A DEMOCRATIC TAUNT.

(Baker City Democrat.)
The most scandalous spectacle of American public life today is that afforded by the special and peculiar privileges enjoyed by Henry T. Oxnard, chief sugar lobbyist in the capital at Washington.

Mr. Oxnard, it must be remembered, is a private citizen. He holds no official position whatever. He has, legally or morally, no greater rights about the capitol than any other private citizen. Yet look at the privileges Mr. Oxnard is permitted to enjoy.

Early in the present session, by the grace of Hon. James A. Tawney, chairman of the committee on industrial arts and expositions, Mr. Oxnard was permitted to make the room of the committee virtually his private office. From it he directed the campaign in the house against justice to Cuba and against the Roosevelt policies.

When the Cuban bill had passed the house Mr. Oxnard moved over to the senate wing, and was provided with even more commodious private offices. The rooms of the privilege and election and interstate commerce committee adjourn and connect. By the grace of the Hon. Stephen B. Elkins and the Hon. Julius C. Burrows, chairman of these committees, their rooms were practically given up to Mr. Oxnard from which to continue his campaign.

Lately Mr. Oxnard has grown more bold and his senatorial friends more subservient. The marble room, so-called, is the general reception-room for visitors to senators. If you wish to see a senator, while the senate is in session, you send in your card, and if the senator has time to talk with you he sends back his card which admits you to the marble room for interview. There is a standing rule that no one except members of congress, is to be admitted to the marble room without permission from a senator.

This rule, however, has been relaxed in favor of Mr. Oxnard. He walks in to the marble room whenever he pleases, sits down and sends for the senators to whom he wishes to give instructions, and there are about 15 senators who promptly obey his summons, and deferentially listen to his commands.

From his place in the marble room Henry T. Oxnard issues his orders and his senatorial henchmen hear and obey. Among his friends in the marble room Henry T. Oxnard sits and boasts how he has beaten the administration, compelled the Republican party to do his will, and thwarted the desire of the American people to do justice to Cuba.

Such is the scandalous condition presented visibly every day to all observers in the capitol at Washington. What are the American people going to do about it? What are they going to do with the senators and representatives who have thus enthroned a lobbyist?

More especially how is the Republican party going to explain and justify to the people this public flouting of the popular will at the mere beck and nod of a man in no way commissioned to represent a village crossroads at the capitol?

There is no referendum against the extravagance of officialism. The people may turn the Republican party out of power, and put in the Democratic party. But officialism will find a way to get what it wants.

The Democratic party has at times been a slight check upon the swift degeneracy toward plutocracy. But its official class have been bred and trained upon generations of the era of public plunder.

There will come a reversal of these policies, and the government will be restored from the domination of plutocracy that has swamped the national capital.

The danger is that the brakes will not be put on and order restored before there will be a violent overthrow. The people should remember that the seventy millions increased appropriations nearly all went to officialism.

And then there are those reformers who would increase the army of federal office holders, by increased paternalism.

LOGICAL AND CONSISTENT. Many of our readers are saying if you do not get the flat salary reform now, it is bound to come next time.

Would it not be perfectly logical and consistent to do what is right without waiting four years?

Was it not put in the Republican platform in good faith, and was not every state official elected on that issue?

Have we not adopted the initiative and referendum, and was not the question of flat salaries voted on by the people at the last June election?

To not enact that law now at a special session means to take \$200,000 from the people of this state unlawfully and unnecessarily.

It is illogical and inconsistent to ask the people to wait for this promised reform until "next time."

"Next time" the politicians would have some other excuse for deferring action.

How much of the \$200,000 wrongfully taken in violation of the constitution, under the present system, in four years, do these bosses get?

It would be cheaper to pass a law and give these bosses \$10,000 a year to run politics with, and save the other \$100,000 a year to the people.

DIRECT NOMINATION.

Young Republican does well to emphasize direct nomination as the step-

ping stone to recognition for the younger element in the party.

Look at the money that was spent to get control of the nomination for governor and other state officers in the last Republican state convention.

Governor Geer and his friends spent all they had in the primaries, and when the state convention met, delegation after delegation had to be bought over again.

