SALEM AND A HIGH SCHOOL.

In the pamphlet sent out by the Push Club, no mention is made of the great advantages of coming to Salem to live on account of the excellence of our public schools.

Yet that is the very first thing that people inquire about who come from the East. Beyond running the district in debt, and collecting large sums of interest, nothing was ever done for the Salem schools.

A prominent physician was in Salem recently to find a location, and was greatly pleased with our city. His daughter had finished the common grammar grades, and was ready for the high school. He did not locate.

A family moves from Salem this week or next, to send the children to a high school in a California city.

There is a democracy and a stimulus to the best American effort in a high school that is found by boys and girls in no other institution.

Mary MacLane, of Butte, has written a book that is selling by the thousand, and she has no education but the Butte high school.

Why every first and second-class town in Oregon can have a high school and Salem cannot has not yet been explained. Why all such high school towns can have a lower tax rate than Salem for school purposes has not been explained.

Why Roseburg, Eugene, Albany, Astoria, Pendleton, Baker City, Woodburn and Jefferson can all have high school grades taught in their public schools has not been explained.

Why a prominent college in this city always votes and works to keep down the grades in the public schools is a mystery. Other colleges favor higher grades in the public schools.

The Journal believes that the people believe, there is a nigger in the woodpile somewhere, and he ought to be smoked out.

Let those who are opposed to high school grades in our public schools give their reasons. Let them come out and show their faith in keeping down our public schools, and tell the reason why.

If no good reasons can be given then let Salem have as good public schools as her neighbors, and no longer have the lowest grade public school.

SPANISH WAR PENSIONS.
Commissioner of Pensions Ware is said to be surprised at the number of applications already in for pensions for the volunteers of the Spanish war, which exceeds those of the regulars by more than a thousand. The total number of applications from the volunteer regiments is 2502, and that of the regulars 1855. Four of the volunteer regiments have more applicants for pensions than the Seventh United States infantry, which lost 42 men in battle, and had 99 wounded. The First District of Columbia infantry, which had no killed or wounded, has filed more claims for pensions than any of the five regular regiments, with the exception of the Seventh infantry. Commissioner Ware is credited with the naive explanation that probably many of the men suffering from the effects of the tropical climate at first thought their health was seriously impaired, and will withdraw their claims when they discover their error.
