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MURDERER OF BEN TRACY

He Has Been Returned for Trial

Lane County Murder Case to Be Heard in October

Eugene, July 28.—(Special to Journal)—Last week, after a hunt of about three weeks, Sheriff W. W. Withers captured at Wells, Nevada, the man who is accused of murdering and robbing Benton Tracy, the barkeeper, at Junction City, during the night of May 19, 1902. At the last term of the circuit court, held in Eugene last month, the grand jury called upon County Judge H. R. Kincaid and earnestly requested that the county use every means possible to capture the man who murdered and robbed Benton Tracy at Junction City, and should authorize the necessary expense. In addition to their verbal recommendation they filed with the court judge, in order to justify the expense of making a thorough search in other states, the following written special report:

In the circuit court of the state of Oregon, for Lane county.

Special recommendation of grand jury to county court of Lane county:

The grand jury finds that Benton Tracy was shot down in cold blood in Junction City, Lane county, Oregon, during the night of May 19, 1902.

After hearing the evidence we have concluded and say that the killing of Tracy was a commercial transaction; a brutal, calculated murder of a man for the money in his possession.

The criminal has escaped from this county and state, but we believe, from the evidence before us, that he can yet be captured and brought to justice.

That we believe that Lane county should assist its officers in the pursuit of the fugitive beyond this state, and we recommend that the county court of Lane county defray the expenses of the sheriff in searching for the said murderer within other states.

Dated at Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, this 18th day of June, A. D. 1902.

This report was submitted to County Commissioners Edwards and Hill, and after a due consideration, the county court authorized Sheriff W. W. Withers to go at the expense of the county, and make a thorough search as long and as far as he could find any trace of the murderer, until he should succeed in capturing him, or should consider his capture improbable. After a long and tedious chase the sheriff succeeded in running the rascal down at a little station on the Central Pacific railroad in Nevada. He then had to get a requisition from the governor of Nevada before he could bring the prisoner to Oregon, which detained him a few days longer. Of all the sheriffs Lane county has ever had Withers has been the most successful in capturing and holding prisoners. In this particular case he has accomplished what, to most people, seemed impossible. After the criminal had been out of the state more than a month he traced him for more than a thousand miles and captured him. The name of the man who is accused of the murder of Benton Tracy is Bert Heaton, alias Bert Ray. Sheriff Withers is expected to arrive in Eugene with him, Friday, July 25th.

What is Known of Ray.

Heaton, alias Ray, formerly lived at Corvallis, and was well known at Cottage Grove and points south of Junction. He had been around Junction about ten days before the shooting, and had been playing out of luck. He had put in most of his time at the Monogram saloon, of which Tracy was manager. They had no trouble until the night of the shooting, when Heaton tried to rob the till. Tracy had closed at midnight, and when all the habitués of the place were gone out, he went to the rear of the saloon to close the doors. Heaton, who had been peering up and down outside the saloon, where he was watching, entered and pulled open the till, which was not locked, and contained about \$250. He next pulled open the cash register, to get about \$60 more. This rung the bell, and Tracy flew back and caught Heaton in the act of robbery. At this Heaton jumped up on the bar counter and as Tracy was in his way of escape, shot him down. Tracy entered his abdomen at his watch pocket on the right side, and came out the opposite way below. Tracy fell to his knees, got up and went behind the bar to get his gun; went to the door and fired several shots of alarm, as Heaton had fled, went behind the bar for shells, and

was found lying over the drain board dead.

Did Not Live to Tell.

Although Tracy emptied his revolver at the robber, or to give alarm, and a saloon was running two doors from the Monogram, no one appeared in time to hear from his lips who his murderer was. The first trace of Heaton was got through a constable at Reading, Cal., but when Sheriff Withers got there, in answer to a telegram, the man had flown. He followed him to Sacramento, then from place to place until he got him at Wells, Nevada.

Heaton is indicted.

The Lane county grand jury has indicted Heaton for murder in the first degree, and he will have his trial in October. The testimony will be entirely circumstantial, and it will not be easy to convict Heaton.
