was reached about 3 o'clock, and the members of Company F were glad to dismount from the train, and proceed to the armory, where they shed their uniforms and luggage, and once more returned to the dress of civilians. The boys all rejoice that the life of the encampment was reduced to six days.

MARION COUNTY SCHOOLS

Decrease in School Population the Past Year

The annual report of County School Superintendent E. T. Moore, of Marion county, has been received by State Superintendent Ackerman. The report shows that the school population during the past year has fallen off from 9795 to 9386, with a corresponding decrease in the enrollment from 6342 to 5878. The average daily attendance has dropped from 4889 to 4657. The receipts for the school year, 1901-02 were \$129,843.95, with expenditures for the same period of \$191,321.72 as against \$118,393.82 receipts, and \$192,215.23 expenditures for the preceding year.

The average salary of male teachers has advanced from \$14.85 to \$15.15, while there has been a slight reduction in the average salary paid female teachers, the average being dropped from \$37.28 to \$35.11.
