Pictures Delights of Fishing In Yaquina Bay

Hunters' Paradise At Elk City -- Society On the Beach

Newport, August 27th. The crowds in August have been better entertained than ever before in the history of this summer resort. The Salem Military band gave daily open air concerts, and played every evening, when not engaged for a dance or an excursion. The Indian Institute brought a distinguished assemblage of educators, and many of the best Indian families from the reservation and up and down the coast. Many of these Indians have as fine teams and camping outfits as any white man. They are well dressed and have bright children. At some of the public dances the sons and daughters of these original Americans appeared on the ball room floor and mingled freely and gracefully with the rest of the company. In department, especially in a stately dance like the lancers, they quite equalled if not excelled, their young white friends in dignity and courtly manners. Young people, even of the so-called best society, who romp and chew gum in a social assemblage have something to learn of the Indian boys and girls, as they are now brought up at the best schools. The Indian band has also given open air concerts, and played on the beach. They gave a concert at the Auditorium that was a great surprise to all, and was repeated by request. They gave their opening bill at Olsson's hall, and gave dances all this week at the opera house. This band, under the leadership of Mr. Stouffer, expects to make a concert tour in the East some time this year.

Newport Social Notes. Mrs. Lee Williams gave a tally-ho party on South Beach Monday, one of the most beautiful days of the year. Mrs. Fitzgerald, Mrs. Leabo and son of Portland, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Perren and Prof. Barber were the guests, and John Collins took them over the bay in his sail boat. A candy pull was given Monday night in honor of Chris Stenberg, of Albany, by a number of his young lady friends, at Nye Creek. A reception and whist party was given Monday night to Dr. E. E. Gocher and family, of McMinnville, who have been guests of Superintendent and Mrs. Calbreath, at their new Ocean View cottage. The gentlemen were for many years associated in medical practice. Mrs. Hoxie, of Portland, entertained the Bay View Club at a donkey party Monday night. There were about 30 guests, and Mrs. Byerly and Mrs. E. Hoyer divided the honors. Postmaster Crossman joined his family the past week, and some of the summer guests who fail to get mail promptly have got in the habit of mailing their complaints before this Portland official. Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Harder left for Salem this week, where Mr. Harder will look after the interests of the Southern Mutual Investment Co. which has a number of stockholders at the Capital City, and for which he is general agent.

The Fishing Season.

Salmon fishing has opened very good on Yaquina bay and the finest kind of Chinook salmon are being taken. In a few weeks the silverside salmon run begins, and then trolling on the bay is royal sport. That lasts several months, and those who have not caught a silverside on the end of 60 to 70 yards of line simply do not know the sport that is in this world. There may be better angling in the next world, but it is hard to imagine it under more favorable conditions than trolling in clear blue salt water in the pleasant sea atmosphere, and for the finest fish that swims to bite a hook. There has been a great fatality among the king crabs, of which thousands of dead have strewn the beaches for several weeks. Old timers say that the food supply, the foundation being fished off too closely by seining during the height of the summer season. A strong petition will be got up this coming winter to have the law changed, so as to forbid seining for flounder and other bay fish until the bay is restocked. If this were done for a few years there would be plenty of flounder for all. As it is now the seines make a clean sweep, and kill more than they catch. Sturgeon and halibut have been destroyed in this way by man's rapacity, and the demands of the market. Unless protected the flounder, kelp, rock cod, tom cod, codfish and perch will soon follow suit. Angling would not exterminate them.

Restocking Yaquina Waters.

State Fish Commissioner VanDusen is building a fish hatchery on Elk river, above its junction with the Yaquina. It is expected that the work of restocking the bay and these rivers will begin this fall. The commercial rapacity of the day has almost wiped salmon out of Yaquina waters, so far as making operation of a cannery possible with anything like the profits of the past. The one cannery run each year on the upper waters of the bay and the cannery at Newport some seasons puts up 2000 cases. A foolish law forbids selling or shipping the salmon trout, sea trout or mountain trout that swarm in these tidal streams, and follow the few salmon that do escape the seines, gill nets and traps to eat their spawn. When the salmon gets up into the shallow waters of the upper streams and their tributaries they are killed by the ranchers, who get their only fish in this way. The preservation of the richest and most beautiful food fish in the world is impossible without the intervention of the state, and the present state administration is entitled to praise for its vigorous efforts at restocking the streams, which, under the most favorable conditions, is a stupendous undertaking. The spawning trout should no longer be protected by law.

Fishing at Elk City.

