ENGLAND IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Joseph Chamberlain, colonial secretary, is quoted as saying: "We have no intention that the Boers should break with their old traditions. We desire that they should preserve all the best characteristics of their race and hope they will shake hands with us, thus securing prosperity in South Africa under the flag that protects all different races and religions."

If this is to represent England's attitude in South Africa, and there is no reason to believe that it is not, the future of a great commonwealth is assured. The Boers have great virtues as a race. They are an invaluable element in the founding of an empire. Under such institutions as may now be established they will develop along broader lines than was possible in their own little republic, and grow into a greater people, while by the intermingling of races they will contribute strong blood to the composite race that will come in time to be South African.

Chamberlain has not always spoken so wisely about the South African situation. But a great and expensive war teaches both parties to it. The Boers take a broader view of the world about them, while the English have more respect for the tremendous vitality and race integrity of the Boers. The Boers are likely, after a short time, to accept the inevitable and to work patiently and unflinchingly to make a great commonwealth of South Africa. The English also seem willing to accept the inevitable, and to allow the Boers all the latitude they can reasonably ask. With Boer blood and British institutions, the dreams of Cecil Rhodes will some day be realized, perhaps at no very distant time.

Cost of the Strike.

That labor strikes are expensive things may be learned from some of the estimates of the present strike in Pennsylvania. Estimates of the losses by the strikers of the anthracite miners at the beginning of the twelfth week of the suspension of work, placed the total at \$60,445,000. Of this amount the loss to the operators in price of coal is placed at \$27,220,000; loss to the strikers in wages, \$12,700,000; loss to other strikers, idle because of the strike, \$2,300,000; loss to business men in the region, \$9,000,000; loss to business men outside of region, \$5,050,000; cost of maintaining coal and iron police, \$650,000; cost of maintaining non-union men, \$250,000; loss by damage to mines and machinery, \$2,200,000; loss to lace mill strikers, out owing to coal strike, \$75,000. Although these estimates are broad enough, it is evident that they do not cover the total losses of the strike by any means. And the end is not in sight, although there seems to be a disposition on the part of the operators to resume operations. If the strikers can secure strong enough funds to keep them in food indefinitely, there seems to be no reason to believe that they will return to work.

TO FIX PICKING PRICES

Directors' Meeting of O.H.G. A. Called for August 14

W. H. Egan, president of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association, has issued a call for a meeting of the board of directors of the association, to be held at Woodburn at 10 o'clock a. m. Thursday, August 14th. The primary purpose of the meeting will be to definitely determine on the matter of the price to be paid this year for hop picking. The general feeling in this locality favors the paying of the same price that was paid last year—40 cents a box—although some agitation has been started among some sources for as high as 50 cents. This will be the principal matter to come before the meeting, although there will be a general discussion of the different methods employed in growing hops, the best way to cultivate and care for the growing crop, and in fact everything that pertains to the hop industry will be considered.

Died on Her Child's Grave

A mother killed herself on the grave of her only child in Linden Hill cemetery, Newton, N. Y., on Thursday. Back of her death is a sad story.

The unfortunate woman was Mrs. Edward Beattie, 2 years old. She lived with her husband and their little girl, and theirs was a happy life, despite limited resources. When the child, Gertrude, five years old, was taken ill about June 1st, the mother began to fear. Gradually the disease baffled the physicians, and the little one died on June 5th.

Every day since the child's burial the heart-broken mother visited the grave. Sometimes she remained a day in the cemetery. She went there as usual on Wednesday and before leaving home told her husband that she would spend the night with friends. Workmen in the cemetery found the body early Thursday morning.

Mrs. Beattie killed herself by swallowing a dose of carbolic acid. After her body was removed from its position over the grave of her child the workmen searched in the grass and found a small bottle that had contained the acid.

Mr. Beattie returned to his home on Thursday to break to his wife the sad news that he had secured a position. She was not at home, but instead there was a message announcing her death.

At Point Roberts, Wash., Thursday 8 Rayburn was shot through the heart and instantly killed. The shooting was accidental.

News in Brief.

The freight rate situation developed in open war in Chicago, when the Santa Fe gave notice that it would carry livestock between Chicago and Kansas City for 12 cents per 100 pounds. This is a cut of 11½ cents.
