MAKE YOUR OWN SELECTION

Postal Laws Do Not Demand Any One Form

Of Letter-Boxes for Patrons - Look Out for Fakir

The attention of the patrons of the free rural mail delivery system is called to the fact that any one particular style or form of box or other receptacle for mail is not required by the postal laws. The postoffice department has made the decision, and has held that certain regulations must be complied with, but beyond that no suggestions or requirements are made as to the form or make of the box.

It has been reported that an agent for a mail box company is working in the valley and canvassing in the interests of his company. He is said to be representing himself as an agent for the Mailcarriers' Association, and that he is selling or renting the kind of boxes they recommend. Of the gentleman's operations in Portland and the Oregonian has the following:

"Armed with circular letters, containing extracts from the United States postal laws, by which it is attempted to show that laws have been enacted compelling the people to secure letter boxes for their houses for the convenience of the mail-carriers, an agent for a certain letter-box company has been endeavoring to convince the people of the city that he is representing the Mailcarriers' Association, and that he is selling or renting a box that they recommend. Complaints have been made by some of the people who are well enough informed to know that there is no law compelling them to secure these boxes, and the letter-carriers have been censured that they should take up such a scheme. Investigation, however, shows that the letter-carriers have had nothing to do with the matter, and that it is merely a plan to sell the boxes. 'It would be a great convenience,' said one of the carriers yesterday, 'if all the people would secure boxes, and it would enable us to have the mail delivered much earlier, but as for recommending any certain box or attempting to force the people to buy boxes, none of us have taken such steps. There is no law that will compel the people to have boxes, and there is no ground upon which to force the issue, except for their own convenience. The party who has sent out these circulars has had them printed for his own use, and has no connection with the Letter-Carriers' Association, other than all of us. If we were asked, would recommend the use of letter-boxes.'"

Man Wanted at Chehalis, Wn. Is Returned

Sheriff Edward Deggefer, of Lewis county, Washington, arrived in Salem Wednesday night, from Chehalis. Upon the requisition of Governor McBride, of Washington, a warrant of arrest was today issued from Governor Goer's office, for the return to Chehalis of A. J. Molitor, who is under arrest at Oregon City, and is wanted in the Evergreen state for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Sheriff Deggefer is the officer who accompanied Mrs. Waggoner to Salem with Convict Merrill's body. He says the woman will not urge the consideration and payment of her claim until Governor Goer has returned to Salem, and given the matter attention. Sheriff Deggefer says that frequent rumors, entirely unreliable, are circulated about his county concerning Tracy with the result that the people are kept in almost constant terror of the convict. He is of the opinion, however, that Tracy is not far distant from the point where he was last seen near Seattle. Sheriff Deggefer is satisfied that Tracy is seriously wounded and he expects that the capture of the convict may take place soon.

Sheriff Deggefer left this afternoon for Oregon City, where he will get his man and leave Portland tonight for Chehalis.

WHEAT POOL FORMING

Waldo Hills Farmers Will Combine Their Crops

Nearly 200,000 Bushels of Grain in Compact

W. H. Downing, of Whiteaker, was in the city today, and reports that there will be a meeting of the farmers of his section at the Rocky Point school house Saturday evening of this week for the purpose of organizing into a compact for the sale of their grain. There will be represented about 60,000 bushels of wheat and 100,000 bushels of oats, and it is expected that the owners will by this process push up the price about five cents a bushel all round, thus clearing to the neighborhood approximately \$800.

The success of this process has been several times demonstrated in the past few years. Twice they have pooled their grain, and just recently their wool was sold in a pooled lot at an appreciable advance. Mr. Downing says there is talk of a permanent organization of the farmers for purposes of this kind, and predicts that it will be a perfect success, owing to the taste they have had of its merits in their operations of the past.

MANY VETS APPLY

Indian War Veterans Want Pensions

Probably 1000 Persons Are Eligible to the Benefit

T. A. Wood, grand commander of the Indian War Veterans, and the father of the pension bill just passed by congress, is deluged by letters daily from old Indian fighters from all over Oregon and Washington, says an exchange. They want to be enrolled on Uncle Sam's pay list, at the prevailing rate of \$8 per month. Mr. Wood says that out of 50 letters received daily, from eight to ten are from persons who draw pension money.

In Oregon and Washington there are probably 1000 persons eligible for the pension list. The widows of the pensioners are entitled to receive the full share, but at their deaths the allowance does not descend to their heirs.

The government will not pay any back money. The bill took effect from the date of its passage, and all the years of expectation and privation in some instances will not be rewarded. Mr. Wood says that had he known before what he does now he could have had the retroactive clause inserted. Since the measure passed he has discovered that, under the army rules, the Indian fighters who co-operated with the regulars in suppressing rebellions, are entitled to the same consideration as the United troops. Mr. Wood was well satisfied to get the bill through in any shape. For the past seven years he has been hammering away at the senators and representatives in congress, and made a special trip to Washington at the last session in the interest of the measure.
