UNIFORM OF ASTORIA ELKS

THEY WILL WEAR A WHITE AND PURPLE COSTUME—THE SALEM HERD HAS A SURPRISE IN STORE.

The uniform committee, which has charge of the regalia with which the Astoria Elks will be adorned on the occasion of their visit to the Portland carnival, yesterday announced its selection, as follows: White military coat with purple elks on the collar; white trousers with purple stripes and roll Panama hats, with purple ribbon band, stamped "Astoria, No. 180,"—Astorian.

The Salem Elks have not yet announced the character of the uniform that they have adopted. But it is learned that they have a surprise in store in this respect. This much is known—that the costume to be worn by the Salem boys in the competitive drill in Portland during the carnival will be the richest ever seen on a like occasion before. The team, one hundred strong, is drilling faithfully under the direction of Captain Dick, and will be prepared to make a strong fight for first honors at the Portland carnival.

SUMNERS TO BE HONORED

IT IS INTENDED TO MAKE HIM SENIOR VICE-COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR VETERANS.

Senior Vice-Commander-in-Chief of the Spanish-American War Veterans is likely to be the new official title of Brevet Brigadier-General Owen Sumners, says the Telegram. The national encampment of the Spanish war veterans will be held in Indianapolis September 22-24, and the Eastern delegates will tender General Sumners that appointment if he will accept it. Delegates to the national encampment will be elected at the annual encampment of the Oregon Spanish war veterans in the Armory Wednesday, September 10th. The meeting will be held in the board of officers' rooms. A great deal of other business will be transacted, but the most important thing will be the election of delegates to the national encampment. The notification of the extra honor to be conferred upon General Sumners comes through a letter from Adjutant-General W. C. Liller, of the national organization, with headquarters at Lancaster, Pa. The letter says: "When will you hold your state meeting for election of officers and delegates? I hope you will have delegates present at the national encampment, and be there in person, as there is a desire to make you senior vice-commander-in-chief."

SHOULD BE CAREFUL

Complaint has been made that the drivers employed on the street sprinkling department are careless in a few respects. This is particularly true in the throwing of water upon irritable horses that may be hitched along the side streets. An instance of this kind was observed Monday afternoon. The flow of water was not interrupted in the least as one horse was approached, even though it showed some signs of fright, and the result was that the animal broke its halter, and a runaway would have followed but for the fact that its owner was near by. In addition to this, the water was thrown in

to the carriage, upon the seats and robes. This sort of thing is provoking at any rate. Another improvement is suggested that might be made in the sprinkling of streets that would not impair the service at all, and that is to shut off the flow of water on all street crossings. Quite frequently, under the present system, the crossings are practically inundated, which makes it disagreeable, especially for the ladies.
