Is Destroying the Thistle

Street Commissioner Frizzell has employed a man who is destroying the Canadian thistles that have been growing up on the Willamette river bank in the heart of the city. Mr. Frizzell says there is no occasion for any great alarm in the minds of the residents of the city as to the weed, for there is no danger of its spreading and doing any serious amount of damage, for the reason that it grows only from the root and does not produce any seed. In order to satisfy the public mind, however, and to remove all cause of complaint, the commissioner is having the thistles cut down and burned.

CONVICT TRACY KILLS HIMSELF

After a Desperate Battle With a Posse Near Spokane---At 4 o'clock This Morning---The Manhunt Lasted All Night---Governor Geer Notified by the Constable Who Claims He Killed the Desperado.

Scripps News Association Report to The Capital Journal.

Spokane, Aug. 6:--After a desperate battle with the posse, in which he was twice wounded, Harry Tracy killed himself. He was surrounded last night in a swamp eleven miles southeast of Creston, Wash., by Sheriff Gardner who kept him at bay with long distance rifle range fire. Sheriff Cudihoe and three other sheriffs with posses were guarding the roads and trails leading to him. Reinforcements were sent at two o'clock this morning and at four o'clock the killing was effected.

FOUND IN A WHEAT FIELD

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 6:--Harry Tracy, outlaw and murderer, who has been defying the authorities of two states is dead. A hot battle with a posse, in which the bandit was severely, perhaps fatally wounded, was followed by his suicide. The bold murderer was found at an early hour this morning in a wheat field near the town of Fellows, on the Central Washington railroad. When found the dead body of the much-feared convict lay face upwards, while firmly grasped in his right hand was his now famous 30-30. In his left he grasped a 45-Cal. with which Tracy had ended his lawless life. A posse of citizens from Creston will be given the credit for capturing the desperado, and will claim the \$8000. It was yesterday morning that young G. H. Goldfinch came into Creston with the news that Tracy was hiding at the Eddy ranch. The boy said Tracy was there at 7:40 Monday morning. At the time the posse were walking in another section, further south. The word spread quickly and a posse of four citizens was quickly made up. Those in the posse were C. A. Straub, deputy sheriff; Dr. E. C. Lanter; Maurice Smith, attorney; and J. J. Morrison, railway section foreman. The posse made all possible speed to the Eddy ranch. They came upon R. L. Eddy, the proprietor, who was working in a field. While engaged in conversation with Eddy, a man was seen to come out of the barn. Eddy informed the hunters that it was Tracy.

Quickly the party divided. Lanter and Smith accompanying Eddy a short distance toward the barn, while the other men went in a different direction. When Eddy reached the barn Tracy came out to assist in unharassing the team. He carried no rifle, but had a revolver.

He caught sight of the strangers carrying rifles. Turning sharply, he asked Eddy who they were. Eddy informed him. The men stepped closer and commanded the outlaw, "Hold up your hands." Tracy jumped behind Eddy, placing man and horses between himself. The hunters commanded Eddy to lead the horses toward the barn, and when nearly there Tracy made a dash for the barn door, while he reached safely. A few minutes later he again appeared and carried his 30-30. He started on a dead run down the valley. Once he turned and fired a couple of shots at the posse, but to no effect. The posse kept up a steady fire. Tracy soon took shelter behind a rock, and let loose a volley on his pursuers, who saw that his aim was bad. He made a dash for a nearby wheat field. He stumbled on his face as he entered the field, and crawled out of sight. The posse took a commanding position, and whenever the grain was seen to move a shot was fired.

Reinforcements were sent for. Sheriff Gardner rushed up with several men. The field was surrounded, the men waiting for their game. About 6 o'clock a single shot was heard in the field, that was all. This morning the entire hunting force raided the field and came upon the lifeless body of the desperado. His leg had been broken in the fight, and an artery severed, from which he would have bled to death. Tracy had attempted to stop the flow of blood, by binding a strap about his leg, but this did little good. It is thought that, seeing death staring him in the face, Tracy deliberately took his life by placing the muzzle of a 45-Cal. close to his head. This was the single shot heard about 6 o'clock.

Tracy to be identified. An inquest was held over Tracy at Davenport at 2 o'clock. The body will be held until identified by the prison officials from Salem.

Adjutant-General C. V. Gantenbein, of Portland, was in Salem today.

A telephone message from Davenport at 12:40 a. m. states that McGinnis reached there shortly before midnight. Twenty-five armed men have already left in wagons for the scene of the battle. Sheriff Dount, of Spokane county, is also en route to the fugitive's hiding place. In his party are eight or 10 armed men. Another wagon load of men hunters left at 2 a. m. this morning, and more will go as soon as daylight breaks.

Sheriff Cudihoe, of King county, is guarding the Sprague road, while Sheriff De Bolt is on the road leading to Edwall.

GOVERNOR GEER NOTIFIED THIS MORNING WAS TRACY KILLED

Governor T. T. Geer, Salem Ore. Creston Wn., Aug. 5, 9:20 A. M.--Posse Consisting of Morris Smith, Frank Sillengreen, Joe Morrison, E. C. Lauder, headed by Constable C. A. Straub, captured Tracy and turned him over to Sheriff Gardner dead this morning. Signed, C. A. Straub, Constable.

His Trusty Winchester Did the Work

CONFIRMED FROM 'FRISCO. San Francisco, Aug. 6:--Tracy committed suicide near Davenport, after being wounded. His body is now at Davenport.

