BUFFALO BILL IS IN TOWN

Wild West Exhibition Seen in Arena

Enormous Crowds Witness the Street Parade

Klamath six, Chinook wawah? Col. Wm. F. Cody ("Buffalo Bill") and his monstrous show arrived in Salem at an early hour this morning, and in few hours the tents were stretched, covering several acres of ground on the depot commons.

And it is a good show, an entertainment worth anybody's money, being an educator, in its way. The Wild West presented by "Buffalo Bill" is not in any sense a circus, and should not be confounded with the ring show. It is, primarily, an exciting display of horsemanship, or, rather, rough riding in the literal interpretation of the phrase. Instead of an immense tent with three rings, a couple of platforms, slack wires and other gymnastic apparatus, and a menagerie, the Wild West entertainment is given in an immense arena enclosed by a canvas wall without a top. A canvas roof protects the spectators, but the riders operate in the open air.

Within the arena are performed marvelous feats of horsemanship that must be seen to be appreciated. There is no delay in the program, and the whirl of the acts is exhilarating. Cowboys, soldiers and Indians are all there, each with a special brand of riding, each possessing equal interest for the thousands of eyes which are watching every movement.

Those who expect to witness a circus performance, or anything partaking of that form of entertainment will be disappointed in "Buffalo Bill's" show. It is an exhibition of horsemanship almost entirely. The show is genuine in every particular. The Englishmen are from England; the Arabs are from Arabia; the Cosacks have their passports from the Russian military authorities, and so it is with all the attaches of the show. They are exactly as represented.

The crowds in Salem today were enormous. Throughout the forenoon there was constant travel over all the roads leading into Salem. There was a continuous stream of farm wagons and vehicles over the big bridge during the forenoon, beginning at an almost unseasonably early hour. The morning trains brought many strangers to the city from the valley towns, and by noon the town was filled to overflowing. In fact, as one merchant was heard to express himself, it appeared as though every resident of the valley within a radius of 40 miles of Salem was here.

The street parade, a mile in length, left the depot grounds shortly before 1 o'clock, and traversed the principal streets of the city. The sidewalks and streets in many places were impassable, so dense was the crowd. But no one was disappointed. Scores of finely groomed horses, mounted by expert horsemen, passed in review down the street, to the admiration of the spectators. The stereotyped features of the circus parade were missing, and the spectacle was a pleasing substitute that was enjoyed in its entirety.

Some Statistics. The Buffalo Bill show requires 42 coaches for its transportation. The aggregation consists of about 600 head of horses, but of that number the visitor to the arena sees not over 300 head. The others are of the Percheron and other heavy draft breeds, that are used for teaming purposes on the grounds. A visit to the tented stables shows the visitor some of the finest specimens of animal flesh. A carload of baled hay is used daily for feeding. The show carries 600 persons, and the commissary department is by no means an unimportant part of the company. A Salem bakery last night baked 300 large loaves of bread for the management, that amount representing a day's consumption. The daily expenses of the entire aggregation will probably average \$2500.

Afternoon Performance. The afternoon performance was given today before one of the largest crowds that ever gathered under canvas in this city. Every feature of the program was warmly applauded, and all certainly got their money's worth, judging from the many comments of praise that were volunteered at the conclusion of the performance.

Tonight's Program. The evening performance will begin promptly at 8 o'clock, and the program will not be abridged or curtailed in the slightest particular. This announcement was made by Press Agent Fellows today. Mr. Fellows says that Col. Cody has taken a pledge to give in the evening an exact reproduction of the performance as it is given in the afternoon, not omitting a single feature, so that those who find it inconvenient to attend this afternoon may attend tonight and see the same program. The company carries its own electric lighting plant, which enables it to properly light up the arena in a satisfactory manner, insuring a successful evening performance. Those who failed to see the exhibition this afternoon should not miss the opportunity to see this novel performance this evening.

FRENCH BUYERS

EXPECT TO INVEST IN OREGON PRUNES THIS YEAR—SHORT-AGE OF CROP IN FRANCE.

L. Cheyray and P. L. Martineau, commission merchants of Lefebvre and Bordeaux, France, respectively, were in Salem today. The purpose of their visit to this city was to establish business relations with the fruit dealers of this section, particularly in the matter of securing a supply of prunes. They report that the French crop this year will not exceed one-third of an average crop. The Oregon prune is not known to the French market for the reason that the dealers have imported their stock from California, where it can be purchased cheaper. Messrs. Cheyray and Martineau are anxious to secure shipments of the 1902 crop of prunes from this state, and to that end have formed business relations with a local commission firm, through which they may purchase and be advised as to the market conditions. They leave Thursday for points in California.

