DON'T HURT OUR PRIVILEGES.

An organ of the privileged class cries out that the legislature must not tinker with the new Portland charter. It creates vested rights for all existing franchises and establishes many new privileges.

The cry that possibly it may be tinkered at will bring a lobby of all the aggregated corporations to Salem during the legislature. That will make the organs of privilege bring a high price for services.

The charter, as drawn, enacts all existing franchises forever, and, under the pretense of a popular loan plan of funding debts creates a monopoly of the most jug-handled character for the local bond-brokers.

The conservation of privileges in the form of municipal charters is contrary to sound business principles, foments socialism and breeds anarchy. The cry "don't hurt our privileges" precedes every revolution.

The new Portland charter is probably the highest product of high water mark in existing political intelligence at the Oregon metropolis. If sufficient privileges are protected by it the charter will be passed.

Portland charters have always been a corrupting influence in the Oregon legislature, and no one doubts that this one will be, especially if the cry can be raised that will bring the aggregated franchise interests into the fight, and compel them to put up a sack.

WORKS BOTH WAYS.

Among the stock raisers of the West the Republican party, press and curbstone orators are making an effort to have the voters believe that the high prices being paid for beef and pork is entirely due to that property which is the result of Republicans being in power.

In the East, where there is very little meat for the market, and where all are being compelled to pay two prices for all the meat they have to buy, the Republican press and speakers disclaim all responsibility, and shoulder the blame onto the trusts, which, they say, they have no power to regulate.

Record Your Deed.

Many unrecorded deeds of real property can be brought to light at almost a moment's notice. People seem to be either very ignorant of the law or very careless. This negligence or ignorance, or whatever it may be termed, may prove expensive in the long run. There is a law which reads that deeds, to be valid, must be recorded within five days from the date of conveyance of same.

On page 1264, Hill's Annotated Laws of Oregon, 1887, is an article which reads: "Every conveyance of real property within this state hereafter made, which shall not be recorded as provided in this title within five days thereafter shall be void against any subsequent purchaser in good faith, and for a valuable consideration of the same real property, or any portion thereof, whose conveyance shall be first duly recorded."

For instance, A sells a parcel of land to B, and B fails to have the deed recorded. On the sixth day after the transaction between A and B, C chances to meet A and asks him if his property is for sale. Knowing that no record of the conveyance has been made, A sells the same land to C. The latter acts in good faith throughout the matter and immediately has his deed recorded. The property belongs to C according to law. Of course B may bring action against A for damages, but, like any lawsuit, the outcome would be difficult to foretell.

On the same page of Hill's Laws for 1897 is a note which reads: "An unrecorded deed is effective as between parties having actual notice, and as to them it carries title. The statute applies only in favor of parties acting in good faith, and a subsequent deed with notice of a prior unrecorded deed passes no title whatever."

On the same page is a note referring to the matter of several conveyances, which reads as follows: "Where neither of several conveyances is recorded within the five days here provided, the one which is first recorded will prevail."—Fleischer vs. Sumpter, 12 Or. 161.

It is possible that there may be later laws bearing on this matter, but we are not informed of them, and several of the county officials whose duties bring them into close relation with this subject are of the opinion that the above citations are of the laws at present in force. So it will readily be seen that to be on the safe side in any event, it is an act of wisdom to have an immediate record made of a property that may be acquired.

Pacific Coast Unions.

WILL POOL GRAIN

Waldo Hills' Farmers Organize to Handle 1902 Crop

The farmers of the Waldo Hills have organized the Rocky Point Grain Association, with the following officers: W. H. Downing, president; H. H. Humphreys, secretary and treasurer. A sales committee was appointed as follows: W. H. Downing, T. B. Patton, J. T. Hunt, Adam Burns and Martin Smith. The purpose of the organization is to pool the grain crops of its members, to the end that the best price may be received for their products. The farmers of this same section formed similar pools for the years 1901 and 1902, and realized from 4 to 5 cents more per bushel for their grain than they would have received in the open market.

The sales committee has been ordered to complete the formation of the pool, by interesting the grain growers of that section of the county, and also to advertise for bids for the sale thereof. The association this year expects to have 150,000 bushels of wheat and oats in the combine. The next meeting will be held on August 16th, and about a week later the association expects to ask for bids for the entire pool.
