He is an expert blacksmith, and will probably get into the business, particularly if he succeeds in getting a new leg. He has had an eventful career since leaving Albany, and is glad to be back in Lincoln county. Ingram's version of the shooting, by which he lost his leg, is that he was endeavoring to wrench the gun from Merrill, when the latter purposefully shot him, and that it was not an accident, as some of the papers have stated—Albany Democrat.

Curing of Toothsome Bees.

The night before meat is salted down make a strong pepper tea, says a Kentuckian in Farm and Home. Put a string of red pepper in water and let it stand on the stove until ready for use next morning. If you haven't it, cayenne will do. Add two heaping teaspoons of saltwater to every two gallons of tea, and pour the hot tea on the salt. Let the meat lie in this three days. Then overhaul the meat. First put on a teaspoonful of pulverized saltwater on the flesh side of hams and shoulders and rub it in, and as you put this on salt down with common molasses, black pepper and salt mixed. It should be about the color of brown sugar. Pack close for ten days; then take it up and rub it and pack it back. This will be the third handling. Sometimes it is necessary to add a little more salt. Hang in about three weeks from these hogs are killed. Before hanging wash the meat and roll in hickory ashes; then smoke with hickory wood and corn cobs. Canvases and hams and shoulders in February. Never let meat freeze before making the first application; it injures the tissues.

News in Brief.

The Spanaway hotel, one of the landmarks of Spanaway Lake, near Tacoma, was burned to the ground early Sunday evening, with a total loss estimated at about \$5000, to offset which there was an insurance of some \$2000 on building and contents. The origin of the fire is not known. Fire completely destroyed the O. R. & N. stock yards at The Dalles Monday. The origin was sparks from an eastbound passenger train. Several sheep and 60 head of hogs perished. The loss on buildings about \$2500, which is covered by insurance. The transport Meade has sailed from Manila August 5th for San Francisco, with headquarters, ten companies and 892 enlisted men of the Fifteenth Infantry.

CRAZY RELIC HUNTERS

Tracy's Clothing Divested of All Buttons

Undertaker Nearly Lost His Embalming Outfit

A dispatch from Davenport, Washington, tells of the actions of a crowd of half-crazed relic-hunters at that place in the following terms: "There is still intense interest here over the killing of the famous sheriff-fooler, Harry Tracy. The body, embalmed, was stretched out on a couch, covered with a sheet. A new shirt, with a stiff lay-down collar attached, had been put on him. It was probably the best shirt he has had for months. His feet and limbs were bare. Hundreds of people lifted back the sheet and viewed the wounds made by the determined men who hunted him to his death. While the body was being prepared by the undertaker and physician the crowd had to be fought back, and the doors and windows barred.

Relic Hunters Again.

Buttons were cut from his clothes and his suspenders were taken, as were his shoelaces and shoe eyelets. Dr. Whitney, who was working at the inquest, laid his coat aside and some relic hound has it in his possession. It was a light summer coat, and Dr. Whitney says that he expects to hear the report that Tracy was a captain in the civil war, as the coat had a G. A. R. button on it.

Embalming Outfit in Jeopardy.

The undertaker came near losing his entire embalming outfit. Some one in the crowd started the report that the array of pans and bottles on the floor containing Mr. Stone's embalming fluids were Tracy's camping outfit, and one man was headed off who was making a noble race for cover with a large dishpan, which was bigger than the desperado's entire kitchen outfit. Some one picked up a large, fancy linen tablecloth, which was doubtless the pride of the Stone household. The idea that it was the cover for the numerous banquets which Tracy had given to the Andersons and others of his guests seized upon the crowd, and in a moment it was in shreds, and every one present had at least a thread.

"Dutch Jake" Wants Goldfinch.

Young Goldfinch, who gave the information leading to the final result, has been offered a good sum by "Dutch Jake," of Spokane, to fill an engagement at his place of business. The boy has not yet decided whether to go. The officers say that the young man showed remarkable judgment in giving his information, and in his subsequent actions. Goldfinch said that when he was traveling with Tracy to the Eddy farm every time they would come to a rough place or a turn in the road his companion would send him back, remarking as he did so: "I am Tracy, the convict, and am liable to be ambushed at any moment, and I do not want you to get hurt."

Interview With Cudihoe.

Upon returning to Seattle, Sheriff Cudihoe, who accompanied the captors of Tracy's body to that city, gave the following interview: "The fellow fooled me, even at the last. I was about 15 miles away when he killed himself. I was guarding the south end of the county, as we figured that he would take that course when he made his final try to escape. He would never have left that country alive. We knew positively that he was in a certain territory, and every avenue of escape and every road was guarded by armed men.

"I am of the opinion the Goldfinch boy, who told the sheriff of Tracy's whereabouts, displayed the best judgment of any one. He should share equally in the reward. No, I'm not coming in for any of the blood money, and I don't want any. I made up my mind that I would follow that fellow to the end of the earth, if he wasn't captured or killed in the meantime. I have done as I said I would, and I am satisfied.

Impossible to Escape.

"Tracy put himself in a bad hole at the Eddy ranch. The farmhouse is down in the center of a valley, surrounded by high hills. It would have been almost impossible for him to get away, once the posse knew he was there. He made a good fight at the last, and, as you know, ended it all by shooting himself through the head with a .45-caliber revolver. I reached the body about two hours after it was found. As I stood there and gazed down on the cold, stiff face of the man who has made me almost a physical wreck, I must confess that a feeling of thankfulness came into my heart, and it's there yet."
