LIED TO THE SENATE

Corporal O'Brien Has Been Arrested

For Giving False Testimony in the Philippines Inquiry

Election Troubles in the South Cause Bloodshed

Washington, Aug. 7.—Corporal O'Brien, arrested at North Adams, Mass., and charged with perjury, was indicted by the District of Columbia grand jury. The fact was kept from the public until the arrest was made. O'Brien is charged with giving false testimony before the Senate committee regarding the alleged outrages of Filipino women by American soldiers. O'Brien is apparently unrepentant, and says he can produce witnesses to prove his statements are true.

Nashville, Aug. 7.—The first election troubles are reported from Greenville, Jackson county, where Tom Brooks and John Carter and Bud and Leslie Lynch got into a fight at Flynn's Lick, a short distance from Greenville. Brooks drew a gun and killed the two Lynch boys. Sam Hightcock attempted to take a hand, and was killed by Carter. A bystander was shot in the leg. More trouble is feared.

GIRLS CAUGHT ON A TRESTLE.

Excursion Train Killed Two and Injured Three.
Hopkinsville, Ky., Aug. 7.—An excursion train on the Illinois Central caught five young women on a high trestle Wednesday afternoon. Two were crushed to death.

Gage Suit Will Be Tried.
San Francisco, Aug. 7.—Superior Judge Cook today dismissed the writ of prohibition applied for by Governor Gage, restraining the local courts from trying the libel suit. The trial begins this afternoon.

Railway Property Burned.
Bedford, Ind., Aug. 7.—The Monon railway freight house and passenger station was burned this morning. Many cars in the yard were consumed. Loss \$100,000.

Minor Mention Local Import

Willamette valley towns unanimously report Wednesday as a scorcher, and the hottest day of the season.

Mrs. Ruth Wasson, an Oregon pioneer of 1850, died at her home in Lebanon, Ore., last night, after an illness of seven months, aged 75 years. Mrs. Wasson, whose maiden name was Kees, was born in Pennsylvania, and with her parents crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852, and located near Lebanon, where she has since lived. She was married in 1851. Her husband died about three years ago. She leaves two children.

About \$15,000 worth of property at Truckee, California, was destroyed at an early hour Wednesday morning. The flames broke out in an unoccupied house, and spread to adjoining property, damaging D. J. Smith's hotel and other buildings.

Circuit Judge Boise this morning dismissed the temporary injunction in the case of the Union Light & Power Company vs. John Lichty, until September 1st, when the case will be taken up on its merits. This ruling is practically a victory for Lichty, who will have the use of the stream, and is allowed to proceed with the construction of the dam that will enable him to float logs from the mountain to his mill.

Pacific Coast Briefs.

J. E. Flynn, of Portland, was walking along the railway trestle near the O. R. & N. wharf, at Astoria, about 6 o'clock Wednesday evening when he was struck by the locomotive on the Seaside train. He was thrown several feet into the air, and struck on his head in the river. On being taken to the hospital it was found that two of his ribs were broken, and his collarbone fractured. One of the ribs had penetrated his lungs. His left hip and leg were also badly fractured. There is little hope of his recovery.

The Board of Control at Olympia, Wash., has advertised for 3200 bales of jute of the same brand used last year. This is 800 more bales than called for then. About 400,000 more sacks were made this year than the year previous. The bids are to be opened August 22d, and the cost of the jute bought, which comes from Calcutta, India, will amount to about \$17,000.

A Dastardly Crime

Port Worth, Tex., Aug. 7.—C. Diaz, a Mexican criminally assaulted a woman near Eagle Pass, Tuesday. Her two small children screamed and were shot dead before the eyes of the mother. When a posse attempted the man's arrest, one man was killed.

Car Tie-up Continues

New Haven, Conn., Aug. 7.—The street car strike continues, and the tie-up is complete. The majority of the people sympathize with the strikers, who are threatened with the extinction of their union.

LANE COUNTY IOWANS

Form An Organization At Eugene

The Eugene Register has the following account of the meeting to observe Iowa day in Lane county:

Enthusiastic "natives" of the "Hawkeye" state met in the East park at 1 p. m. yesterday, and formerly merged themselves into an "Iowa Association." Objects and aims of the organization, as set forth, are to promote the social relations of its members, and to extend a welcome to home-seekers from their native state. After electing C. J. Dodd and E. F. Chapman temporary chairman and secretary, respectively, business of the meeting was carried forward with dispatch.

