Supt. Lee and Warden Jones Are Not Agreed

On Settlement of Reward for Merrill's Body

WHAT ARE WE HERE FOR? The above were the words with which Plannagan, a delegate from Texas, electrified a national Republican convention in 1890. The question arises every time a newspaper goes under new management, or is established.

Of all pretenses probably that can be least satisfactorily explained which is predicated on the statement that the paper is to be conducted for the benefit of the community—of greatest benefit to the commonwealth.

A millionaire might pose as a public benefactor, and publish for free distribution a newspaper which no one would read. But if he run it as a business enterprise to earn dividends or interest on his capital it would command far more respect.

So it seems to us that to pretend to be conducting a newspaper first of all to benefit others, be it one person or a million persons, is a very suicidal or insane proposition.

The Journal advocates certain public policies with all the energy at its command, but it does it because it believes there is urgent need for a newspaper in Oregon to do just that very thing, and because it will interest more people to buy the Journal than any other policy—in other words, The Journal seeks to supply an existing demand, or even create a demand for that which it is prepared to supply, and thereby benefit ourselves and the community in general.

CREATING MORE BIG RESERVES. The force of setting apart six thousand miles of forest reserve in Oregon is announced without further comment from Washington.

Geological surveys, irrigation schemes, wagon road land grants, lighthouse and railroad land grant frauds all lurk behind the forest reserve swindle.

It is today the great breeding ground of civil service officialism—where the over-production of college graduates is worked off on the people for life jobs.

In Oregon one corporation has taken 400,000 acres of the people's finest timber lands under the guise of forest reserve legislation.

The forest reserves are an European invention, a mild name for a game preserve on which to multiply officialism, with which the land is swarming in every direction.

Like the lice and frogs God sent as a plague on the Egyptians, the multiplication of officialism goes on.

What is worse, the public lands are stolen and sequestered from the thousands who need homes, and who would protect the forest against fires.

The Europeanization of America will not cease until the country is on the verge of a political revolution—if not over the verge.

Oregon is sowing the seed that will result in a bloody harvest all over this nation some day.

JOURNAL X-RAYS.

Salem's pretty girls are not all for gotten in the Journal's seaside voting contest.

And now the Oregonian kicks about the Eugene Divinity school, "on the edge of the University campus." It says this "is not right, and should not be tolerated." Now let the Eugene Register call Harvey Scott insane, idiotic and a liar.

A subscriber to the weekly, owing 13 years' subscription, has had the paper marked "refused" without liquidating. These are days of icy cold compared with the future of such people, says the Albany Democrat.

The question arises: ought not a publisher who gives 13 years' credit lose every cent of it, and be obliged to pay a fine in the bargain?

Dowitt Brown, a real estate man of Cripple Creek, Colo., accidentally shot and killed Marion Hurt, of the same town, at their camp on Mad creek, six miles from here. The two had been prospecting for several weeks.

Don Martinus, a Mexican sheepherder, was shot and killed near Coperton, Wyo., by M. A. Steep, a miner, better known as "California Red." Another herder was shot at, but escaped injury.

The following is taken from the Lee Nugget, of Chehalis, Washington:

Oregon's course in the pursuit of Tracy is not to the credit of that state. We believe that their plan of chasing Tracy and Merrill outside their limits and then quitting the pursuit is a condition of which the people of a rich state like our neighbor should be ashamed. The very safety of the people was menaced by permitting Merrill and Tracy to escape from the prison, and they should have been taken dead or alive before going 50 miles, and their bodies returned to the penitentiary, as an object lesson to others. There must be something radically wrong about the control of that prison. The unsuccessful outbreak passed as an every-day occurrence, and no investigation has been had. Should such a thing happen in our own state it would not be 24 hours before the head of the institution would be suspended, pending an investigation of the affair. Some one must have a good-sized graft down there at Salem with the office of one T. Geor, governor and run-down politician. On the streets of Chehalis a few days ago, Warden James, of the Salem prison, told a company of well-known citizens that he stood within a few feet of where Tracy and Merrill were pumping cold lead into the guards; that he stood there and never turned over his hand to go to the rescue, as he was armed with nothing more than a tooth pick. It would seem as if there are a lot of men around Salem's pen who are getting a good lift in the way of salaries at the expense of the people—men who take no chances when danger is at hand. It seems that Mr. James' duty would have impelled him

to get a gun as quickly as he could do so and get into action with it. Mr. Janos' statement, together with other circumstances, would indicate that at the penitentiary at Salem there must be something back of the whole Merrill and Tracy escape that the officials at the prison do not care to have come out. The query arises, "Is the governor of Oregon in on the deal?"

While it will not be denied that there is serious need of reform in the management of the Oregon state penitentiary, still the above editorial does an injustice to both Governor Geor and Warden James. The action of Warden James, on the morning of the escape of Tracy and Merrill, needs no defense. The foregoing was written without a knowledge of the facts in the case. Those conversant with the actual conditions on that morning knew that Warden James was on the grounds promptly, and personally directed the guarding of the other prisoners, and probably prevented a wholesale delivery, since for a few minutes following the sensation escape of the two convicts, the walls of the enclosure were very poorly guarded, and in fact there was nothing to prevent many of the men from going also.

Harry Wright Heard From.

Reports from what are considered reliable authority are that Harry Wright, the ex-convict, suspected of having assisted Tracy and Merrill in making their escape from the penitentiary, and for whom a reward of \$500 is offered, is in hiding in the Wolf Creek country, 25 miles east of Eugene. He formerly lived in that vicinity. Two men saw him pass along the road a week ago.
