SPECIAL SESSION IN OHIO.

The Republican governor of Ohio does not hesitate to call the legislature together to undo some bad work of regular sessions.

For some weeks the people of Ohio have been expecting Governor Nash to issue his proclamation assembling the seventy-fifth general assembly in special session, and at last the notice has gone out over the state to the representatives and senators summoning them to assemble in the city of Columbus at the state house at 3 o'clock p. m. of the afternoon of Monday, August 25th, there to consider such matters as may be brought to their attention in a special message, to be sent in by the governor, the contents of which message may well be judged by the public, for the discussion of some weeks has acquainted people with the condition which confronts the Republican party and the state.

In Oregon a few politicians act as if it would be a crime to call a special session, when it is a fact that it is next to impossible to get good work done in any other way.

THE LIMITED VIEW OF LABOR.

Mr. Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, did not have time to expound the entire philosophy of labor. He presented but one view—the necessity of organization and education—and that is universally conceded. He expressed the necessity of laborers standing together against the aggressions of capital, and presented the shop-worn axioms about over-production. But he left unrepresented the value of labor keeping the masses of humanity in a state of contentment and sanity.

This is the deepest and solidest truth about labor—its value in steady-ly the pulse of men and women, its service in cooling the blood, subduing the passions, quieting the nerves and steadying the brains of millions who would be unbalanced, but for the heavy hand of toll laid upon the unbridled instincts.

As stated, Mr. Gompers could not in an hour's talk cover the most important phases of the subject, and do justice to his mission—the propaganda of trades unions. The morale and meritorious side of labor, per se, in itself, for its own sake, was overlooked.

Nine-tenths of humanity loves labor, prefers employment, abhors idleness, respects industry, despises laziness, chooses to be busy, would rather work than lay still. This fact has an important bearing on the whole labor controversy.

Labor is a moral, physical, spiritual necessity to humanity. It is a divine impulse, a means of individual and racial salvation. The old proverb—"three generations from shirt-sleeves to shirt-sleeves"—is the profound lesson of history.

The individual who despises labor, the philosophy which ignores the necessity for labor, the politician who cooies the "laboring man" as an object of sympathy, the theology that teaches the curse of labor theory, are all lights that lead to the abyss of darkness.

The prime fact about labor is its being a means of grace and salvation for the salvation of the individual and the security and stability of government. The professional agitator against employers, who looks upon labor only as a hardship, a burden laid by a few taskmasters upon the toiling millions, takes only a limited view.

CHARGED EXCESSIVE INTEREST

Judge Bosse Finds for Irwin, of Salem

In Action Against W. N. B. L. & I. Association

Judge Bosse has just rendered a decision affecting the operation of building and loan companies in this state. The case decided is that of W. J. Irwin, of this city, vs. The Washington National Building, Loan & Investment Association, and the decision of the court is that building and loan companies cannot collect more than 6 per cent interest.

In November, 1895, J. A. Rotan borrowed \$1400 from the Washington company, giving his note payable in 84 months, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent, and also a 6 per cent premium, both interest and premium to be paid monthly. As security Rotan executed a mortgage to property in this city. He regularly made his payment every month, amounting to \$23.10, and divided as follows: On stock, \$9.10; interest, \$7 and premium, \$7. In November, 1899 Rotan conveyed the property to Irwin, subject to the mortgage, and the plaintiff in the action regularly paid the monthly installments of \$23.10, until April, 1902. Irwin then instituted action against the company, alleging that the mortgage had been overpaid, demanding that the instrument be cancelled, and asking for judgment for \$207.50, alleged to have been overpaid on the mortgage, and for a penalty of \$100 for the refusal of defendant company to release a mortgage after it had been fully paid. In his decision Judge Bosse holds that the effect of taking 6 per cent premium and 6 per cent interest, which was in excess of the legal rate of the state. He finds that the company was entitled to the collection of only 6 per cent interest, or \$7 per month, and that the balance of the installment, \$16.10, should be applied to the cancellation of the loan. The court decreed that the mortgage should be surrendered for cancellation, and that the plaintiff should recover from the company \$168.50 and his costs. In denying the defendant company the right to collect any premium, Judge Bosse held that the amount of the premium to be paid by borrowing money to building and loan associations, when they are properly conducted, must be determined by competitive bidding, and not by a level rate fixed by the board of directors of the company. Carson & Adams, of this city, appeared for the plaintiff and Guy G. Willis, of Portland, and Peters & Powell, of Seattle, for the defendant company.
