PREPARING FOR BUSINESS.

Jonathan Bourne is taking the proper course to secure the election to the United States Senate, in giving it out that he has sold a block of \$500,000 stock in the Republic mine.

That simple statement will do more to attract to him the blowflies of political corruption than all that could be written in eulogy of his character.

Governor Geer's chimeras that the expression of the voters will have something to do with the disposition of the next Oregon senatorship is a political soap-bubble of the most childish imagination.

Mr. Bourne knows that men are wanted in the Senate who are amenable to the fashionable influences of the times—money. Carnegie's offer to the government of \$10,000,000 steel trust bonds is a fair sample.

Three hundred thousand dollars expended to get the next Oregon senatorship means opportunity to the man who knows the gigantic interests at stake to make back ten times as much.

As long as it is a buy and sell Mr. Bourne is as eligible as any other man who will participate in the fashionable game.

The alleged statement of Tilmon Ford, that he may sell a few of his farms and become a candidate himself is no doubt popular as a remark, but it is a revelation of the prevailing fashion.

The purchase of senatorships is but an expression in one form of the materialism of the age. It is capitalization thrusting its ugly head into the arena of our public life.

The individuals concerned are but the puppets and figureheads of a world-wide influence that runs counter to our national ideals. In the long run the ideals will survive and senators will be elected by the people.

In the meantime all who expect to be in the race next winter at Salem had better prepare themselves. It is not already purchased the Oregon senatorship will surely be hunting for a bidder.

DEFEATING STATE REFORMS.

The Oregonian keeps denouncing the Republican state convention of Wisconsin because it reaffirmed the demand for certain reforms, and declared that Senator Spooner must keep hands off if he wanted a re-election.

Two years ago the Republicans in that state promised the people direct nomination of all candidates and tax reforms. Spooner and his brigade of federal office-holders defeated these promised reforms in the legislature. The Republican state convention renounces its platform of 1900 demanding those great changes in public policy for the purification of politics and the relief of the overburdened taxpayer. Spooner again objects.

Important and needed state reforms are to be defeated because it does not suit the whim of a faction that looks only upon the graft and the opportunity for personal plunder.

They are not satisfied to monopolize federal patronage and whip Republican into line who want party consideration. But they will force the party to break its public pledges rather than not have their way.

Important and needed and promised state reforms are to be defeated and Governor La Follette is to be driven out of public life because he has had the nerve to champion a popular cause that puts the nominating power a little farther out of the reach of the federal officials.

If Spooner had to be nominated by direct vote he would probably not dare make the federal appointments he does make. Thereby hangs the tale. How could Jack Matthews carry Oregon under direct nomination?

FREE TRADE AND THE SALT TRUST.

Only the other day there was great rejoicing at Portland over the prospect of several shipments of salt arriving at that port from England and the price of salt was to come down about one-half.

Now there is wailing among the economic wisecracks that no such result has come about. The salt trust has reached its all-powerful arm out to sea and headed off the competition before it landed.

Having secured control of the cargo of Liverpool salt on the way to Portland, the salt trust has arbitrarily raised the price \$5 a ton.

And yet, despite the notorious exactions of this and other like "industrial consolidations," there are people who pretend that trusts lower the cost of production and give the consumer the benefit of the reduction.

Another economic myth is gone galloping—that free trade in salt would break the back of this trust. Neither free trade or anti-trust laws will curb its aggressions—its demands for "more and more." Taxation.

PROSPERITY AND THE CENSUS.

The full dinner pail as the conchoidal argument for voters is not performing as much of a share in strenuous campaign duty this year as it did once upon a time, but talk prosperity is heard now and then which suggests that an analysis of that prosperity based upon some figures would not be out of place at this time.

Notwithstanding the fact that in some mechanical trades, experts have had wages advanced, figures taken from the census reports show a decline of something like eight per cent. in the average wages of laborers in the manufacturing industries from the average for the census year of 1890. The figures for manufacturing taken from census reports for 1900 have been completed for thirty-three states, and in those states 1,064,590 wage earners received an average yearly amount of \$418.45, or \$1.39 a day in 1890, whereas ten years later 1,463,265 wage earners received an average of \$387.53 each year, or \$1.29 a day, ten cents a day less than ten years previously.

In some of the states where the trusts are more powerful the decline as shown by the census figures has been even greater. In New Jersey, where pretty much all the gigantic trusts have been incorporated and where they are operating to a large extent, the average amount per day was \$2.24 in 1890, but in 1900 it was \$1.52, a decline of 33 per cent.

ARGUMENT FOR ARBITRATION.
The Iowa State Register says: A contest between employer and employee in which either side refuses to abide by some fair arbitration is an assault on the public welfare, and should be treated. It endangers industrial prosperity, in exactly the same way that a brawl on the streets endangers the public peace. Such a strike as is now in progress in the hard coal regions might under favorable conditions be the efficient cause of widespread panic and business depression. It is to the industrial world what the old time meeting of knights and their retainers from rival castles was to the social world. It is possible only because we have failed to apply to the adjustment of modern industrial conditions, principles and methods evolved during centuries of civil strife. For the preservation of peace and good order the court gradually superseded the street brawl and the trial by combat. A court proceeding is nothing but a compulsory arbitration, the awards of which are enforced by ample public authority. The good of society demanded that the public know that John Doe dealt justly with Richard Roe, and at great expense public tribunals investigated their private relations and compelled them to abide by the arbitration.

We have not come to realize that the coal trust and the United Mine Workers are merely enlarged John Doe and Richard Roe. We provide a justice of the peace to determine promptly the dispute between a farmer and his hired man, but when the farmer becomes a big corporation and the hired man a labor union, we neither investigate nor decide, although enormously vast interests hang to the parties and to society are involved.

The most important stop in the latter trip will be Detroit, where he will attend the annual convention of the Spanish war veterans on September 22. At this interesting stage of proceedings it became necessary to pump out the water, which they had scarcely begun doing when they had a breakdown which delayed operations until Tuesday afternoon. It is believed that whatever is found will be found within a few weeks.—Newberg Graphic.
