THE QUESTION OF THE FRIARS.

It is for the Catholics in America to
 say whether the work of their church
 in the Philippines shall cease or at-
 tain a broader and a better develop-
 ment. They are not to be blinded in-
 to believing that the friars in the
 Philippines were dealt with unjustly,
 and their church antagonized, by their
 expulsion from the communities they
 oppressed. This is a false view. The
 question is not a religious one. The
 testimony of every impartial observer
 of conditions in the Philippines, both
 before and after American occupation,
 has been that the majority of friars
 were utterly unworthy of their cloth.

Besides other things, they were
 more politicians than priests. They
 were the product of centuries of evil
 and administrative wrong. They an-
 tipathized the executions ordered by
 Spanish officials, and stood sponsors
 for the Spanish extortions. There
 were exceptions, of course, but as a
 rule they earned no great measure
 of the people's detestation that their
 replacement now would necessitate
 their being guarded by United States
 troops to prevent riot and murder.
 These are the plain facts, and those
 who conceal them do not do a friendly
 act to the Catholics of America.

BETTER STICK TO THE FARM.

It is said that the annual increase of
 Chicago's population is from 60,000 to
 70,000, and among the newcomers ev-
 ery year are young men from the
 country, who are victims of the notion
 that opportunities await them in the
 cities alone. Under this delusion they
 condemn themselves very probably to
 the disappointments of an over-
 crowded labor market. If they get
 work it is at a small wage or salary.

They must live in cheap boarding
 houses, pass from them to cheap ten-
 ements if they have the courage to mar-
 ry, find more and more that their pos-
 sition is one of anxious dependence, and
 that the imaginary charms of city life
 disappear, to leave nothing but the de-
 pressing reality of buildings jammed
 together, to the exclusion of light and
 air, of an all-pervading noise and dirt,
 of a routine which gives little but a
 bare subsistence for the future.

In the vast majority of cases such
 must be the result, and while country
 life may have some serious draw-
 backs, it is plain that these young
 men make a capital mistake when they
 come to consider the question of
 opportunity through an ignorant con-
 tempt of their familiar surroundings.

If, instead of indulging in dreams of
 fortune-building in the city, they were
 to master thoroughly all the work of
 a farm, cultivate an interest in it, take
 over the land of their fathers, or ac-
 quire others by purchase, put into this
 life all the ambition of their dream,
 they would do better in the end than
 90 per cent. of the city people, have a
 greater intellectual stimulus in their
 employment, get a greater enjoyment
 out of living and attain to an enviable
 independence.

The opportunity is close at hand if
 they will only see it, and it adds to the
 anomaly of the situation that, while
 they are neglecting their natural ad-
 vantage, disillusionized city men, past
 the prime of life, are "retiring" to
 farms, where they waste their sub-
 stance in foolish experiments, owing
 to the belief that they can be a farm-
 er. But these poor competitors do not
 count, and if the farm boy will stick
 to the farm, and make a science of ag-
 riculture his success is assured.

A HUMAN CURIOSITY.

Man With Three Legs and Two

Hearts.

EXCEPTIONAL SURGERY.

(Pendleton East Oregonian.)

King Edward has left his bed and is
 out for a voyage on his yacht. This
 is one case of surgery in modern times
 where an important personage has
 been operated on by the doctors with-
 out fatal results. Whether the meth-
 ods of the old country are different
 from those used in this country in de-
 tail or not, is not stated, but anyway
 the results in this particular case
 turned out differently. Of course, the
 scientific application of the knife, and
 the treatment that follows, are doubt-
 less the same, as prescribed in the
 books in all countries, but American
 surgeons so far have succeeded in
 throwing enough individuality into
 such cases as to produce fatal results
 every time.

It is notoriously charged, and no
 longer denied, that if the surgeons did
 not kill Garfield outright, their mis-
 treatment of his case did it indirectly.
 President McKinley was reported to
 be doing "nicely" until a few hours
 before his death, when he began sink-
 ing so rapidly that the shock of his
 death, received so suddenly after the
 favorable bulletins, was even greater
 than the announcement that he had
 been shot. There has never been seri-
 ous charges against the surgeons in
 his case, however, and it would do no
 good, for it would only reflect on the
 science in this country, and not re-
 store the dead.

Whether prominent persons are
 "over-doctored" through the ambition
 of the surgeons to make a name and
 reputation or not, it has been charged
 as a fact, and there is doubtless some
 reason for believing the statement.
 Physicians themselves charge that
 more people have been killed by the
 annoyance of over-anxious friends who
 persist in calling on them and "doing
 something" for them than all the dis-
 eases combined, together with the awk-
 wardness of the physicians, and all
 their experimenting. It is generally
 conceded that the physicians them-
 selves have done their share toward
 supplying cemetaries in the latter
 manner, and those who have retired
 from the practice laugh about it as a
 huge joke.

REPORTSStatistics of the Insurrection
in the Philippines

Major James Parker, of the ad-
 jutant-general's department, has com-
 piled statistics regarding the insurrec-
 tion in the Philippines. There were
 2156 engagements with the enemy,
 more or less serious, between Febru-
 ary 4, 1899, the date of the battle of
 Manila, and April 30, 1902, fixed as
 the virtual downfall of the insurrec-
 tion. The larger portion of these fights
 were attacks from ambush on the Ameri-
 can troops or skirmishes, in which only
 small detachments took part.

The number of troops that have
 been transported to the Philippines
 and have arrived there up to July 15th
 last was 4135 officers and 122,893 men.
 The average strength, taken from
 monthly returns for the period of the
 insurrection was approximately 40,000.
 Major Parker summarizes the casu-
 alties of the American army as fol-
 lows:

	Officers, Men.
Killed or dead of wounds	69 836
Deaths from disease	47 2535
Deaths from accidents	6 125
Drowned	6 257
Suicide	19 72
Murdered	1 91
Total deaths	139 4016

A large portion of the deaths by
 drowning occurred in action or in ac-
 tive operations. Major Parker makes
 the percentage of killed and wounded
 to the strength of the army 3.7.
