COAL MINERS FEEL OUTRAGED

By the Decision Rendered in the Injunction Suit.

Mitchell Denounces It Un-American and in Violation of the Constitution

An Appeal Will Be Made to the President--Strike Fund Has Reached \$500,000

Parkersburg, Pa., July 24.—United States District Judge Jackson today handed down decisions in the case of Thos. Heggarty, Wm. Morgan, Bernard Rice, Peter Wilson, Wm. Blakeley, Geo. Bacon, Thos. Laskavich, "Mother" Jones, Albert Repka, Jos. Roelski, Geo. Roelski and Steve Teonike, accused of violating his injunction restraining them from in any way interfering with the working of the anthracite miners in the Pennsylvania and West Virginia strike district.

CLAIMED IT WAS TRACY

Woodburn Gives Report That Gained Credence Here

Woodburn, July 24th. Editor Journal: The extent to which some people will permit their flexible imaginations to carry them, was illustrated Wednesday evening. Some young men residing at the edge of the city, about dusk, saw a young man pass along the county road on a bicycle toward Salem, followed after a short interval by another young man, also mounted on a wheel.

Parkersburg, July 24.—Late this afternoon the remaining defendants, including "Mother" Jones, were called before Judge Jackson and declared guilty, but sentence was suspended. Chicago, July 24.—President Mitchell, of the United Mineworkers, has denounced Judge Jackson's decision as an outrage, and declares it to be in violation of all American principles.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 24.—Secretary Wilson, of the United Mineworkers, yesterday received a check for \$50,000 from the strike fund of the Illinois organization. The Illinois miners have within four weeks given the national organization \$100,000 for the strike fund, and still have nearly \$500,000 in reserve.

ONE WOMAN KILLED

Passengers Injured on Derailed Train

Tragic Accidental Shooting By a Child Kills His Grandmother Then Attempts Suicide

DARING TRAIN HOLD-UP

Three Americans Board Mexican Train

Cooly Cover Express Messenger and Conductor And Secure 50,000 Dollars in Currency

El Paso, Tex., July 24.—A daring hold-up took place on the Mexican Central about 12:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Just after the train left Benito, Tex., three Americans boarded the train, two securing themselves on the blind baggage, and the other entering the third-class coach. As soon as the train pulled out the two riding on the blind baggage entered the express car, and, covering the messenger, T. E. Buckley, with their guns, ordered him to throw up his hands. The express messenger offered no resistance. The robbers then went leisurely through the safe, securing \$50,000 in currency consigned to the Banco Minero, at Chihuahua. They also took what other money packages were in the safe, and stood quietly by until the train stopped, making a hasty exit, and dropping off the train as it was slowing down. After alighting they disappeared in the darkness.

Three Young men Suspected—One Arrested

Money was Buried in a Hubbard Woodshed

Clyde Ramsey, of Silverton, was arrested Wednesday evening and brought to Salem. He is jointly charged with two other young men, viz: D. V. Purdy, of Kingston, Lincoln county, and Roy Ramsey, of Scott's Mills, with the larceny of \$3800 in gold coin from Mrs. Isabelle Ewing, of Hubbard. Purdy and Roy Ramsey have not been arrested, but officers are on their trail, and arrests are expected soon. Clyde Ramsey was arraigned before Justice Hogan this afternoon. His preliminary examination was set for 10 a. m. Friday, and in default of the required \$1000 bonds he was committed to jail.

SULTAN HELD AS HOSTAGE

Leader of the Moro Outrages Defies Arrest

Manila, July 24.—The sultan of Mindayen has been held as hostage by the American troops in Mindayen for the delivery to them of the Moros who attacked two American soldiers last month. The sultan ordered his followers to give up the men; only one came into the American camp, confessed and died. The leader of the attack is fortified in his house, and defies the sultan's followers to take him.

WILL 'O WISP TRACY

Has Been Seen in Logging Camp Not Far From His Last Stamping Ground

If the reports that are flashed over the wires regarding Tracy's whereabouts are true, that individual is not unlike the Irishman's flea, who was in a dozen places all at one time. The Journal, having been imposed upon by the unreliability of these erratic reports, is rather wary to give them expression. The following, however, from the vicinity of the outlaw's late stamping ground, bears some semblance of authenticity. Wants to Meet Merrill's Brother. Tacoma, July 24.—Tracy, the outlaw, appeared at Merrill's logging camp, four miles from Kanastot, Tuesday, and ate dinner. When asked why he did not take advantage of the bill and escape from (Green River valley Tracy said: "I have some business to settle with Merrill's brother. I understand that the brother wants to see me." Tracy is not wounded, and looks fresh and rested. He is wearing a derby hat. He still has his Winchester and two revolvers, and has a good supply of ammunition. This report comes from a reliable source to Sheriff Hartman (Dun N. Brahams) who formerly worked on the Northern Pacific, and was in Merrill's camp, and knew Tracy years ago as a Tacoma brakeman.