Spokane, Aug. 6:--Tracy killed himself at 11 o'clock last night in a swamp near the Eddy farm, 11 miles from Creston. He had spent two days on the Eddy farm. A boy who saw him, carried the news to Sheriff Gardner, who rushed to the scene with the posse. Tracy retreated to a swamp, and gave battle for four hours. Late last night a long-range duel was fought, the posse centering their fire upon the spot where Tracy was believed to be in the tall grass. The posse heard a shot about 11 o'clock, but did not dare venture into the swamp until morning. The outlaw was found dead, shot through the heart with his famous Winchester. He had been severely wounded, and his leg broken. The body was brought to Davenport. Reinforcements were hurrying to Gardner's assistance when the news of the finding of the body arrived.

Tracy escaped from the Oregon penitentiary ten weeks ago, and has killed eight men. The authorities of Oregon and Washington have spent \$40,000 in trying to capture him.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 6:--Harry Tracy, escaped convict and murderer, is surrounded in a swamp near the Eddy farm, 11 miles southeast of Creston, Wash. For four hours before the special messenger left for reinforcements, a long-range rifle duel between Tracy and the posse of eight men, headed by Sheriff Gardner, had been in progress.

This news was brought to Creston by Jack McGinnis, a liverman, of Harrington, who is a member of Sheriff Gardner's posse. He was met near Creston at 11 o'clock by a news paper correspondent, who, with another man, had left at 1 a. m. for the Eddy ranch. McGinnis proceeded at once to Davenport for reinforcements. Tracy lingered near the Eddy ranch house, which he had occupied for two days and nights. A young man who saw him there gave the news to Gardner, and the sheriff at once raced with his posse to the scene.

BATHERS' LUCKY RESCUE

Five Portland Ladies Narrowly Escape Drowning

Portland, Aug. 6:--Mrs. G. R. Cellars, Miss Gertrude Polivka, Miss Martha Polivka, Miss Mabel Ayres and Miss Rothchild, of Portland, narrowly escaped drowning at Gearhart Park Sunday. They were in bathing, when the constant drag of the undertow swept them into a long crab-pool, which extended to the mouth of the Necanicum. Here the water was up to their necks, and in spite of every effort, each retreating wave left them with a more precarious foothold on the shifting sand at the edge of the pool. Just as exhaustion was taking away their last strength Frank Rothchild, of the Famous Clothing Company, plunged in and grasped the nearest one. Having retained hold of hands, the weakened bathers were dragged in tandem-wise, and, by the aid of Gus Kinney, safely landed on the beach.

Here it was found that Mrs. Cellars was so prostrated that saving her life was a question simply of moments. By great good fortune Miss Winifred Elorall, of the Good Samaritan Hospital was at hand. In the presence of a helpless crowd she bent all her energies to saving Mrs. Cellars. For 12 minutes no pulse was perceptible. Brandy and restoratives had to be got from a distance, and when they came Miss Elorall managed to resuscitate Mrs. Cellars, after 20 minutes' hard work. One of the young women was also in a precarious condition, and on her Miss Elorall exercised her skill, with the result that none of the bathers are much worse for their trying experience. Gearhart Beach will not be long without proper lifelines. W. J. Honeyman will ship a full medical outfit today, in order that hereafter the lives of bathers may not depend on the chance presence of one with skill enough to revive them, when rescued by a man with nerve enough to pull them out.

EUGENE'S LAWYER FARMER

Attorney Woodcock Shows Tact as an Agriculturist

Says the Eugene Guard. "Attorney A. C. Woodcock, of Eugene, in his unique manner of conducting his business affairs is certainly a wonder to the ordinary mind of the law, as he mixes the plodding of agricultural pursuits with that of his profession, says the Harrisburg Bulletin. He has a fine farm of 700 acres near Irving, in Lane county, and this year he expects to realize from his wheat harvest 7000 to 8000 bushels, and he has an ample supply of fodder, fruit and vegetables. He is cultivating 40 acres of stock peas which will be used in the first feeding of his 300 head of hogs. Feeding this lot of hogs is a venture in which he expects to demonstrate to his own satisfaction the profit to be made on raising hogs and fattening them for sale, as the finished product of grain raising."

"Mr. Woodcock's experiment is being closely watched by his less venturesome neighbors, who, when he succeeds, which he is sure to do, will be ready to adopt his plans, and in all probability will claim that they always knew the hog business was the only certain source of profit. However, be that as it may, Farmer Woodcock has shown a degree of energy and tact in the management of his farm that entitles him to a special rating in the category of agriculturists."

Our Minister Has Resigned.

Washington, Aug. 6:--The resignation of Ambassador White was received from Berlin this morning, and immediately forwarded to the president. It is to take effect November 7th.

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WOMAN SMUGGLER FINED.

Paid Four Times the Value of the Articles Smuggled. San Francisco, Aug. 6:--Mrs. H. G. Green, of Portland, Or., paid into the office of the customs collector today \$642, the amount of a fine imposed upon her for having attempted to smuggle in \$152 worth of silk and articles purchased in Japan. The articles had been concealed in the lady's baggage, and not "declared" by her when she arrived in this port. The goods were confiscated, and will be sold for the benefit of the government.

FIRMIN IS IN CONTROL.

Has Set Up Government in Republic of Haiti. Washington, Aug. 6:--Minister Howell, of Port au Prince, telegraphed that General Firmin, on August 4th put up a government, and proclaimed himself president of Haiti, naming Killick as secretary of war and navy, Bourard, secretary of the treasury, and Enriquez on foreign affairs, Louis public minister of works, Chloé minister of the interior and Lamour secretary of agriculture.

Washington, Aug. 6:--An important general order, issued by Chaffee, in the Philippines, was made public today. There are active hostilities in the Philippines. It says the commander has directed special attention to the instruction in discipline of the troops in their regards for human rights.
