Object to the Report

(Continued from Fourth Page.)

son that the claim filed by Mr. Slater,
as receiver, sets forth said check with
other checks outstanding in detail as
deducted from the amount due him on
the books of Gilbert Bros.

Tenth—Object to that part of the
receiver's said report on page 4, re-
ferring to the claim of Ida Muth, open
account, for \$1268.50, and wherein the
receiver says while the claim as pre-
sented is an error, the amount is un-
doubtedly due her, for the reason that
it appears by said report that the
amount of credit due claimant upon the
books of Gilbert Bros. is \$223.50, and
that she holds a certificate of de-
posit for \$1000.00, showing an indebt-
edness to her of \$1223.50, while the
claim, as reported, is for \$1268.50.
Said receiver apparently overlooks the
excess of said claim, amounting to
\$45.00.

Eleventh—Object to that part of said
report on page 4, with reference to the
claim of the Order of Pendo, per Frank
Davey, for \$25.83, for the reason that
the receiver makes no recommendation
with reference to said claim, nor as to
whether there was any assignment of
said claim shown by the affidavit of
claimant.

Twelfth—Object to that part of the
receiver's said report on page 5, re-
ferring to the claim of Addie Parvin for
\$506.18, for the reason that said re-
ceiver makes no recommendation, nor
does he state any facts or conclusions
from which the court may determine
as to whether said claim is just or rea-
sonable, or whether it is properly made
out, and object to the allowance of any
amount upon said claim, unless the
claimant shall file an amended claim
showing the amount of the indebted-
ness due her on the date of the failure
of said bank, the nature of the indebt-
edness, the items of collateral held by
her, if any, and the dates and amounts
of collections made upon said collat-
eral.

Thirteenth—Object to that part of
the receiver's said report on page 5,
referring to the claim of Schaeffer
Piano Company for \$1439.14, wherein
the receiver says: "The account upon the
books of said bank and the claim
as filed, if examined by the receiver,
will show that said claim is for the
balance due upon an unpaid draft drawn
by the said Gilbert Bros. a few
days prior to the failure of their bank,
upon New York."

Fourteenth—Object to that part of
the receiver's said report on page 5,
referring to the claim of W. T. Slater,
receiver, open account, for \$1613.85
and \$493.75, the books show due him
\$2443.21; the difference is probably
caused by him having made deductions
for checks issued, for the reason that
the receiver in his said report has con-
fused the claim of W. T. Slater, as
receiver, which was \$1613.85, with the
claim of W. T. Slater, personal, which
is for \$493.75, which was separately
made and filed, and for the further
reason that the claim of W. T. Slater,
as receiver, sets forth in full the
amount due him on the day of the
failure of said bank, from which is de-
ducted and set forth in detail all of the
checks drawn by him as receiver and
outstanding and unrepresented and
unpaid, and if the claims of said re-
ceiver herein he would be able to
make recommendation to the court as
to the correctness of said claims.

Fifteenth—Object to that part of
the receiver's said report on page 5,
referring to the claim of O. G. Smith
for \$20.00, J. H. Williams for \$43.20,
James Winstanley for \$412.74, Mrs. F.
A. Wiggins for \$5.00, and for the re-
ason that the receiver in said report
makes no recommendation to the
court as to how much or what, if any,
of said claims should be allowed or re-
jected.

Sixteenth—Object to that part of the
receiver's said report on pages 5 and
6, which refers to the claim of J. A.
Stevens for \$17.08, based upon checks
of W. T. Slater, receiver, for the re-
ason that the receiver therein makes no
recommendation as to the justness or
reasonableness of said claims, or either
of them, and for the further reason
that the claim of W. T. Slater, as re-
ceiver of the Williams & England
Banking Company, on file herein,
gives full and detailed information
with reference to said checks, and
shows the amount of said claims were
therein deducted from the amount
shown by the books of Gilbert Bros. to
be due W. T. Slater, as receiver.

Seventeenth—Object to the receiver's
said report in general for the re-
ason that he has not complied with the
order of said court in that he has made
no recommendations for or against
any of the claims advanced to him, nor
has he recommended to the court in
any way as to whether any or all of
the claims not mentioned by him are
just or reasonable, nor has he shown
and reported to the court what is the
principle of each of the said claims
upon which interest is allowed, nor
made any recommendations as to
whether said interest claim is just or
at all due. And said objections particu-
larly object to that part of the re-

ceiver's said report wherein he says:

"The total amount of claims present-
ed, including those after date set for
presentation, amount to \$106,852.98;
this is exclusive of the most of the in-
terest upon the interest-bearing certifi-
cates of deposit," for the reason that
the receiver should have stated what
interest has been claimed upon any of
said certificates of deposit or upon any
of the book accounts where collateral
has been given as security therefor,
and we think it would be of great ad-
vantage to this court to have set out
in detail a full and complete list of
said claims, with the correct amounts
of the original indebtedness on the
date of the failure of said bank, together
with the nature of said indebtedness,
and whether said indebtedness bears
any interest by contract or not, and
complete payments made thereon
since the date of failure, so that the
same may be entered in the journal of
this court when approved and estab-
lished by this court, and shall be in
the form of and constitute a judg-
ment in favor of each of said claim-
ants against the said Gilbert Bros., and
to that end these objections move this
Honorable Court for an order upon
said receiver requiring him to make
further amended report complying
with the foregoing requirements.
