TIMBER LAND THIEVES

Get Another Roast From Rev. Schell

Who Hits the Official Heads On All Sides

And May Secure the Removal of a U. S. Dist. Attorney

The Journal prints another batch of matters about the Oregon timber land frauds from the pen of Rev. Joseph Schell. In some of these letters the writer, who is evidently smarting under a deep sense of wrong, scores hard and makes the blood flow from the nose of the other fellow, but this paper is open to any reply the accused officials see fit to make. All who know Rev. Schell agree that he is energy personified, and as one federal official remarked, he carries the day of judgment with him. He has a grievance and possibly a spite, but he no doubt has cause for all his complaints and on the other hand has a strong sense of outraged justice to back him. Only those who have dealings with the government and found officials protecting wrong-doing can sympathize with Rev. Schell.

While keeping its columns constantly open to the accused to refute or reply, The Journal feels that it is a public duty to give every detail of the abuses Rev. Schell has unearthed to its readers. This it will proceed to do until stopped by the courts or the government itself. The people of Oregon have no recourse but a fearless and unshackled press to get these matters out of the hands of red tape and make the administration feel that there is yet one appeal to a court that is higher than corrupt officials. That is the forum of open discussion.

One of the officials of the Department of the Interior admits that all that Rev. Schell says is true, but says if men like Thayer have obtained money under false pretenses the way to go after them is in the state courts. That seems like begging the question, because the frauds are perpetrated in the disposition of the public lands, and hence the proof and prosecution must come through the public records, and the officials of the land department, and Rev. Schell does right to follow the matter straight to the Secretary of the Interior. The Journal is free to publish the whole matter as it does not exist by publishing notices for the land department.

hands nobody could bribe them. I asked Mays to inform Hall of the subject of my call, and he said he would. About ten days after when I called again to see Hall he was there, but I could not see him. Some time after I telephoned him to appoint a time for an interview but he refused to see me. At the same time when with Mays I called the attention of this office to the land swindles that were going on then and there about Roseburg. I gave him names and addresses of parties at Mt. Angel, Oregon, to corner the thieves, but absolutely nothing was done.

Special Inspector Greene had occasion to look into it and was almost scandalized at the flagrant neglect of official duty. I opened the question in the Oregonian and the answer of Mays was that nothing can be done before the fraud was consummated and until the guilty parties come and accuse themselves of perjury. Good for you! Whose dummy are you? Did you ever succeed in bluffing before? Your letter reached Secretary Hitchcock, who over three months ago ordered a speedy and vigorous prosecution of C. Thayer in the courts, and which order you and John Hall have ignored and treated with silent contempt. In the same order Secretary Hitchcock stated that it is not necessary that the fraud is consummated to institute a prosecution; moreover he ordered proceedings against C. Thayer who never came and accused himself of perjury nor admitted his fraud. C. Thayer is not so ignorant as to accuse himself of perjury as you accused yourself in your own letter under flimsy reasons, of neglect of duty.

Don't Know Rev. Schell.

Afterwards I sent to Hall a registered letter telling him again of the C. Thayer and Roseburg swindle. His answer was that he had never seen me before and had never heard of me and the files of his office showed nothing of me. Both of my letters together with his went to the Department of the Interior with two other letters to me from his office dated a few months before, regarding the same subject. My dear friends, your words might protest, but stubborn facts prove and convince. J. H. Hall, you are paid by the government to prosecute frauds against it. What are you going to do with the order of Secretary Hitchcock against the perpetrator, C. Thayer? This order seems to bring matters to your official knowledge in due form and also from the proper officer. What are you waiting for to indict C. Thayer? In a few days the statutes of limitations will no longer allow you to do so, and C. Thayer will laugh in his sleeve. Whose orders do you carry out, Secretary Hitchcock's or C. H. Carey's, or C. Thayer's? We are tired of a three year play of a continuous and scandalous farce on a stage of your jurisdiction and under your supervision. Either you know it or not, and in either event you are guilty of incompetency or guilty of neglect of duty.

J. H. Hall and E. Mays, any answer or objection you may have is kindly invited. Since you are averse to bringing suit in the special U. S. court of Oregon, you might perhaps be willing to bring it in the general U. S. court of Oregon.

We all remember that J. H. Hall and E. Mays are on the active list of engineers running the Mitchell-Carey-Scott political machine. They surely ought enough, but will never clean it. Yes, we all remember it.

The Mays Affidavit.

STATE OF OREGON, COUNTY OF MULTNOMAH, ss.

I, Chas. E. Hays, being first duly sworn on oath depose and say that I am the contestant in a seventy-five or more cases now pending in Oregon City land office as against timber on the public lands in Tillamook county, Oregon, that the reason for contesting these entries is because I was and am convinced that all entries were made for the benefit of Claude Thayer and his associates and not for the benefit of the individual entries. That after I had collected the evidence showing collusion on the part of Thayer and his associates I went to U. S. Commissioner J. A. Sladen at Portland, Oregon, for the purpose of having him issue a warrant for said Thayer's arrest. Commissioner Sladen told me that I would have to confer with the U. S. attorney and that if the U. S. attorney prepared a complaint he would issue the warrant. I then went to the office of the U. S. attorney for Oregon and acquainted Assistant U. S. Attorney Mays with my desire and offered to lay before him the documentary evidence to justify him in issuing a warrant. In reply he stated to me that it was a matter for his superior officer, John Hall, that I would have to take up the matter with John Hall and that the latter would see me at 4 o'clock that afternoon. I called a little before four that afternoon at Mr. Hall's office and was informed that he left the office at 2:30 P. M. but would see me at 4 P. M. the next day. I called at said hour, but was informed that he was busy. After that I made repeated calls, but could never get to see Mr. Hall. I asked Mr. Mays if he had acquainted Mr. Hall with my desires, and he told me he had and that the Mays would not proceed until Hall gave him instructions to do so. I then became convinced that the U. S. attorney's office did not wish to prosecute Thayer.