The election of permanent officers resulted as follows: E. F. Chapman, president; J. T. Rowland, first vice-president; Warren Brown, secretary; Miss Ella Travis, treasurer. H. L. Rann was appointed vice-president for North Junction precinct; C. J. Dodd for Springfield; James Higgins and Charles Dickerson for South Junction.

F. A. Rankin, chairman of the committee appointed to secure a meeting place, reported having obtained the refusal of the city hall, providing dates be chosen that will not conflict with meetings concerning the municipality.

F. A. Rankin, H. J. Rankin and J. S. Stiles were appointed a committee to revise the constitution and by-laws of the association and to obtain an audience with the carnival board, with a view to extending the carnival one more day, to be designated as "Iowa Day," festivities of the day to be conducted by the Iowans. There being no further business, the association adjourned to meet pursuant to the call of the chairman.

POLITICS IN THE SOUTH

A Hundred and Fifty Deputies

Both Parties Are Fighting for Supremacy

And Injunction Suits Galore Are On Tap

Knoxville, Tenn., Aug. 7.—Excitement ran high today over the election. Several Republicans secured a mandatory injunction last night before Judge Hicks against several Democrats, including Judge Sneed and Sheriff Fox. At midnight a number of prominent Democrats chartered a special and returned to Athens after Judge Allen, and returned with him. A counter injunction will be asked for. Fox has 150 deputies. All available firearms have been sold early in the week.

Within half an hour of its dismissal another writ of prohibition, returnable Saturday, was issued on the application of J. R. McMurry, who objects to the trial on the grounds of the taxpayers' interests. This is the third writ.

Judge Allen has dissolved Hicks' injunction. The pools were late in opening. Two years ago the Republicans seized the ballot box and conducted the election. The bitterest feeling prevails.

Affairs of all Nations

Russia is desirous of a renewal of the commercial treaty with Germany.

Barcelona is surrounded by revolutionists; they demand complete surrender.

Dress rehearsals for the coronation ceremony are being held in Westminster abbey.

Members in the British House of Commons criticize the government policy in Europe and China.

Serious complications have arisen in Panama, which may result in a call to the United States to protect British interests there.

U. S. Tariff Commissioner Shanetta reports that Chinese are oppressed to the verge of penury by government taxation.

The U. S. government is chagrined to find that the Philippine friars had disposed of all their holdings before the American occupation.

Baroness Von Angenau, a noted Austrian Philanthropist, was seized with a fit while bathing in the Bangor baths, in Wales, today and was drowned.

An official bulletin issued this morning says King Edward bore the journey to London without the least fatigue; passed a good night, and is in improved health, and the wound is practically healed.

WORK TRAIN WRECKED

Two Engineers and Seven Laborers Killed

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 7.—At 1:20 o'clock yesterday afternoon a work train and a freight train collided on the Omaha division of the St. Paul, eight miles west of Rhodes, Ia., killing both engineers instantly, as well as seven laborers. Twenty others, all laborers, were injured. From information in the general superintendent's office, it appears that the work train in charge of Conductor Craig started west from Rhodes without orders.

COAL MINES ARE RUINED

A Loss of Millions in the Shenandoah Mining District

Shenandoah, Pa., Aug. 7.—William Stolt, state mine inspector for the Shenandoah region, announces that five collieries under his jurisdiction, which have an estimated total value of \$1,500,000, have been rendered useless by reason of being flooded, and have been permanently abandoned by the companies owning them. Four of them—Bear Run, East Bear Ridge, Kohinor and Preston No. 3—belong to the Philadelphia & Reading Coal & Coke Company, and he places their value about \$300,000 each. The other colliery, the Lawrence, is owned by the Shafter estate, of Pottsville, and also represents about \$200,000. Mr. Stolt says that out of the 35 collieries in his district, only 14 are in condition for immediate operation if the strike were ended. The others are in such a condition that it would require anywhere from one to four months to clear them of water and make repairs. He said the average time would be about two months.

The abandonment of the five collieries will compel 2000 miners to seek employment in other parts of the region, and they may have trouble in finding it if the thousands of men who have left the region during the strike should return.

Shenandoah, Pa., Aug. 7.—The strike situation this morning is practically unchanged. The disorderly element has come, in the opinion of the soldiers, to mean business. "Unconditional surrender" is the basis of settlement demanded by the operators, while the miners see nothing but victory. A joint meeting of the miners will be held today.

WILL BE BROUGHT HERE

Body Will Reach Salem Friday

Citizens Protest At Public Exhibition of Remains

Governor Has Been Appealed to in the Matter

Governor Geer was this morning advised by Governor McBride, of Washington, that the body of Tracy would be shipped direct from Vancouver to Salem, and it is expected that the remains will arrive in this city Friday morning.