Here is one place that cannot be leached out, so far as trolling fly-fishing and still-fishing are concerned. Here two rivers, fed by innumerable mountain streams are joined, and the tides set back into the hills for miles, with their ceaseless flow. Fresh and salt water mingle, and the finny species bred by both land and sea come to gather for the sportsman to enjoy, and as cannot fish out the stream, as is the case with a mere fresh water trout stream. The hours for fishing no two days are the same, and where they bite at one stage of the tide, they will be strangely absent at a higher or lower stage. Trapping, netting or seining are out of the question, the streams are so full of snags. The water is fairly alive with trout in the best of the season, which is from now on. A still active member of the ancient order of fish-lars told an admiring audience about catching 60 sea trout in one hole in an hour, "and they were all big ones, too," he added. Not a word was said, because all present had some acquaintance with the way they will bite sometimes at Elk City, and respect for the genius of the man before them. Give either Hiram Terwilliger or Marshall Simpson fresh salmon eggs, and the weather and the tides just right, and there is no telling just what they will catch. Having read law, Hiram will tell the best story. I have noticed that lawyers who are anglers always make the biggest catches. But anybody can catch fish at Elk City, if they can only sit in a boat and hold a trout.

A Sportsman's Rest.

The Elk hotel at Elk City is an ideal resting place for the fisherman and hunter. There are good, clean meals and clean beds. The mountain air, with a touch of the salt breeze, that comes up on the sea breeze, does the rest for the most jaded appetite. It is seldom you find a good table, good beds and good sport all united. But Mr. and Mrs. Mays do this to perfection, and it is a poor day when you don't find fish and venison on the table where you can catch the finest game fish in the world, and hunt and kill any kind of big game, and you needn't bring an inch of tackle, or so much as an air pistol. Landlord Mays has everything needed for a day or a week of sport, from a fly-hook to a bear-dog. He furnishes boats and bait, a posse of trained hunters and a pack of hounds, pack horses, or a pack of cards for the evening game of whist. If there isn't anything forthcoming, it is because his guests haven't mentioned it, or it don't grow in the timber, or can't be brought in on the train. The fisherman out of luck gets consolation by plenty of fish on the table at every meal, and if they are to be had, and they generally are, a fine string to carry away. It is an unwritten law that you catch all the fish you carry. If a few days at Elk hotel don't drive away dull care, and start you on the road to heavyside and health, you are really too fat, and they will work some of it off from you.

Big Game Plenty.

Within a few miles from Elk City, in any direction, big game is plenty.

The town's natural rendezvous of all the good hunters in this part of the Coast range, and a sportsman can go out and get bear or deer with one guide or a party, or go Muttering albin, as Louis Kibbe would say. Within three-quarters of a mile of here President Roosevelt could be brought up against black or cinnamon bear to his heart's content. There are cats and cougar enough to make sheep, goat and stock-raising a problem to the pioneer, when the law forbids him running hounds, and makes it a state prison offense if they get after deer. Without running a pack of hounds over this country once in a while the varmints would multiply so his children would have to go to school armed with repeating rifles. If the game law were enforced, as it now stands, stock raising on the mountains and canyons of the Coast range would have to be abandoned. In fact, bear and cougar are killing sheep and calves all through the mountains, and these animals cannot be kept down without running hounds, that occasionally route out a fine buck, and then the people of Elk City have venison to eat, and all the game wardens and game laws in the world cannot prevent the pioneer settlers from having their share of the game. All this is said to point out the fact that Elk City people are not afraid to kill big game when it comes their way, and that they number among their people some of the best hunters in Oregon.

All Deer Hunters.

"We are all deer hunters over here," said one of the old-timers who came across the plains in 1854. "We wouldn't become nigger hunters to the side of the Rockies. We all had to hunt Indians in an early day here, and about the only meat we got is what we down with a rifle or shotgun loaded with No. 3 buckshot, which will kill a deer at 150 yards running. It is a rule here for a good shot to down a deer on the run, if he can see him for a rod. The dogs hunt bear and cougar, but we hunt deer in season. Why even a preacher killed a deer here last week. It came up within 40 feet of him, and he downed it the first shot, and stood and looked at it for 20 minutes, he was so dazed. They generally get the buck before they fire, but he got it afterwards, and one of us had to go over and cut his throat for him. His name was Rev. Riley, of Minneapolis, and he has been preaching at Portland for some time. He didn't like our hunting on Sunday, but you see about half of us is Adventists, and a sportsman can get to hunt any day in the week, by just shifting the crowd a little." Deer hunting is better here than on the coast, because there the deer will take to the beach, swim right through the surf, and lay outside the breakers and float until danger is past, and then go ashore, a fat great many inland hunters have not got onto.
