DIED NEXT DAY

End of Violently Insane Lane County Farmer

Wade Martin, aged 55 years, formerly of Lane county, died at the insane asylum Monday, on the day following his commitment. Of the case the Eugene Guard of Monday evening has the following:

"About 5 o'clock Sunday morning Sheriff Withers received a telephone message from Pleasant Hill, requesting him to go to that place and arrest Martin, who had been suddenly attacked with a fit of insanity. He began running around the place in his night clothes, shouting and gestulating, badly frightening the family and neighbors. When Sheriff Withers arrived there it was with difficulty that he got him into the vehicle. He brought him to Eugene, and when he was placed in the county jail he fought the officers, and when locked up his ravings could be heard for blocks. He was examined by Drs. W. L. Cheshire and N. L. Lee before Judge Kincaid, and taken to Salem in the afternoon by Sheriff Withers and Galsay Mathews. Mr. Withers says Martin was the worst case of insanity he ever saw.

Martin was a well known farmer of the Pleasant Hill neighborhood, having lived there many years. He was 55 years old, and leaves a wife. This was his first attack of insanity, which was probably brought on by a hard blow which he received on the head several years ago by being thrown from a horse.

FIRST MOTOR CYCLE

Salem Mailing Clerk Who Is Speedy

Ben Taylor can be called the speedy man in the Salem postoffice department. He rode the first high bicycle in this city. He had to mount it from a step-ladder, and could be heard coming 40 rods away. He got the first "safety," as they were called, or pneumatic tube wheel, that many country people thought would run on the water. Now he is the first to get a motor cycle, and comes sailing down the avenue like a steam locomotive under a full head of steam. He is the mailing clerk at the postoffice, and if any of our readers miss getting their papers they will conclude this article has made him hotter than his bicycle when his machine pumps up a long grade.

It is known that Lyons has always taken a more or less prominent part in the pursuit of Tracy, and his leaving at this time, and the further fact that he left in company with Second Warden Dilley, and the fact that they were both armed, even if they did smuggle their 30-30's into the baggage car, strengthens the belief that they have really gone to resume the search for the fugitive convict. Both are daring, and their successful capture of the daring criminal would furnish their friends sincere grounds for offering congratulations, to which they certainly would be entitled.

STRANGER BADLY SCARED

Narrowly Escaped Drowning In Willamette Monday

But for the prompt action of the operators of the Willamette river ferry Monday afternoon, a young man aged 18 years, and a stranger in this city, would surely have been drowned.

The young man was in the river bathing, and attempted to swim across the stream, when he was seized with cramps, and called for help. The men who were operating the ferry saw in an instant the young man's plight, and Jesse Pettyjohn hastily detached the rowboat from the side of the ferry and rowed to the rescue of the helpless swimmer. The lad was reached none too soon, for he was in the act of sinking when dragged into the boat. Nothing was learned of the adventurous young man, other than that he was a stranger in these parts, and that he was not swimming to escape from the hot sun. At the point where the lad had attempted to swim the stream the river is probably three-quarters of a mile wide, and to accomplish the feat is a task not to be undertaken by an amateur.

BAD FIRE RAGING

Serious North Salem Fire This Afternoon

Residence and Other Buildings Are Burned

Fire at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon burned to the ground the residence of John Hoff, a recent arrival from Nebraska, and also destroyed the barn of E. C. Minton, and laid in ashes about 20 cords of fine cord wood. So far as could be learned there was no insurance on any of the property that was destroyed. The fire is still raging as this report closes, but is practically under control, since it will necessarily have to confine itself to the burning buildings, as there are none others in the line of the severe wind that was blowing during the blaze.

The origin of the blaze, that would have been even more destructive, had the wind been blowing from almost any other direction, was from a wood saw engine. The engine's smokestack did not have the protection of a screen over the opening, and a spark escaped and was carried directly to the barn, which was filled with hay, and in an instant the structure was a mass of flames. The neighbors responded promptly, and by great effort, saved the home of Mr. Minton from the flames, although the barn and several tons of hay were destroyed. The flames rapidly spread to the home of Mr. Hoff, on the east, and, despite the labors of a volunteer fire brigade of more than a score of men, the home that was recently purchased by Mr. Hoff at a cost of \$1200, was a heap of ruins. In compliance with the rule recently established by the city council, the city fire department did not respond for the reason that the scene of the fire was without the city limits. A few more such fires as North Salem has experienced during the past few months will strikingly illustrate the advantage to be gained by municipal incorporation and the enjoyment of the protection and benefits to be derived therefrom.

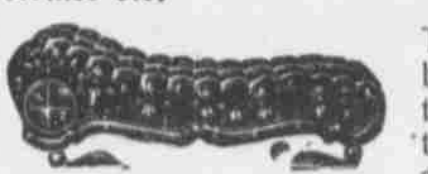
