MANY PRUNE SALES

Big Demand for the Willamette Valley Product

1902 Crop Will Be 60 per cent of Average Yield

The demand for the Willamette valley prune crop this year is large. European buyers are keeping the cables hot with inquiries, and not a few sales are being made. The Willamette Valley Prune Association last year established a reputation for its "Pheasant" brand of prunes, and this year the demand for that brand is remarkable. Dealers who last year handled the brand will this year scarcely consider any other quality.

Last year the association handled 125 carloads, or 3,500,000 pounds. The amount that will be handled this season will not be as large, by reason of the reduced yield. The yield of the Northwest for 1901 was about 1200 cars, and it is estimated that the yield for this year will not exceed 60 per cent of last year's crop, which was considered an average yield. The probable crop this year is estimated at about 600 carloads.

It is learned that the growers who are represented in the association will probably realize more for their product this year than they did in 1901. This statement is supported by the indication that in the shortage of the crop the grower will have a larger per cent of straight 30's, for which the price has been set by the association is 3 cents per pound. The price for prunes in equal quantities, from 30's to 60's, has been placed at 2 1/2 cents. The association controls a majority of the prune acreage in this vicinity, and will again act as a factor in the disposing of the holdings of its members. The Willamette valley growers are receiving better prices for their prunes than their neighbors in California. The subjoined clipping from the San Jose Mercury would indicate that the growers of that famous prune district are contracting the sale of their crop on a 2 1/2-cent basis:

There is an active demand for dried fruit from Europe at present. Sales for the foreign market since last Friday morning aggregate 21 carloads, and for the year, up to date, over 400 carloads have been sold in the European field.

The failure of the French crop of prunes, as announced in the Mercury two days ago, has been followed by a very active cable inquiry from continental buyers for quotations on California fruit. There is a belief that the shortage abroad is more serious than has been reported, and that the foreign market will shortly assume a phase which will result in greatly increased prices here. A month ago the European shortage was estimated at 40,000,000 pounds. Now with the total destruction of the French crop these figures are certain to increase at any moment—they ought to double according to the estimates of local growers who are familiar with the situation.

The local market is manifesting symptoms of stiffening, and there are practically no sales being made at less than a 2 1/2-cent basis.

Col Sobieski's Lecture

"Poland, Its Rise and Fall, and Struggle for Freedom," the lecture given by Col. John Sobieski at the M. E. church Monday night, was deserving of a larger audience, and those who failed to hear it missed an intellectual as well as historical treat.

Col. Sobieski, direct descendant of a line of Polish kings, and by right of inheritance should today occupy the throne of Poland in now an Americanized citizen. In his portrayal of his country's glories and its wrongs he spoke with the glowing enthusiasm of the freedom-loving patriot who has suffered deeply. He recited the history of his country by the terrible Turkish and the oppression endured by his peace loving and liberty-loving countrymen, and the final routing by the small republic of the Mohammedan hordes from Christian Europe. He depicted the final fall of Poland into the hands of the Russian empire and the vain struggle of her people since then to shake off the Muscovite yoke.

The lecturer is a fluent speaker of pleasing manner and address, and the thrilling eloquence with which he handled his subject stirred the appreciative audience to frequent applause. Col. Sobieski has lately published a condensed history of Poland, with personal reminiscences of the story of his exile, and the execution on the scaffold on the same day of his father, grandfather, and two other members of his family, who died in the cause of freedom.

HELD TO CIRCUIT COURT

Lads, Suspected of Taking Widow Ewing's Gold.

Are Bound Over By Justice Morgan in \$1000 Bail

After hearing all the testimony in the case and the arguments of the respective counsel, Justice Morgan on Tuesday evening announced that he would hold to the circuit court in the sum of \$1000 each, the three lads who are charged with the theft of \$3800 from Mrs. Ewing, of Hubbard. B. P. Purdy, one of the boys, furnished bonds at once, and was released from custody, while Roy and Clyde Ramsey were committed to the county jail. The case was reconvened in the justice court at 7 o'clock last evening, after a recess taken at the noon hour. The defense called several witnesses who testified as to the character and reputation of the three defendants, and a motion on the part of the counsel for the defendants to dismiss the case was then argued at length, and at its conclusion Justice Morgan held the three defendants to the circuit court.

COLEMAN RETURNS HOME

President of Willamette is Hopeful

President John H. Coleman, of Willamette University, of this city, and his family, which consists of a wife and three children, have arrived in Salem, and will make their permanent home here. For the present they are domiciled at the home of J. P. Robertson, on East Center street.

When seen, President Coleman spoke very cheerfully for the future of the Salem University. While in New York state he received several very welcome subscriptions that will add to the fund for discharging the school indebtedness. Dr. Coleman says many wealthy Methodists in the East have become interested in the University, and some substantial aid from that source need not be unexpected. The University president has entirely severed his connection with New York state, and is now a full-fledged Oregonian.

Speaking of the University, Dr. Coleman said it would be the purpose of the management to modernize the main University building at once, and provide it with all the conveniences of an up-to-date educational institution. All the buildings, not directly used in connection with the University work, will be removed from the University campus, which will be exclusively devoted to the interests of the school. The athletic grounds and the equipments of the gymnasium will be improved upon, and everything done that will promote the interests of the school.