Governor Geer has said that the men comprising the posse surrounding Tracy are entitled to the reward offered by the state, since they were the cause of the convict committing suicide. In view of this fact, the governor holds that the men are as much to be credited with the death of the desperado as if they had killed him directly.

In discussing the matter of the reward, and the possible controversy that will attend its disbursement, Superintendent Lee said he was in hopes the Washington claimants of the reward would send an agent to Oregon to accept the reward money from the state, and then decide upon the terms of its distribution by arbitration or in the courts. This plan would relieve the people of this state of a probable protracted controversy over the division of \$1500.

Several of the prominent citizens of this city have telegraphed Governor Geer, who is en route to Medford, against the public exhibition of the body of Tracy in Salem. Two largely signed protesting telegrams have already been forwarded to the chief executive, of which the following is one: Governor T. T. Geer:

On Train at Medford:—We respectfully, but earnestly, protest against public exhibition of Tracy's body in this city, as subversive of public morals and decency. N. J. Judah, Henry B. Thielson, Claud Gatch, A. Bush, W. F. Boothby, G. B. Gray, C. A. Gray and J. H. Albert.

The hundreds of friends of the bereaved families have no feeling of sympathy for Tracy. Mrs. Frank H. Ferrell, wife of one of the murdered guards, is again seriously ill at her home in this city. Her illness at this time is of a more serious nature than at any time during her continued indisposition since the death of her husband.

The Goldfinch boy who carried the news of Tracy's presence at the Eddy barn is certainly entitled to full consideration in the division of the Tracy reward. He directed the officers to where the outlaw was sequestered, and did it under threat of death from Tracy, when those officers were entirely off the track as to his whereabouts. He is a young hero, and should be remembered in the division of the spoils.

Proceeds to Ingram.

The suggestion is made that thousands of people will want to see the dead convict, and if his body is exhibited an admission fee should be charged, and the proceeds go to Frank Ingram, who lost his leg in the battle inside of the prison walls at the time Tracy and Merrill made their now famous escape.

Will Not Be Exhibited.
Superintendent Lee, of the state prison, announces that the body of Tracy will not be publicly exhibited at the morgue upon its arrival in this city, as was proposed. This action is taken, in view of the fact that any public exhibition of the remains has been vigorously protested against by the prominent citizens of the city, including the circuit and supreme judges. Mr. Lee has stated that the body, upon its arrival here, will be conveyed directly to the penitentiary where, after it has been satisfactorily identified, it will be interred in the prison burying grounds.

Draws Curious Crowds.
Spokane, Aug. 7.—Tracy's body has been embalmed, and is being viewed by hundreds of people at Vancouver. When the inquest is completed it will be taken to Salem for burial.

Big Damage Done.
Denver, Aug. 7.—Cloudbursts and heavy rains, in a few hours yesterday, damaged the Rio Grande and Colorado Midland railroads to the extent of \$100,000 and possibly more. Seven bridges are gone on the Rio Grande and many miles of track washed out in different places. On the Colorado Midland, three bridges were destroyed and the track inundated or washed out between Maniton and Cascade. The Rio Grande westbound trains are running to Colorado Springs over the Rio Grande tracks, thence over the Cripple Creek line to Cripple Creek, over the Midland Terminal to Divide, and thence over the Colorado Midland to Leadville. The same route is used returning. The Colorado Midland trains are running by the same route.

FOR TAMMANY LEADERSHIP.

Devery's Campaign One of the Opera Bouffe Variety.

(Journal's News Letter.)
It will not do to make light of ex-Chief of Police Devery's campaign for the Ninth assembly district. His campaign is indeed of the "opera bouffe" variety, but it may win, nevertheless. If he carries the district, Devery will become a power in New York politics, and it is believed that his contest for the leadership in this district is only a preliminary to a contest for the leadership of the entire Tammany organization. Devery's campaign certainly has its humorous and picturesque features, but it also has a serious aspect. For it is essentially a campaign of "graffiti," and is most demoralizing in its effects. Direct bribery of voters would be scarcely less so. If Devery should become a leader of Tammany, he would be almost as dangerous as Croker in his best days.

A Cyclone's Blighting Work.

Wilmington, N. C., Aug. 7.—A cyclone passed over Carolina Beach, 15 miles below here, last night, and blew down the pavilion, injuring 16 people, some probably fatally.
