WHERE THE FAULT LIES.

The East Oregonian says almost cynically:

One convict with a Winchester rifle and a determination to do and to die game seems to be more than enough for an army of sheriffs, deputies, policemen and marshals.

Those persons responsible for providing Tracy and Merrill with firearms, with which they escaped from the Oregon penitentiary, at Salem are greater criminals in the light of what has happened since, than the two cut-throats and murderers themselves.

The lax methods in vogue at the penitentiary at Salem, and the political system which bred them, were aids to all the murder the brace of rascals have committed.

And there are none more responsible for the whole "dreadful mess," than the voters of Oregon, who vote a party into office year after year regardless of the character of its performance.

Were the voters more exacting and less addicted to partisan action at the polls, changing servants as frequently as the party proved derelict to duty, there would be better government and less burden of government on the part of those who occupy public office.

Tracy and Merrill's crimes can be traced to the doors of indolent and unconscientious politicians and time servers, whom the people are slow to call to account and who feed and thrive upon the people, as always does the knave at the expense of the fool. When the voter is more intelligent in the use of his vote, and less devoted to his party as a blind follower of it, the government of his state and the general condition of society will be elevating and not on the down grade.

The gist of the matter is, the voter fails miserably to realize his responsibilities and his state suffers in consequence.

### LET IT BE TESTED.

The Evening Telegram takes a try at the special session. It says: "There is considerable plausibility in the arguments for a special session of the legislature to be held late this fall. For one thing, both parties, whether sincerely or not, have declared for 'flat salaries' for state officials. But if the ne wofficials, counting the re-elected ones as such also, should once enter upon their terms of office under the old law, could the fee system, by which chiefly they thrive, be annulled or interfered with? Would not such an act be, as most beneficial acts somehow are, 'unconstitutional?' Indeed, digging a little deeper into the subject, would not any act passed after the 2d day of June, when they were elected by the people under the present law and system, be 'unconstitutional?' It seems very likely; at least the courts, if a real or even a professional reform were attempted, would wrinkle their brows about it mightily."—Astorian.

Liberal Use of Advertising Space the Way to Reach General Public

The question was once asked me, "Who is the great traveling salesman?" and I had no hesitancy in making reply: "Printer's ink." A business represented by printer's ink is one that lasts. Printer's ink works while you work and while you sleep. It is a salesman who never tires and never quits; one of whom your competitor cannot rob you; printer's ink is the one great artery of commercial activity. It is the medium through which the world is made to know what you know and profess about your individual business. It is even possible, by the aid of printer's ink to force the sale of an article without merit, but such prosperity is necessarily short-lived.

No great national commercial enterprise without printer's ink. A prerequisite of good advertising is absolute honesty in every statement. Furthermore, to shoot over the heads of your readers is money and space wasted. To tell all you know in a single announcement is like firing at a grizzly bear with a scattering charge of bird shot, while the same load in one bullet, properly aimed, will bring down the bear. By this is meant that one cannot advertise effectively, overcautiously and, for instance, in the same breath. The argument will be no stronger than its weakest point, no matter how much time or thought may have been bestowed upon its production.—J. Joseph R. Kathrens.
