LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION

Gov. Geer Issues First Document of Kind in State

Governor Geer has issued the first labor day proclamation that has been written in this state. The governor recommends the proper observance of Monday, September 1, as labor day. The text of the proclamation is as follows:

"Whereas, the legislature of Oregon has set apart the first Monday of September of each year as a legal holiday, to be known as Labor Day;

"Therefore, I, T. T. Geer, governor of said state, do hereby recommend that all places of business be closed on Monday, September 1, 1902, and that the day be devoted to an observance of such exercises as may contribute to a better understanding between labor and capital, the great moving forces behind modern industrial development, and it is especially urged that employers co-operate with their employees in a mutual observance of the day in such manner as will fittingly recognize the reliance which each must place upon the other before the best results from both may be expected and attained.

"In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be affixed hereto.

"Done at the capitol, in the city of Salem, this thirteenth day of August, A. D. 1902.

Thomas Jefferson as a Letter Writer. Mr. Jefferson probably wrote more letters with his own hand than any other public man that ever lived. The extent of his correspondence may be inferred from the fact that 20,000 letters neatly folded and briefed, were preserved by him and found carefully filed away at the time of his death, with copies of the replies sent to more than 10,000. These, however, were only a small portion of his correspondence, as he retained only those he considered of future usefulness or importance.

Stenography was not invented at that time. Every one of his letters was written with his own hand and with great care, although after breaking his wrist while minister to France it became a great labor to him. His penmanship was plain, plain and legible, every letter being perfectly formed, and his account books are kept in so small a hand that many of the pages cannot be read without a magnifying glass.

Jefferson was ambidextrous. He could write equally well with either hand. When his wrist was broken, he learned to write with his left hand, which became as skillful as the other. It would have been impossible for him to have carried on his extensive correspondence without being able to relieve his right hand at intervals.—Chicago Record.

Sheriff B. R. Colbath has received a number of applications for appointment to the vacant deputyship in his office, that was caused by the resignation of John O. Bates. One of the applicants, from whom a letter was received today, is a Multnomah county Republican, who has, apparently, made the application in good faith, as the only means of uniting the disrupted democracy of this county. The reception of the letter afforded a good laugh for Sheriff Colbath, and other of the county officers who learned of the fact. The letter was written in Portland on Tuesday, August 12th, and is as follows:

"I see by the papers that one of your deputies has resigned his deputyship with you. Now what is the matter, Mr. Sheriff, that you couldn't give me the job? The papers say there is some dissatisfaction in the Democratic party, and maybe I could draw some of my friends to your support, enough to offset what you would lose on the other hand, in case you were nominated for a second term.

"Now, I do not wish to brag on myself, but I know that I will do my duty, and am well qualified for the job, and I think I could do you very good service. Please let me know by return mail. Yours, very respectfully,"

Sheriff Colbath has placed on file the letter, the author of which he says is a Republican. Since Mr. Colbath is a staunch Democrat, it is improbable that he will enter into an alliance with Multnomah in selecting a man for the deputyship. Sheriff Colbath has not yet named a successor to Mr. Bates.
