The war department has been advised of the sailing of the transport Crook from Manila, July 18th, with 365 enlisted men of the Twenty-fifth Infantry, and 10 prisoners.
Fred Precuavilla, driver for a dairy ranch, near Butte, Mont., was thrown from his seat beneath his wagon and instantly killed. Two wheels of the vehicle passed over his breast, crushing him fearfully.

Fire in Grain Field.

Pendleton, Or., July 22.—A field of wheat belonging to A. L. Knight, a renter of land on the Umatilla reservation, caught fire yesterday afternoon from sparks from a combined harvester, and before the flames could be checked 30 acres of wheat were destroyed. But for the presence of a large number of laborers, the fire would have been disastrous. As it was, it took four hours to stay the fire, which was accomplished by plowing a number of furrows around it. The loss is about \$600, covered by insurance. The combined harvester was saved with difficulty.

A hot wind prevailed here all day, and while it did not do much damage in the way of shriveling the wheat, it shattered the ripe grain to some extent, increasing the damage done by the wind storm of a week ago. As evidence of the injury done by the wind storm, a field of wheat which belonged to John Crew, a Umatilla reservation farmer, and which was estimated to give 35 bushels, turned out only 17 1/2 bushels to the acre when it was harvested yesterday.

Boy Crushed to Death by Log.

Drain, Or., July 22.—Frank, the 12-year-old son of Joel Tracy, a farmer living three miles north of here, was instantly killed yesterday, while assisting an employee of his father in hauling piling timber from the woods to the railroad track. The team had just started a log, which caught the boy. It rolled entirely over him, crushing his skull, and causing instant death.

MORE RANGERS APPOINTED

Additional Guardians of the Forest Named by Hermann

Secretary Hitchcock, of the department of the interior, upon the recommendation of Commissioner Binger Hermann, has appointed nine additional rangers for service this year on the Oregon forest reserve. The last appointees were: John A. W. Heldeke, Detroit; B. Gates Cochran, Salem; E. G. White, Salem; A. L. Morris, Harrisburg; Newton J. Ferrell, Salem; G. W. Taylor, Macleay; Wm. H. Healdman, Mint; Henry Foster, Sisters; and Ephraim Hennessy, Detroit. The men have not yet been assigned districts, but it is presumed their instructions will accompany their commissions.

Under the new system of caring for the forest reserve of the state, Oregon was divided into two districts, each district to be guarded by 25 rangers. Only 23 rangers have thus far been announced, and if the original plan is adhered to, other appointments may be expected soon.

ANOTHER STORE IS BURGLARIZED

Longcor's Second-Hand Store Entered Monday Night.

Another burglary was perpetrated Monday night. The second-hand store of E. C. Longcor, at No. 173 State street, was visited, and, among the articles carried away were two new 22-calibre rifles, a new 22-calibre revolver, about 500 cartridges, a pocket knife, razor and about a dozen rings. It is believed the burglars entered the store room through a side window, that had been left partly open. The case has been reported to the police, who are making an investigation.

For Annual State Fair Meet This Fall

Board of Agriculture Plans Additional Improvements

The State Board of Agriculture is in session in Salem, and expects to conclude its work and adjourn this evening. There is a full attendance of the board, which includes President W. H. Wehrung, of Hillsboro; Secretary M. D. Wisdom, of Portland; J. H. Settlemier, of Woodburn; Jasper Wilkins, Colburg; George Chandler, Baker City; President Wehrung, Secretary M. D. Wisdom and Hon. J. H. Settlemier, of the State Board of Agriculture, are in the city in the interest of the annual state fair, to be held September 15 to 20th.

GEORGE'S PLURALITY IS 276

Revised Figures Give Chamberlain 20 More Votes

Total Ballot on Governor Was 90,692.

An unofficial abstract of the votes cast for governor at the general election, held June 2d, gives Chamberlain the people's governor-elect, a plurality of 276 votes, instead of 256, as has heretofore been published. The abstract was compiled from statements furnished by the county clerks of the various counties of the state from the official abstracts filed in their offices.
