REVEREND JOSEPH SCHELL

Well Known Priest
Charges Fraud

Was Offered \$2500 to Drop
the Matter

Involves the Names of Prom-
inent Oregon Politicians

Sumpter, Or., Aug. 4, 1902.

Editor Journal:
Enclosed find some articles for pub-
lication. Others will follow. I have
sent the same letters with this mail to
the Oregonian, which will, of course
not print it, and to the Portland Jour-
nal, which will print them. Only
\$2500 were offered to me if I would
drop all matters, but I could not see
it that way. Yours,

Sumpter, Or., Aug. 4, 1902.

For the last three years a notorious
swindle of timber lands was studiously
planned and attempted by C. Thayer,
banker of Tillamook, under the pro-
tection of Oregon's most prominent
men and politicians, which is an open
disgrace and insult to the citizens of
this state, hence silence is no longer a
virtue. In a few successive articles I
will bring forth the object, the subject,
as well as the friendly and political
auxiliaries tending toward the same
fraud. I will show C. Thayer, banker
of Tillamook, the perpetrator, who,
under the protective wing of a politi-
cal clique, consisting of C. H. Carey,
J. H. Hall, United States attorney of
Oregon; E. May, his assistant; Sen-
ator J. H. Mitchell, Congressman Thos.
H. Tongue, Geo. C. Brownell and the
editor of the Oregonian, could carry
on such an open farce before the pub-
lic, and mock at the government for
the last three years. I will be short
and plain, and will call white what is
white, and yellow what is yellow. I
kindly invite each one of the above
gentlemen to reply and disprove what
I will say, if they can do so. I have
often heard from Mitchell-Carey engi-
neers that the Simon machine is a swin-
dle and a humbug, but the Carey-
Mitchell-Scott machine, as facts here-
after will show, is the greatest hum-
bug that ever deceived the people of
Oregon. I hope that I will not be in
need of either of the swindling ma-
chines. One thing I must say that the
Simon machine was not under steam
to favor a wholesale timber land fraud
against the government and the citi-
zens of this state. A good or bad ma-
chine, political or otherwise, is known
by its good or bad work, which will be
demonstrated hereafter.

Efforts to make the Tillamook tim-
ber land frauds a success have during
the last three years, under many and
various fraudulent evidences, ap-
peared before the Oregon City land of-
fice. I have called the special atten-
tion of Hon. F. A. Hitchcock, secretary
of the department of the interior, and
in reply he has sent out Special Inspec-
tor Greene, who has amply verified and
testified to this existing swindle, cov-
ered and protected with a political net-
work. I made a trip to Washington,
D. C., in order to see that the matter
would not be shelved, and that politi-
cal pressure and influence had no effect.
Secretary M. A. Hitchcock, after be-
ing thoroughly convinced of the exist-
ence of the swindle, has officially or-
dered a speedy and vigorous investiga-
tion and prosecution before the courts
to punish the perpetrators, and that

right, we will insist upon an impar-

disinterested persons.

already three months ago, but his or-
ders are ignored by the officers here.
C. H. Carey, the head of the political
clique behind it, said: "I'll see that
no one hurts C. Thayer," and with his
political whip brings into action all
and whatever power he can command
to defend and protect C. Thayer, the
perpetrator, whose fraudulent pedigree
will be given in another article. For
over two years and a half I have done
my best in a peaceable way to stop
C. Thayer to defraud the public, but of
no avail. The time is up; 40 days
more without indictment would allow
him to go laughing up his sleeve. I
have used from a gentle whip to a
sledge hammer, without success, hence
I must go one better, and experiment
with dynamite. The statute of limita-
tions is the prospective shelter where
C. Thayer and his auxiliaries are
headed for cover from the attacks in
this case, but a few days intervene,
and with some obstacles to overcome.
My challenge to C. Thayer, to C. H.
Carey and his auxiliaries, constitutes
a few more articles which will not be
lacking in details, nor in issue, of
which the above is only a prologue
and program, and a part of the intro-
duction.

There is no time to be lost to save
to the people of Oregon the best and
most valuable timber lands of the
state. There are other men and com-
panies who are at the present time tak-
ing up timber claims by the wholesale
in some southern county, all in a fraud-
ulent manner, and for one and the
same party, against the law. The best
way to get acquainted with the unlaw-
ful acts of these men and companies is
to drive them in the open field and
make them fight.

Letter to Hitchcock.

Sumpter, Or., July 31, 1902.

