Girls who do housework and work in hotels and boarding houses in our country get very little support, encouragement or protection from society in general. A long term of service is not a badge of honor, as it is in many countries.

The fact that Miss Sappingfield is a successful and popular dining room girl stamps her as a young woman of positive qualities of character, as it is not an easy position to fill.

It is a position that requires sterling and ladylike qualities of the most enduring kind to achieve the highest success. It is a place where good judgment and a great knowledge of human nature come into play.

It is seldom that the world's most deserving workers win the world's most coveted prizes. Still we believe that would have been truly said of each one of the young ladies voted for in this contest.

THE ANTHRACITE STRIKE.

One discouraging feature of the great coal strike in Pennsylvania is the regularity with which the voters of that state return large majorities for the most corrupt political organization in the country—Quay's machine.

An Oregon politician, who is not a stranger to political abuses, has recently returned from Alaska, and says there is no hope for reformation of affairs in that territory. He says one of Quay's men is at the head up there. The great strike is causing much apprehension in business circles, and occurs almost yearly, and the voters among the strikers, with hereditary persistence, vote power into the hands of corrupt men.

The teachings of the labor unions that it is wisest for their members to keep out of politics is probably the best wisdom under the circumstances, but it does seem suicidal for labor voters to strengthen the corruption.

The tremendous majorities given the Republican party in Oregon and Pennsylvania, when they are given to sustain rotten systems, must hurt the cause of labor, in common with all other good causes.

Still we believe the laboring man and organized labor will in the end become the bulwark of better governmental policies.

The labor vote can have no interest in the corrupt practices of Quay politicians, who flourish in spite of the workman's vote.

The ideal of organized labor rests on the proposition of a fair wage for honest work, exactly the opposite of boodle methods.

Such an upheaval of social conditions as is involved in the great coal strike cannot but have an educational effect.
