A WILD COAST REGION.

For the hunter and fisherman and explorer there is not a more fascinating region than Yaquina bay along down the coast to the California line. It is a land of wild scenery and interminable forests.

Ranchers have made openings here and there but they are far apart. The mail is carried most of the way and in places roads are built.

A strong party of men are reported to have begun work on a road around Cape Perpetua on the 11th of this month, this making connection with the government road from Florence to Hecla Head lighthouse, and making it possible to drive from Waldport to San Francisco along the coast, save and except the ferrage of various bays, and perhaps half a mile of road on Lincoln county's side of Perpetua, which will be built—when? Hecla light-keeper says over 400 people registered at that lighthouse last year.

There will be a railroad down the coast at some time in the future but it is not likely to be built in this generation. Such a railroad would have a great tourist travel, and a lumbering and dairy traffic.

DEATH OF PRESIDENT BEARD-SHEAR.

All Iowa mourns the death of Dr. Beardshear, as all Iowa has hoped against hope for the past four weeks that he might recover. He was so big, so whole-souled, so generous, his handshake was so hearty, his enthusiasm so contagious, he had done such a wonderful work in building up what Secretary Wilson had flattered the pride of the state by declaring was the greatest agricultural college of this country, if not of the world, he had come so close to the hearts of the teachers of the state—no man ever stood higher in their affection—there were so many reasons why his death at the early age of 52 was untimely—

if it is proper to speak of death as untimely—that the state came to share to some extent his own confident belief that in some way he might yet be spared. But his task was finished, and in the rounded maturity of his powers, and at the zenith of his fame, he was called upon to quit his life work.

As an educator he built up a far more than sectarian reputation as President of Western college at Toledo—the United Brethren church school. He ceased to be a preacher and became a great leader in college work.

He was for years president of the state teacher's association and was a man who far transcended the boundaries of his denomination in his personal and political friendships.

Such men are rare and when found are seldom got into the public service.

OREGON SENATOR-MAKERS.

Who are the Oregon senator-makers? Certainly not the newspapers of general circulation. The candidates they have supported have been defeated with one exception—Mr. McMahon.

It is not the political bosses who make the senators. They are mostly busy trying to get the office, each for himself.

The federal office-holders now in office are probably the most potent factor in determining who shall be the next senator from Oregon.

The first-class offices, like collector and marshal—the big postoffice incumbents and attorneys for the timber land corporations—will go far to land the prize.

Among these is ex-Senator McElrath, now St. Louis fair commissioner, who is said to have got out of Mitchell's way the last time, and not only turned over some votes, but a good-sized sack.

Judge Kincaid, of Lane county, named a number of senatorial aspirants in an article reprinted here, but left out the one man he would like best to see elected—Jonathan Bourne—and he is a candidate if conditions are just right, and the weather favorable. He has perhaps the strongest array of talented senator-makers in his wake of any possible aspirant.

CUBAN FINANCE.

It seems we shall not only prevent Cuba from realizing revenue out of her sugar crop, but we shall not allow her to help herself—such is the transcendent wisdom of Congress.

Cuba's attempt to borrow \$25,000,000, and create a bonded indebtedness to that amount, has called attention to the provision of the Platt amendment, which gives this country authority to interfere in such cases.

The provision reads: "That said (Cuban) government shall not assume or contract any public obligation to pay the interest upon which, and to make reasonable sinking fund pro-

vision for the ultimate discharge of which the ordinary revenues of the island of Cuba, after defraying the current expenses of the government, shall be inadequate."

It is entirely possible that the loan, which means the beginning of the end of Cuban financial stability, will be prevented by President Roosevelt.

Soon it will be plain to those agricultural interests which fought against the decent treatment of Cuba on the plea that they were defending American producers, that they were playing all the time into the hands of those against whom they were in supposed antagonism.

President Roosevelt and the administration had mapped out a policy that was honorable, patriotic and best for all true American interests.

The safe and right attitude on this Cuban question, which, in its main features, is in no sense a party matter, was to follow the lead of President Roosevelt. It is a subject that cannot be dismissed or forgotten. It will have to be talked about through the pending congressional campaign, and it will have to be brought up when Congress meets again.

RECIPROCITY IN GERMANY.

The committee of the German Reichstag, which is drafting a new tariff law, is progressing very slowly, owing to its cumbersome make-up, but expects to have a bill ready for its first reading by the 15th inst., and to adjourn in a month. The nine political parties each have representatives on the committee, and are allowed to change their members as often as they wish.

As there is a liberal compensation provided for each member, the changes are very frequent, and very embarrassing, as each new recruit feels that to earn his salary he must make a long speech. Only one or two representatives of each party have been in continuous attendance.

Now that the work of drafting a bill is drawing to a close, a Berlin dispatch states that the government is dubious of its passage in any symmetrical form, and would rather let it fall entirely. The idea of reciprocal commercial trade is growing in favor, and the government prefers to use the present tariff as a basis, and deal with the United States and other countries directly.

The committee has collected a great mass of material from the American tariff debates, and every proposition from free trade to a prohibitive rate is supported by facts, figures and arguments that have done service in this country. The American literature on the tariff is practically inexhaustible, and is a great source of information for such committees as that now in session at Berlin.
