"On my trip east from Minnesota, I stopped off in Michigan and Maine, where I formerly lived, and told some of my acquaintances of the opportunities to make money in Oregon. Eleven packed up their goods and started for the coast, and are now in this state, notwithstanding my stay in those places was less than three weeks. I'll tell you that the states of Oregon, Washington and California are the best three states of the Union for a rich or poor man today. We are on the right side of the most favored nation of the world, and with the many different resources, that have hardly been examined, with the increase in population and the great amount of money coming into the state, will in the near future make it one of the richest states in the Union. I am always pleased to say something about Oregon, for, without exception, it is the greatest country on earth.

"Yes, there is a large immigration of Eastern people to Oregon and the coast. The train on which I returned home left Minneapolis at 11:15 o'clock Tuesday night, and could not accommodate the passengers that had planned to leave on that train. The train was run as far as Montana in two sections, and then consolidated into one section of 14 cars that required two and sometimes three engines. Not a vacant seat could be found in the entire train, and I am informed, these conditions are not unusual, so heavy is the traffic. Many of the tourists left the train at Spokane, others getting off at Pasco for Eastern Oregon points, while the remainder were distributed to Tacoma, Seattle and Portland, and intermediate points."

There is not a lumber yard of any size between the Atlantic and Pacific oceans but handles the Oregon product, from a bunch of shingles to the largest spar that is used in the construction of the biggest ships on the Atlantic coast. The demand for Oregon timber is increasing from week to week, and it will not be long before three-fourths of the timber used east of the Rocky mountains will be obtained from the Pacific coast."
