PRISON GUARDED BETTER

Efficiency of Guard System Being Promoted
Sensational Report About Break Leaks Out
Some material improvements in the efficiency of the guards and the systems of guarding at the state penitentiary have been inaugurated since the escape of Tracy and Merrill. In the first place, the number of guards has been increased slightly, as has already been announced in The Journal, and the day guards have all been replaced with modern 30-33 rifles to replace the antiquated firearms that were formerly in use at the prison. The night guards carry shotguns, loaded with buckshot. These weapons are considered more effective at night than a rifle. With a charge of buckshot, there is greater liability, in the darkness, of hitting the enemy.
Rifle practice, which had been abandoned, has been resumed under Second Warden Dilley. Several of the guards have become quite accurate in the use of rifles at a distance of 300 yards.
Plans have about been formed for a movable target. The reason assigned for discontinuing target practice was the lack of funds on the part of the state to purchase ammunition, and the unwillingness of the guards themselves to assume the expense.
Greater precaution is also taken to defeat outside interference. Formerly during the noon hour, when the prisoners were locked in their cells, not a guard was left on the walls, and a guard was not to be seen anywhere. The question is a difficult one to answer, but brings out one fact in connection with the escape of Tracy and Merrill, that has not yet received much attention. The citizen referred to contends that but for these ladders, the escape of the two desperadoes, which probably might not have been defeated, would have been more difficult and more probable of failure.
A New Guard Post.
The construction of a new guard post on the east wall of the prison enclosure is in progress. This will reduce the distance between the guard posts there to about 350 feet, where before the posts on this section of the wall were 700 feet apart.
Were Guards Hiding?
The report has gained circulation that when Second Warden Dilley and Turney McCormick mounted the penitentiary wall surrounding the enclosure, on the morning of the escape of Tracy and Merrill, that they found two of the guards hiding themselves behind the stone wall on the foot bridge, and, although armed, they were making no effort to intercept the escape of the two convicts. While this report could not be officially confirmed, the rumor has just leaked out, and it is known that the prison management has been suppressing the story. There must be something in the report, for, upon request, one of the two guards gave his resignation, and it is alleged that the other man does not have any mortgage on his job.

SPRAYING DESTROYS INDUSRYT

Bee Raising Not Successfully Followed
Where Blooming Trees Receive Insecticides
A. J. Pruitt, who manages a large apiary near the state fair grounds, reports that the extensive spraying of vines and trees that is resorted to in this section, is proving a serious injury to the bee industry, and is defeating the successful raising of bees. Mr. Pruitt says that in three years he has been able, with an original 12 swarms, to raise but one swarm. He has made a particular study of the bee-raising business, and from the investigations that he has made, he concludes that the use of poisonous solutions for spraying during the blooming period is responsible for these conditions.
Mr. Pruitt explains his view of the matter in this wise: He says that the bees, in fertilizing the fruit, collect the poisonous ingredients of the spraying solution, and carry the same into their hives, and this kills the young bees in their cells. This statement naturally suggests the query: If the foregoing be true, is it not possible that the honey that is taken from these same hives may not be impure and injurious, since it must contain the same poisonous substances that kill the young bees. Mr. Pruitt says that in Ohio there is a state law against the spraying of trees and vines during the time that they are in bloom. It is contended that such a statutory provision should be in force in Oregon.
The extermination of the bee family in this manner, for that Mr. Pruitt considers to be the certain result, unless some restriction be placed in the matter of spraying, will eventually bring about a strange and probably undreamed of condition. Since the bees are essential for fertilization purposes, their extermination would bring about not only a reduced quantity of fruit, but fruit of an inferior quality. At any rate the subject, as volunteered by Mr. Pruitt, is deserving of a serious consideration in the interest of the bee producing industry, as well as the raising of fruit.
