YOUNG REPUBS. FOR LEADERS

The New Life of the Party to Come From Them

First They Must Prepare Themselves By Education

Then, Says "Young Republican," Will They Become the Invulnerable Leaders of the Party

For the purpose of a second article upon the position in which the young Republican finds himself today in the field of politics, it might be well to consider means whereby initiatory steps may be taken which will be truly progressive and upon lines insuring safe and substantial foundation. Looking over the field we do not find any systematic effort to place political economy upon a practical footing. In our colleges, which only the rich (and a few of the poor) can enjoy, we find it in its theoretical application. We there find it in its beauty of perfection. In its practical application we do not find it so easily adjusted, nor appearing in the scholastic perfection. We find it rather the pliable instrument of man's political ingenuity, which is not always directed in the most sacred courses or purposes. A palpable lack of some system of operation, whereby the true principles of political economy are constantly made the only standard, it can be truthfully said is at the bottom of the unsatisfactory conditions and positions political parties and political party workers find themselves to-day. The standard has been too much the man, regardless of the principle he represents. This process has placed the basis of all political maneuvers upon the fluctuating value of human popularity. To take the standard from the variable and uncertain quality called popularity, and place it at the foot of sound political economy, is a work of time. So distant seems this consummation that it would appear more progressive, in that it reaches every walk of life, to work from the standpoint of elevating the methods of political machinations until finally the standard will of itself reach its true place. Because of undisciplined and thoughtless campaign methods the best results are sacrificed. Also because of this the young Republican finds himself self after the "rat" laid on the shell until next season. Taking advantage of the lack of system, the want of intelligent action, the want of unity of action, the few central the many in politics. The few, whose dominant power rests absolutely in the hands of the many, with these weapons which they wield with such strategy and political discretion, continue in control, and bestow upon whom they choose "plums" too green for them. To add to the cup of gall, it is "sweetened" with broken promises and pledges. A practical political economy which is just and right to every man is not an impossibility, it being therefore the greatest of all standards, and one entirely worthy of the deepest consideration of that great and promising body—the rising Republicans. When Abraham Lincoln was defeated for United States senator, he is said to have remarked that "When two men try to ride one horse, one must ride behind." So, if the young Republican attempts to ride the same horse the "old" Republican rides he must get on behind. He can bite the beast in the ribs, but the man in front will hold the reins. And whenever that horse gets to bucking, who will go off first? The young Republican had better get a horse of his own. He can then ride in front. As a reliable warrior, I would recommend that he be fed on concerted action. This is half the battle. Without it nothing can be accomplished. Let us get together. Organize. Act. Think. Form clubs for the sole purpose of educating ourselves into the higher planes of politics. Provide ourselves with lectures by eminent and successful politicians. Take on a fresh impetus. Debate the issues of the day. Raise our flag and stand by. Change the misconception which prevails that use and duty of the young Republican is at an end when he finishes the duties entrusted to him, which too often consist of getting the "boys" in line. That he is something more than a torch bearer. Something more than a yelling parade. Have him feel his true worth. If he is worthy of the name of Republican he is as truly worthy of its gifts. Take him out of the mire of his wrong ideas that all he is good for is to be a slave. Teach him to expect something. Teach him to look forward to legitimate compensation for what he does. Above all, have him first learn that he must fit himself for any trust. That as he improves himself, individually, he enhances his own opportunities and possibilities, and at the same time raises the young Republican as a body. We are what is called practical young men. We are not graduated loungers of schools of theoretical economy. We are the wage earners. The laborers. We must seek our education without the ad-

PETITION TO THE GOVERNOR

The People Have Adopted Direct Legislation and Demand the Enactment of Flat Salaries--Take the Initiative for a Special Session.

Whereas, The platform of all political parties in Oregon this year have declared for Flat Salaries for state officials, for abolition of perquisites and payment of all fees collected into the state treasury, and Whereas, The failure to pass this law before the state officials now elected enter upon their term of office, beginning in January, 1903, will leave the present system of compensation in full effect for four years, therefore, We, the undersigned citizens of Oregon, do hereby respectfully petition Your Excellency, Governor T. T. Geer, to call a special session of the Legislature, to be convened a sufficient time before the regular session of 1903. I. To enact a Flat Salary Law and repeal all laws giving state officials fees and perquisites. II. To enact a law to carry into immediate effect the provisions of the Initiative and Referendum Amendment to our State Constitution.