They simply could not do it, and the anti-Geer combine had the money. How many young men were consulted about these nominations, anyway?

Direct nomination is the issue in Wisconsin, and will be the issue in Oregon when the people understand it.

Senator Spooner, in Wisconsin, was given to understand that the people demanded direct nomination, whether he was made senator or not.

His federal appointments, like some in Oregon, are at the dictation of one-man power, and really offensive to the people.

The greatest insult ever offered the Republicans of Oregon was the nomination of Jack Matthews as United States marshal, after he and his methods had been repudiated by the Republicans themselves.

Direct nomination will prevent such abuses. If congressmen and United States senators have to rely on direct nomination for their own offices, they will be a little more particular what they ram down the throats of their constituents. Even a young Republican understand this.

Is there anything proving more absence of intelligence than the useless killing of birds about "seaside resort"? If there is, we would like to hear of it.

Of course, it would be really too bad if Governor Geer should do something that would be a benefit to the whole people of Oregon, without consulting the Republican bosses, as that is not part of their program.

The first county conventions in Washington indicate that the people of that state have little confidence in railroad commissions. The average business man would rather deal with the railroad officials themselves than through a political commission.

They are having a hot time in the Bulgarian congress over the disposition of the award for the rescue of the kidnapped missionary, Ellen Stone. It is charged that some of the most prominent men in that country were into the game to secure a big reward for her recovery.

Misses Ella and Frances Currin leave today for Weiser, Idaho, where they have positions as teachers in the public schools. Their home is with their mother, Mrs. Mars, on the Garden Road, although they taught at Corvallis last year, and previously at Stanford University.

One of the speakers at the trans-Mississippi congress, at St. Paul, made a savage attack on Governor Brady, of Alaska, charging him with a policy of oppression and repression, and with being the active agent of the great corporations that are gobbling up the magnificent resources of that country, while they are delaying the arrival of self-government. The charges are to be investigated.

Industrial Notes.
Appeals for aid have come to the Salem unions from the United Mine workers. The cigarmakers have started the ball rolling with a standing weekly assessment of 50 cents per month.

The cigarmakers' lockout at Manila, P. I., continues. The manufacturers refuse to make the wage concession, and a majority of the factories are idle.

The San Francisco Labor Day committee has received over 2000 letters from manufacturers, merchants and employers, signifying their willingness

to close their places of business upon that day.

Paris has a newly formed "syndicate of kitchen maids," whose object is to restore to women their rights in the kitchen, from which she is being driven by men cooks and waiters in restaurants and hotels.

The Canadian Northern strike of railway employees is still on, and there is a complete blockade from one end of the system to the other.

Conductors and motormen employed by the South Chicago City Railway Company have secured an increase in wages from 17 to 21 cents per hour, and are no longer in danger of becoming involved in a prospective general street-car strike.

Bishop Henry C. Potter, of New York, believes the anthracite coal operators are wrong. He thinks "the anthracite coal operators have all along maintained a false position. They take the stand that they will not deal with the organizations, but insist on dealing with the men as individuals. Now this is all wrong. A body of men whose interests are common have the right to organize into an association for mutual protection, and are entitled to recognition in matters which affect their individual and combined interests."

INDIAN WAR VETERANS.
Taking Steps to Get Pensions for All Their Members.
At an adjourned meeting of the Indian War Veterans of 1855 and 1856, held at Independence, Mo. 18, 1902, the following proceedings were had:

On motion of Major James Bruce, of Benton county, Ben Hayden was of Benton county. Ben Hayden was on motion of James Hays, of Corvallis, J. R. Cooper, of Independence, was chosen secretary.

On motion of Major Bruce, the secretary was instructed to communicate with all the county clerks within the state and ascertain the number of Indian War Veterans, and their dependent widows, in their respective counties, and report the same to the adjutant-general at Salem.

On motion of D. L. Hedges, the secretary was instructed to transmit a copy of these proceedings to all the newspapers within the state, with request to publish the same.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at Salem, Wednesday, October 1, 1902, and all Indian War Veterans are cordially invited to attend.
