FRANK INGRAM FREE.

Frank Ingram, who was sentenced from Lin county for murder, and lost a leg in the struggle with Merrill, when Merrill and Tracy made the break, was released from prison Saturday evening.

He is turned out by the state penitentiary after having given the state eleven years at the blacksmith forge in the state work house. He has earned thousands of dollars for the state, above his keeping.

The law gives each convict a suit of clothes and \$5, but as no money was appropriated the prison officials have not been paying them anything.

In this case the superintendent of the prison gave Ingram 50 cents, Joe James, the warden, gave him \$1.50, and he was sent down into the city.

He immediately went to work selling chances on a fine set of fire tongs and hearth implements, and met with a hearty response at the hands of the Salem people.

If Ingram can raise enough to buy himself a limb he can go to work at his trade, but it would be more humane if some of our citizens would help him to get a start in life, as coming out of prison with only one leg is a hard way to begin the struggle for an existence.

Two Men Badly Injured While Playing With Powder.

Astoria, Aug. 4.—Two men, Al Abel and Jess Cheshire, nearly had their heads blown off here yesterday afternoon in an attempt to burn some powder. One of the men had been given about a pound of powder to throw overboard, but he and his companion decided to burn it, if possible, it having been damaged. They spread the powder out on the street and ignited a fuse that had been attached to it. As it did not burn immediately they approached, and while their faces were over the powder it exploded. Cheshire had his face, ears and hair badly burned, while Abel had his mouth open and inhaled some of the burning powder. The latter's condition is critical, and he is not expected to recover from the shock. Abel's home is in Eugene, and he was in the Philippines with the Second Oregon.

New York, Aug. 2.—Dr. George Barney, who innoculated with consumption germs Miss Emma King, the nurse, who lately committed suicide, was arrested today and charged with libel on complaint of a Brooklyn paper, which alleged that Barney had circulated the report that the managing editor had attempted to blackmail him out of \$5000.

Hamilton, O., Aug. 4.—Hamilton is bedecked with the American and German colors, in honor of the scores of visitors here for the Kreiger Fete of the Deutscher Krieger Unterstutzungs Vexel. The society is a mutual aid organization of German ex-soldiers, and is national in its scope. The attendance at the present meeting is already unusually large, although the real business of the gathering does not commence until tomorrow. Delegations are here from Chicago, East St. Louis, Cincinnati, Toledo, San Antonio and numerous other cities.

He is expected to remain at Cowes through the regatta week, when his American-built yacht, Meteor III, will compete for the King's cup.

Kewick, Ont., Aug. 4.—The Rev. Charles H. Hainer, of this place, and his six sons, all ministers of the gospel, met in family reunion today at Lake Simcoe. The father is a member of the Baptist church, as are four of his sons, who have charges at Norris town, N. J., Kewick, N. J., Providence, R. I., and Kewick, Ont. The other sons are members of the Christian church, and are located at Irvington, N. J., and Oshawa, Can. There was another son, also a minister, who died some years ago. Dr. Hainer is proud of his family, and believes it is without a parallel in America.

Columbus, O., Aug. 4.—A half dozen special coaches, making up the "Ohio Brigade Special," will be pulled out of Columbus tomorrow morning en route to San Francisco. The train will bear the delegations from this city, Toledo, Cleveland and other points in the state to the meeting of the supreme lodge Knights of Pythias, to be held August 10th. The trip will be made by way of Kansas City, Denver and Salt Lake City, and brief stops will be made at those points, to enable the tourists to do some sight-seeing.

The annual apportionment of school moneys to the several counties of the state has been made by State Treasurer Moore. The money is derived from the interest on the irrevocable school fund, and is distributed to the several counties in proportion to the school population. The amount distributed this year was \$214,639.35, and the per capita was \$1.55. Marion county, with a school population of 9356, received \$14,584.30.