Hon. E. A. Hitchcock, Secretary of
the Interior, Washington, D. C.:
Sir: Your special instructions of
three months ago, "to cause an inves-
tigation to be prosecuted with the ut-
most promptness and vigor, to the end
that the parties principally concerned
in the transaction of the famous Till-
amook land cases, may be promptly
prosecuted in the courts, and punished
as their misdeeds require," are strict-
ly ignored by the officers here. In-
stead of 40 days the statutes of limita-
tions will allow C. Thayer, of Till-
amook, to go free, if he is not indicted
before. C. Thayer is not sick, as his
friends claim him to be.

C. H. Carey, the Mitchell politi-
cal leader, has put himself on record
that none shall burst C. Thayer, J. H.
Hall, the United States attorney of Or-
e-gon, is a political partner, and under
the political whip of C. H. Carey, and
we cannot, and does not want to, pro-
secute C. Thayer, and, in case that he
should, the issue will be a farce.
The successor of J. Hall cannot be
recommended by Senator Mitchell or
Congressman Tongue, or by anybody
else, unless he is a willing instrument
of C. H. Carey, the defender and the
mask of C. Thayer, the perpetra-
tor.

SAVED HER HOME

Mrs. Gilbert has Transferred
Her Dower Interest

To all Real Estate in Exchange
for Home Property.

A. T. Gilbert and wife on Tuesday
afternoon filed with the circuit court
a proposition by which Mrs. Gilbert
agrees to transfer to the receiver of the
defunct bank her dower interest to
all real estate involved in the bank
litigation provided the receiver be
directed to make a deed to her of her
home property on Marion and Water
streets, in this city, and also execute
a bill of sale to her for all household
goods and the team and carriage. The
proposition has been accepted by W.
M. Kaiser, attorney for Timon Ford,
executor of the estate of the late Wm.
Casper, who is the principal claimant
in the pending case, and the attorneys
for the other interested parties and the
intervenor, have accepted the propo-
sition. The matter was formally
presented to Circuit Judge Boise yester-
day afternoon for his consideration.
He announced that he would continue
the consideration of the proposition
until morning.

The estimate value of the dower in-
terest of Mrs. Gilbert in the property
that it is proposed to transfer to the
receiver is given at about \$20,000,
which, the Gilberts allege, exceeds the
valuation of the property that they
desire to have transferred to them.
The property to which Mrs. Gilbert
agrees to relinquish her dower inter-
est consists of business and residence
property in Moscow, Idaho; Buena
Vista, Newport, Salem and Portland,
and also includes a fourth interest in
five quartz mines in the Bohemia min-
ing district.

In this same case the First National
Bank of Corvallis has filed an amend-
ed claim for an alleged balance of
\$218,76.

Proposition is Accepted.

Judge Boise heard some arguments
in the case this morning. G. G. Bling-
ham, who appeared for the receiver,
said there was no objection on the part
of Receiver Gatch to the accept-
ance of the proposition, since it would
facilitate the administration of the es-
tate, but he wished to be advised in
the matter of the household goods, to
which he would be expected to give a
bill of sale. In their petition, the Gil-
berts claimed to be possessed of
household goods of the value of \$300,
while an inventory of the effects had
disclosed about \$1500 worth of goods.
McNary and Ford considered the ques-
tion of the controversy an unimpor-
tant one, since large interests
would be served by the acceptance of
the proposition, and the delivery to the
Gilberts of their entire stock of house-
hold goods. After some further argu-
ment, Judge Boise directed Receiver
Gatch to execute to Mrs. Gilbert a
deed to her home property in this city,
and to give her a bill of sale to her
household effects and team and car-
riage, and in return therefor to re-
ceive deeds conveying to himself, as
the receiver, the dower interest of
Mrs. Gilbert to all of the real estate
involved in the litigation. In passing
upon the matter Judge Boise said he
considered it was in the interest of
the estate that the dower interest of
the wife might be acquired, as a means
of expediting the settlement of the re-
ceivership.

Judge Boise directed the receiver to
address a letter to all claimants hold-
ing collateral claims against the estate
to report the amount of the collections they
have made thereon since the bank
failure, that credit may be given there-
on on their respective claims against
the bank, and that where the collat-
eral claims have been paid in full, the
amount of the original claim, then
the account will be extinguished, and
any balance that may exist will re-
vert to the receiver.

Sunday Business Excursion.

The first Sunday business men's ex-
cursion to the seaside at Newport will
be given by the Southern Pacific on
next Sunday, the train leaving Salem
at 6 a. m., and returning in the even-
ing.

If this train is patronized, it will be
made a regular feature, and at \$2.50
for the round trip, about one cent a
mile, it ought to get a large crowd.

Starting the train from Salem, in-
stead of Albany, will give the excu-
sion a big line of business that it never
had before, and residents of the
Capital City will enjoy the ride over
the mountains, the cooling breezes
and a dip in the surf.

The Second Regiment band have ar-
ranged to go over to Newport on the
Sunday excursion, and will remain
two weeks.