I personally went into the office of J. H. Hall regarding the timber frauds and C. Thayer. Hall was absent and Mays, his assistant, amongst other things, told me that they were well aware that C. Thayer is bribing the Oregon City land office and that the timber lands were taken up by fraud, but his office, he said, could do nothing in the matter until it is brought to their official knowledge by the right officers. Dr. Loomis of the Oregon City land office, do you hear, see and feel it; what were you doing and what were you not doing?

Of course, Adam accused Eve, but both were guilty of eating the apple. I told Mays that it is expected of a man that is paid to protect and defend property in his care, that he resist any attempt to cause the same to be burned or destroyed, with the first best club, ax or gun as soon as he hears the first noise, without waiting until he is notified by a corrupt police force or by a sleepy fire department. His answer was that he could do nothing now, but when once in their

er, and feeling that if I forced a prosecution, Mr. Hall would not suffer a conviction to be obtained, and knowing of no other means or remedy I allowed the matter to rest.

McCOURT DECLARED RECORDER

Salem Boy Wins Out in Supreme Court

By Non Payment of 50 Cent Fee Wife Loses \$2000

The Oregon Supreme Court at noon today handed down four opinions as follows:

John W. McCourt, respondent, vs John W. Beam, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; W. R. Ellis Judge; affirmed; opinion by Justice Bean.

This was a mandamus proceeding brought by McCourt against Beam to compel the latter to deliver to him McCourt, the books, furniture, etc., of the office of city recorder of Pendleton. Beam was city recorder of Pendleton and under the provisions of the city charter whereby the city council has the right at any time to remove that officer and elect his successor, Beam was removed and McCourt was elected as his successor.

There are eight members of the Pendleton council and the vote on Beam's removal was a tie but the mayor cast the deciding vote and McCourt was elected by the same vote. The city charter of Pendleton provides that the government of the city shall be vested in a mayor and a common council, composed of eight members, and that in case of a tie the mayor shall cast the deciding vote. The charter further authorizes and empowers the city council with the election of a recorder with the mayor's consent. Under these provisions, Beam contended that in the election of the recorder, that the mayor was not entitled to vote but the court holds that such officer did have a vote in the matter and could give his consent afterwards. The decree of the lower court was affirmed.

Maude Marie Stringham, appellant, vs Mrs. Laura Dillon, respondent; the Modern Woodmen of America, defendant; appeal from Multnomah county; A. F. Sears Judge; affirmed; opinion by Chief Justice Moore.

This was a suit to determine the right of adverse claimants to \$2000 on account of a certificate of mutual life insurance carried with the Modern Woodmen of America. Leroy Stringham joined the order in 1899 and made his policy payable to his mother, Mrs. Laura Dillon, the plaintiff herein. In May, 1901, plaintiff and Stringham were married and the deceased made application for a change in the beneficiary, making the insurance policy payable to his wife. The change in beneficiary was made but Stringham failed to pay the requisite fee of 50 cents for making the alteration and died in July 1901. The contesting claimants then carried the case into the courts. The insurance company filed a bill of interpleader and paid the entire amount of money into the court and was discharged from all liability. Upon trial being had, judgment for the entire \$2000 was awarded the defendant, Laura Dillon, and the plaintiff appealed. In the trial it was disclosed that the old certificate of Stringham's had not been delivered to the head clerk of the Camp and a new one issued in the lifetime of the deceased as required by the amended by-laws of the organization. The court holds that the failure to pay the required fee invalidated the attempted transfer of the beneficiary and that the payment of the fee was a condition precedent to a substitution of the beneficiary. The decree of the lower court is affirmed.

A. L. West, respondent, vs Arthur Edwards and Thomas Edwards, appellants; appeal from Marion county, R. P. Boise, Judge; affirmed; opinion by Justice Wolverson.

This was a suit to quiet the title to about 5 acres of land south of Salem, of which the plaintiff was in possession claiming title thereto by adverse possession. The plaintiff won out in the lower court and the judgment of that court is affirmed.

William Hicliothem, respondent, vs Inter State Savings & Loan Association, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county. A. L. Frazier, Judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Bean.

This was a case involving the same question as was presented before Judge Boise in the Marion county circuit court in the case of W. J. Irwin vs the Washington National Building Loan & Improvement Association—that of usurious interest charges, the defendant company, with a home office in Minnesota, charging 6 per cent interest and 7 per cent premium. The action was brought to compel the cancellation of a mortgage on the ground that the amount secured thereby, with the legal interest, had been paid. An appeal was taken from a decree sustaining a demurrer to the answer and granting the relief prayed for. Judgment of lower court affirmed.
