WHERE IS PHIL ROGOWAY

Actor-Defaulter Still Enjoys Freedom

Who Will Stand Loss of License Money

Phil H. Rogoway, barber, actor and defaulting license collector, is still enjoying his freedom, and no one seems to know his postoffice address. Rogoway will be remembered in this city as the author and the principal performer in "The Day of Atonement," which proved such a chilling frost here last fall. He left innumerable unpaid accounts here, and went to Portland, where for several months he served as deputy license collector, absconding from that point with several hundred dollars of the licensees that had collected. The question has now arisen who will stand for the loss of the license money that Rogoway failed to account for previous to his departure. The saloon men declare that they paid Rogoway, and having his receipt for the money, refuse to make the payment a second time. The Portland Telegram of Friday evening has the following about Rogoway:

Where is Philip H. Rogoway, former license collector? Is he within reach of the authorities, and if he is, will they do anything to round him up and secure an explanation from him as to some mysterious features connected with his official labors here?

According to those who claim to know, Rogoway is an embezzler to the extent of several hundred dollars; yet those in authority, who are expected to ferret out such allegations and punish the criminal, if such be proven to be true, have done nothing, and there is no immediate prospect that they will.

Chief McLaughlin says absolutely nothing has been said to him in regard to locating and placing Rogoway under arrest.

District Attorney Chamberlain says nothing whatever has been said to him by any of the city officials in regard to the matter.

"If Rogoway has stolen some of the city's money he ought to be hunted up and prosecuted," said Mr. Chamberlain. "All I know about the case is what I have seen in the papers."

Deputy City Attorney Fitzgerald says he has been told by several saloon men in town that they paid Rogoway license money, and that the city auditor has since been around to collect the amounts, only to learn that they had already been paid. A saloon man on Couch street is said to have paid Rogoway \$200, the amount of his license fee for two quarters, but, according to the auditor, there is nothing on the books to show that the fees were paid. There is another saloon keeper on Burnside street who was swindled out of \$50 by the missing collector.

It is said that Rogoway's shortage foots up to several hundred dollars. There is talk of compelling the saloon men who paid the collector to settle again, but those familiar with the law say such a procedure would be impossible, as the dealers have receipts signed by the collector, who at that time was an authorized official in the employ of the municipality.

In addition to the money which Rogoway is said to have obtained in the collection of licenses, it is known that he left a large number of unpaid bills behind, and the creditors would be especially well pleased to have the authorities take a hand in the matter of bringing the fellow to justice.

When Rogoway left here three months ago he was supposed to have gone to San Francisco. Soon after, however, he was seen in Seattle, and later a letter was received here that he had made a "clean-up" of gold at Dawson, and was coming back to settle up all his outstanding accounts. This, however, is now believed to have been a ruse concocted for the purpose of giving the alleged defaulter further time in which to make good his escape.

Mrs. Hattie L. Powers asks TO BE LEGALLY SEPARATED FROM GUY M. POWERS, FORMERLY O. R. & N. AGENT AT SALEM.

Mrs. Hattie L. Powers has begun suit for divorce from Guy M. Powers. The defendant is well known in this vicinity. He served for several years as railroad agent in this city, and was for a short time one of the proprietors of the Oregon Independent, and is now a traveling salesman for the Oregon Nursery Company. Mrs. Powers alleges that they were married in 1889, and that about two years ago her husband began to abuse her, curse her and otherwise mistreat her, so as to render life burdensome. She alleges that about a year ago he left her and went to California, whither she followed him, and endeavored to persuade him to return and live with her. This he refused to do, but met her entreaties with curses. She also alleges that Powers has property of the value of \$3000, which he has conveyed

to his brother, Frank H. Powers, of Portland, for the purpose of defrauding her. She asks that the conveyance be set aside, that she be awarded money with which to prosecute the divorce and that she be given \$30 per month alimony, and one-third of his real property. John Bayne and John A. Carson are attorneys for the plaintiff.
