STATE LOSES CASES

Will Arrange to Supply Its Own Water Power.

In Meantime Will Pay for Water That Is Being Used

The decision of the supreme court in the case of the Salem Flouring Mills Company vs. the State of Oregon, which is adverse to the state, was not unexpected by the present officials. By the findings of the appellate court the controversy over the water power that has been appropriated by the state, and the title to that power, has been fully determined. It is now necessary for the state to make immediate provision for supplying the state institutions and public buildings with an adequate supply of water for all purposes. To meet this need and provide for it, a number of plans are under consideration.

The case just decided has been in the courts for six years. A year ago the Flouring Mills Company enjoined the state from appropriating any further water from the company's ditch, and the decree of the court was that the plaintiff have an immediate enforcement of the injunction until the case might be finally decided in the courts. It was essential that the state have a supply of water, and the state officials compromised with the plaintiff company, and entered into an agreement by which the state was allowed to divert from the company's ditch, as it had been doing, all the water that was needed for the state institutions, for an annual consideration of \$2000.

The last session of the state legislature made an appropriation of \$30,000 to provide for supplying the state in same asylum, the state penitentiary, the state capital building and other public institutions of the state at the seat of government, with water and water power sufficient for the present and future needs of the institutions. To carry into execution the provisions of the measure the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer were constituted a board of public building commissioners, and, as such board, was authorized and instructed to pro-

vide the supply of water. By the provisions of the bill carrying the appropriation the board is given considerable latitude in the matter, and is authorized to either acquire a water power, to install a water power of its own, or to take and condemn lands upon which available power is found. Under this act, the board several months ago let the contract for sinking a well within the penitentiary enclosure, as an experiment to determine the feasibility of deriving a water power on that plan. The well was sunk to a depth of 145 feet, and cost the state about \$400. The dimensions of the well are 10 inches at the surface, and only four inches at the terminus. While the well was finished six weeks ago it has not yet been tested, for the reason that the state board desired to await the decision in the case that has just been disposed of, and, besides, did not wish to make a test until the extreme dry season arrived, that the minimum capacity of the well might be determined. The well gives every indication of yielding a bountiful supply of good water. A preliminary, but satisfactory, test was made of the well a few weeks ago, and in 24 hours there was pumped out 25,000 gallons. A thorough test of the well will be made within a few days, when its real value, and the maximum capacity during the dry season will be disclosed.

The board estimates that at the present time 200,000 gallons of water are required daily for supplying the state institutions and the public buildings, but in their calculations the board made an allowance for a maximum requirement of 1,000,000 gallons. The well test is the preliminary step that the board has taken towards providing a means of supply of water. Upon the success of the test that will be made of the well will depend the further action on the part of the board. If the well proves a success and a source of sufficient supply of water, a system of wells may be sunk, and the state's water supply provided in this manner, which is considered one of the least expensive that has been suggested.

It is not generally considered feasible to bring a supply of water from a distant stream unless other plans that are receiving consideration prove less practical. Until the state arranges for supplying its own water power, it will continue to use water from the ditch of the Flouring Mills Company under the terms that have already been subscribed to.

SNOOK DID GOOD JOB

All of the plastering, plumbing and stone work is now done on the new agricultural hall, at the O. A. C. Last week the task of painting the stone work was completed, and the men all loved to go. There remains only the finishing work, and Mr. Snook will easily have it completed in season for the opening of college this fall. It is said by those who have kept in touch with the work as it progressed on the new building that in many instances Mr. Snook had the work done better than the specifications called for, and not one feature of construction was slighted. The O. A. C. will now be enabled to entertain many more students than she has accommodated in the past.—Corvallis Gazette.