REFUSED TO ALLOW CLAIM

Dunbar Disallows Mrs. Waggoner's Bill of \$1500

Says Woman Did Not Render Service Charged for

Secretary of State Dunbar today disallowed the claim of Mrs. Mary Waggoner for \$1500, charged against the state of Oregon for returning the body of the dead convict, Merrill. In passing upon the claim Secretary Dunbar prepared a written opinion, in which he reviews the circumstances attending the finding of the body, the terms under which the reward was offered, and the provisions of the state law governing the payment of such claims against the state. His final conclusions for disallowing the claim of Mrs. Waggoner are summed up in the final paragraph of the opinion, as follows:

"For the reason that from the facts and evidence offered it does not appear that the claimant rendered the service claimed, whereby her action in finding and returning the body of Merrill complied with the provisions of the law or the offer of the reward, and is therefore not entitled to the amount claimed, or any part thereof."

The members of the Washington posse that returned the body of Tracy have not yet filed their claim for the reward with the secretary of state, although their attorneys several days ago announced that they would do so in the very near future. Until the claim for the Tracy reward money has been regularly filed with the secretary of state, there can be had no action towards its consideration and payment.

No Word For Love.

In comparison with the English tongue foreign tongues seem parsimonious in some ways of expression and wasteful in others.

For instance, it is impossible to "kick" a man in French. You must give him a "blow with the foot." The Portuguese does not "wink" at one; they "close and open the eyes."

In the languages of the American Indians there is no word with which to convey the idea of "stealing," perhaps because the idea of property is so vague. It is related of one of the early missionaries that in attempting to translate the Bible into Algonquian he could find no word to express "love" and was compelled to invent it.

Be Improved.

Daniel Webster once told a friend that his great speech in reply to Hayne, which is the high water mark of modern eloquence, but which at the time was supposed to have been delivered without preparation, had been substantially prepared long before. When called upon suddenly to reply to the fiery Carolinian's attacks, which so alarmed the New Englanders at the capital, he was entirely at ease and ready for the fray, for, as he said, he had "only to turn to his notes tucked away in a pigeonhole," and refresh his recollection. "If Hayne," he said, "had tried to make a speech to fit my notes, he could not have hit them better. No man is inspired by the occasion. I never was."

Left and Right Limbs.

Physiologists and scientists in general have been making some curious experiments with a view to determine the relative length and strength of "right and left limbs." Fifty and ninety per cent of the men examined had the right arm stronger than the left. 16.4 per cent had the two arms of equal length and strength, and 32.7 per cent had the left arm stronger than the right. Of women, 46.9 per cent had the right arm stronger than the left, and 24.5 per cent had the left stronger than the right—London Family Doctor.

Where Smoking Is a Crime.

There is one country in the world where it is considered a crime to smoke. Abyssinia is the nation, and the law forbidding tobacco dates from the year 1642. It was at first merely intended to prevent priests from smoking in the churches, but it was taken too literally, and nowadays even foreigners have to be careful not to be seen smoking.

An Unusual Race.

An unusual race was advertised to be run at Ripon, in Yorkshire, in 1725: "The Lady's Plate, of £15 value, by any horse that was no more than five years old the last grass. Women to be the riders. Each to pay a guinea entrance. Three heats and twice round the common for a heat."

OAT POOL IS SOLD

BALFOUR, GUTHRIE & CO. WERE SUCCESSFUL BIDDERS FOR ABOUT 65,000 BUSHELS OF OATS.

The Rocky Point Grain Growers' Association held a meeting at the Rocky Point school house Wednesday evening, and opened bids for the purchase of their pool of oats, amounting to about 65,000 bushels. The bid of Balfour, Guthrie & Company was accepted, their offer being the highest. The bid of the successful company was 81 cents per hundred for the fall oats, and 81 cents for the spring crop. These figures are equivalent to 27 cents per bushel for the fall oats, and 26 cents for the spring oats. This is in advance of the local market quotation, which is only 75 cents per hundred, or 24 cents per bushel. This is the third successive year that the growers represented in the association have disposed of their crops, as an organization, at an advance over the prevailing market quotations, and they feel well satisfied with their efforts in that direction. The association last week sold its pool of 8000 bushels of wheat to A. D. Gardner, the Stayton miller, at 57 cents, or four cents above the Salem market quotation for the same cereal.
